

# Tribal reorganization finalized, set into action soon

The finalization of the tribal reorganization, which has been in the planning stages for nearly two years, has become a reality and will go into effect September 1. All changes, most of which are promotions, involve tribal members. Though most changes will be in effect in September, the proposed contracting of the BIA Land Operations Branch if approved, will be effective January 1, 1984.

Those tribal members most affected by the reorganization will be Ray Calica, Jeff Sanders, Jody Calica, Benny Heath and Delford Johnson. Also to be affected is Lloyd Smith, Sr., who has served as personnel director for the past eight years. He will work in the finance department but, at this time, it is unknown in what capacity he will serve.

The tribal organization is separated into two branches, much like before. However, Fiscal Services branch manager Doug McClelland will soon have an assistant, Mike Clements. Clements has worked in the tribal Planning department for nearly six years. Community Services branch manager Ed Manion will also have an assistant. However, that position will not be filled until after January 1.

Of particular interest is the proposed contracting of the BIA Land Operations Branch. According to Warm Springs BIA superintendent Merrit Youngdeer, the Tribe has indicated that they want to contract the office of Range and Agriculture, which is currently a BIA position held by Land Operations officer Ray Welch. If accepted, the contracting will not take until January 1984.

Youngdeer said this is a "unique venture," as Welch is retiring at the end of the year. The Tribe will contract through BIA someone to replace Welch and that person will oversee the day-to-day activities of the soil, range and irrigation specialists and range technician. These

employees will remain BIA employees. The person hired as overseer will report directly to Youngdeer due to the trust responsibilities.

Youngdeer said that the Tribe expressed interest in contracting the departments before, but due to the uncertain direction of the department and the proposed range management plan, the Tribe chose to wait. "This is an ideal time to be discussing this again," Youngdeer stated.

Under the supervision of McClelland will be three departments; Finance, Enterprise and Natural Resources; Court Administration which includes Legal Aid and Parole and Probation; and four other departments, Planning, Steno Pool, Credit and Spilyay Tymoo, that do not fit directly under any one department in the reorganization.

Under the Department of Finance, to be managed by Jim Sizemore, will be Purchasing, directed by

Orthelia Miller; Data Processing, directed by Lloyd Phillips; Vital Statistics, directed by Madeline Queahpama and Insurance, directed by Charles Nathan. Also under the Finance Department will be the office of accounting, for which a supervisor has yet to be hired.

Under the Department of Enterprise, which Delford Johnson will manage, will be Construction directed by Les Yaw; Information and Vending, directed by Faye Waheneka; Tribal Garage, directed by Ron Kersey; Assembly Plant, directed by Everett Miller; and Thinning, directed by Randy Smith. Also under the Enterprise Department will be the Vehicle Pool, for which a supervisor has yet to be hired.

Under the Department of Natural Resources, which Gene Greene will supervise, will be Fish and Wildlife, directed by Terry Luther; Parks, Water, directed by Deepak Sehgal; Soil Specialist,

directed by Dean Elliott; Range Specialist; directed by Brian Spears; Irrigation Specialist, directed by Lester Poitra; Range Technician, directed by Guy Wallulatum and OSU Extension, directed by Lee Hamilton. Also under Greene, will be Range and Agriculture for which no supervisor has been hired.

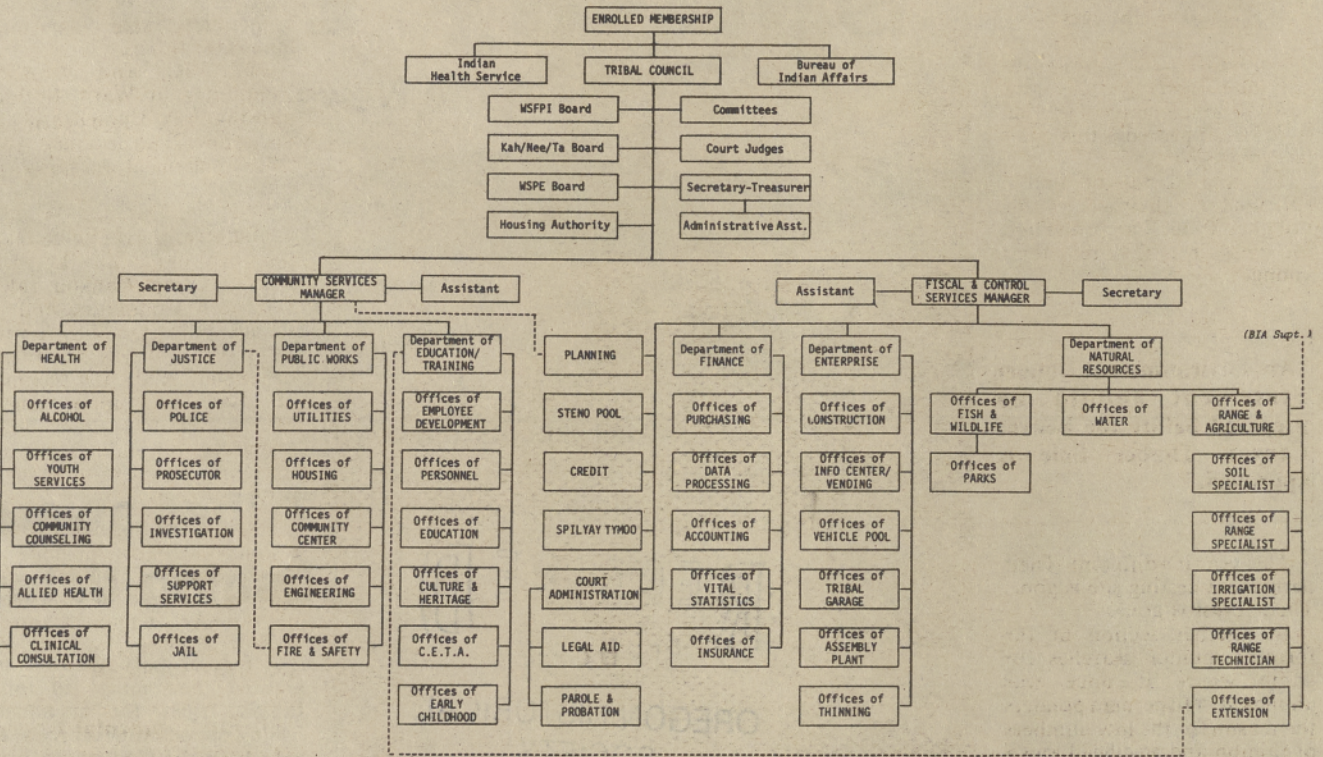
In the Community Services branch there are four departments, those being the Health, Justice, Public Works and Education training departments. Under the Health department which is directed by Bob Jackson, will be Youth Services, directed by Dale Cochran; Community Counseling, directed by Ramona Tanewasha; Allied Health, directed by Sal Sahme; and Clinical Consultant, directed by Barbara Weist. Also under Jackson is Alcohol, for which a new director will soon be hired.

Under the department of Justice, which is managed by Ken English, will be the Police, the new chief of police

will be Ray Calica; Prosecutor, directed by Paul Minthorn; Investigation, directed by Jerome Main; and Jail, directed by Sam Sosa. Also under English will be the Police Administration for which a supervisor has yet to be hired.

Under the department of Public Works, which will be managed by Jeff Sanders, will be Utilities, directed by Herb Graybael; Housing, directed by Elton Greeley, Community Center, directed by Satch Miller; Engineering, directed by Satish Puri and Fire and Safety, directed by Jerry Huff.

Under the department of Education and Training, which will be managed by Jody Calica, will be Employee Development, directed by Rudy Clements; Personnel, directed by Benny Heath; Culture and Heritage, directed by Nina Rowe; CETA and JTPA, directed by Richard Craig and Early Childhood Education, directed by Cody Soules. Also under Calica will be Education for which a director has yet to be hired.
