

Various scholarships offered students

Three scholarships programs one for Oregonians, the other for out-of-state residents, and the third for both, are available to new students interested in attending most Oregon State System of Higher Education colleges and universities.

Part of the State System's "Campaign for Excellence," the scholarships are given on a student's academic and activities achievement. None are awarded on the basis of athletic ability. Financial need is not a requirement.

Oregon Presidential Scholarship of \$1,000 may be awarded to Oregonians entering State Systems institutions for the first time. Private individuals fund the scholarships by making donations to participating institutions.

Oregon Honors Scholarships, which reduce tuition by \$1,000, are for nonresident new students.

Residence Hall Scholarships are available to both resident and nonresident new students. They reduce room and board costs by \$500.

State System institutions include Portland State University (Portland), Southern Oregon State College (Ashland), Eastern Oregon State College (La Grande), Western Oregon State College (Monmouth), University of Oregon (Eugene), Oregon Health Sciences University (Portland), Oregon State University (Corvallis), and Oregon Institute of Technology (Klamath Falls).

"Not all of these three

scholarships are available at each Oregon State System College or university," said Gary Christensen, State System institutions. This is a good time for high school seniors, who will be applying for admissions in Fall 1984, to contact the institution they are interested in attending to learn what is available."

Dentist offers hints for tooth care

Hints from the dentist:

Q: How should I prepare my child for his first visit to the dentist?

A: Try to make dental visits an important adventure for your child. Tell him the dentist is a friendly doctor who will help keep his teeth and mouth healthy. Talk about the visit in a positive, matter-of-fact way as you would any new

experience. It is important to prevent fear. Avoid statements that imply the visit may be unpleasant, such as "It won't hurt." If you have anxieties about dental visits, try not to let your child know. A good first trip will help mold your child's feelings for many years.

Q: When should I take my child for his first dental visit?

A: Fifty percent of two-year-old children have one or more

decayed teeth. In view of this, it is recommended that you take your child for his first dental visit before his second birthday—or at least before all 20 of his primary teeth have erupted. The earlier you begin, the better chance your dentist has to prevent problems. If a child younger than two has a cavity or his teeth are injured in an accident, he should, of course, be taken to a dentist for examination and whatever treatment is necessary.
