General Council discusses '84 budget

After a hearty meal on November 15, tribal members gathered at the Agency Longhouse to review the 1984 budget. Not a capacity crowd by any means but still a good turnout of concerned tribal members.

Tribal council member Bernice Mitchell opened the meeting with a prayer at first in the Indian language followed by her interpretation in English. Opening remarks by Chairman Zane Jackson and of each council member expressing rigorous participation of a difficult task and decision making and hoping each decision was the right one. Also, their long hours of work with top management and supervisors covering every aspect of the budget. Unity throughout the organization was a key factor for solving problems and coming to agreements on budget matters. Acting Superintendent Robert Harned was present and commented on the BIA's role and functions with tribal matters.

Secretary Treasurer Ralph Minnick proceeded to explain the entire budget process. The 10 percent funds, the tribes

participation in Washington D.C., regarding the 10 percent monies which is now a deduction of all timber sales and now used for additional expenditures here on the reservation for tree thinning, planting and other related projects.

All interest earned are from funds on deposit in the Treasury, I.I.M. and other interests. Other income for the tribe is from the Round Butte and Pelton Dams and from the Hydro Electric Project. The Mission, what is the operational plan for the tribe? (A) The tribal government exists to provide goods and services to people that cannot provide for themselves. (B) Role of the tribal government is to help strengthen family units. (C) To help people the best they can to help themselves and (D) Short term dependency.
