summer. The rest of the year she is a college student studying pre-veterinary medicine. She is an honor student and a member of the college rodeo team at Central Oregon Community College.

In reflecting on her and her horse's run in the National Finals she said they did well but they were going to do better this upcoming year and bring home the championship. Her runs in Albuquerque were 16.90, 16.55 and 16.61 for a total of 50.06 seconds. She was .67 of a second from first place. It was fast enough to give her third place. Her effort rewarded to the tune of \$920.00.

Also traveling to the Finals were Terry Squiemphen, C.R.'s older brother. Terry placed in saddle bronc in Western States. This was Terry's first competition at Finals but with

the Squiemphen competitive spirit it will no doubt not be his last. In three rides, Terry was thrown twice and on the third ride the judges said he missed his horse out of the gate, which means his spurs were not up on the horse's neck where they should have been at the beginning of the ride.

This year was the eighth Annual Coors Indian National Finals held at Tingley Coliseum in Albuquerque, New Mexico. The rodeo is termed as "the classic of all Indian rodeos in North America and it is the only rodeo of its kind established to recognize Indian rodeo contestants on a national scale." This year the rodeo payoff was in the neighborhood of \$80,000 in prize monies and awards.

Each of the contestants earn a berth to the INFR by

qualifying in a system chosen by the nine major Indian regional rodeo associations throughout North America. To qualify a contestant must finish in the top two positions in rodeo's six major events (saddle bronc, bareback, team roping, bull riding, calf roping and steer wrestling) and the ladies barrel racing. Finishing in the top positions means winning the most money in that event, points are determined using a dollar a point. The competition is among the best cowboys and cowgirls in the continent during the finals and, in the end, the very best win the championship in each event.

Each year at the Finals there are other activities for spectators and cowboys, including a powwow, an arts and crafts fair and the Miss Indian Rodeo contest.

There are currently 3,000

members in the nine Indian rodeo associations throughout the country and two of those members being C.R. and Terry Squiemphen. Both have every intention of being back at Albuquerque next year to compete for the title of champ in their event.
