The undefeated White Buffaloes of Madras continue to roll over their Greater Oregon League opponents in high school basketball. Their latest victims were the Nyssa Bulldogs from Eastern Oregon.

Nyssa is always a threat in basketball, with this year being no different having some very good talent returning from last years ball club. They have good height and experience but the Buffs were able to contain their play.

In the game Saturday January 28, the Buffs quickly took control and the tempo of the game. The Buffaloes now have a 3-0 league record and remain the only unbeaten team so far in their league.

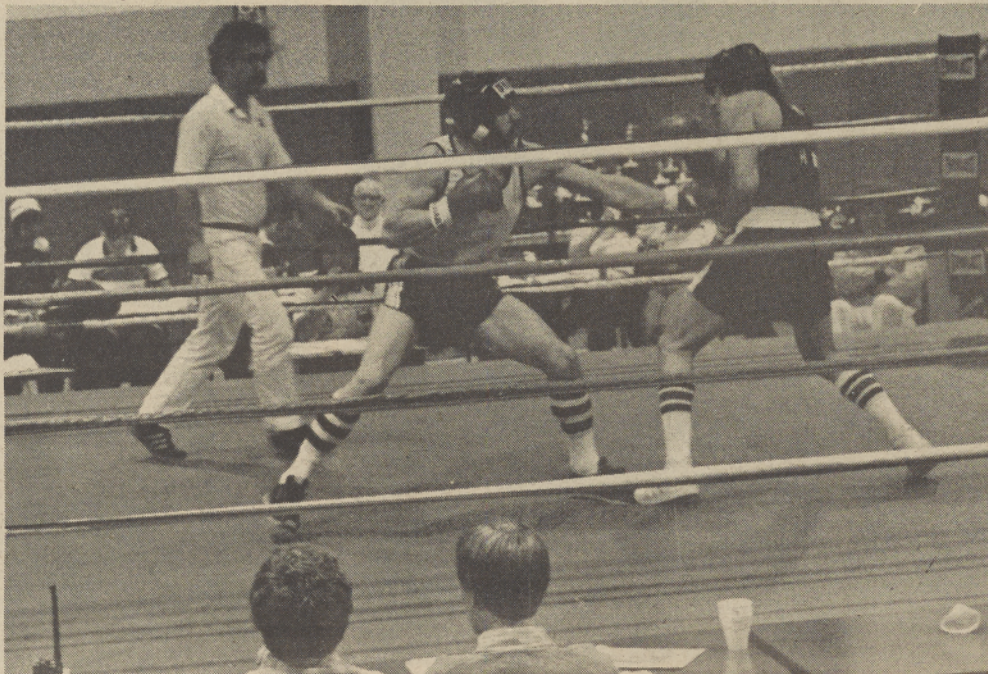

"Against Nyssa, we played a good ball game, the kids done a fine job, but we're not at the finish line yet. Blincoe said. Silver Gloves action packed

There were 12 action packed boxing matches on Sunday, January 29, in the Community Center winding up the Silver Gloves boxing tournament.

The 12 bouts were the results of boxers who earned the right to compete for the championships during the two day boxing affair. The matches ranged in weights from 65 to 165 pounds. The Silver Glove tournament is for the novice boxers, the young inexperienced who have had no more than 10 bouts before.

The boxing tournament was sanctioned by the USA/ABF, which is the parent of all amateur boxing here in the U.S. today. At one time each association had different set of boxing rules and varied from the International rules which created a problem when a boxer wanted to compete internationally. Now all boxing clubs use the same rules which comply with the International boxing rules eliminating any problems they had in the past.

There were 11 boxing clubs represented here from Washington, California and Oregon. Teams from Beaverton, Timberlake, of Estacada, East Linn from Sweethome, Mt. Scott of Portland, West Eugene, Gilchrist, Vancouver Elks, Wapato Left Hook, Hoopa California, locally the Golden Eagle boxing club and the host Warm Springs boxing club.

The finals started at noon on Sunday by first starting out with a standby match between Jerry Heller of Mt. Scott and Toby Bolden of Beaverton. This bout was not a contest as these two boys have had more than 10 bouts apiece before.

The first championship round were in the 10-11 year

old starting out with the 65 pounders Leon Ariza of Beaverton out pointed Nathan Smith of the Vancouver Elks boxing club. In the 70 pound class Chad Davis of Beaverton out pointed Tony Fuentes of the Warm Springs Boxing Club. 75 pound class, Dustin Sparpe of Beaverton beat Oly Olsan of East Linn. 85 pound class **Ryan Eagleheart** of WSBC beat **Bruce Miller** of the Golden Eagle boxing club as the referee stopped the bout in the second round. 110 pound class **Sonny Jackson** Golden Eagle lost to Mark Heater of Mt. Scott.

In the 12-13 year old division at 125 pounds Jude Pena, Vancouver beat Tom Kittson of East Linn. In the special senior class 16 years and older at 125 pounds **Mark Stacona** of Golden Eagle lost to Juan Zuniga of Timberlake. 132 pound class Marvin Core, West Eugene lost to Marcelino Osegura of Wapato Left Hook boxing club. 139 pounds Joe Mabin Timberlake defeated Dave Curtis of East Linn. 147 pounds Salvatore Baldivia of Left Hook decisioned **Edward Lucei** of the Golden Eagle club. 156 pounds Vincent Scoggin Timberlake defeated Todd Kuhnhauser of Vancouver Elks. 165 pounds Steve Depue of Gilchrist defeated Clarence Lewis of Hoopa, California.

There were 11 uncontested champions. These were the only boxers in their weight division and were declared champions. The Vancouver Elks Boxing Club was the team champions with Timberlake the runner-up. There were several awards given to the outstanding boxers in each division. The tournament was well organized with a lot of hard work from Gerald Smith and his assistants. The tournament went very well.
