### Simnasho Mini-Marathon set

Awards will be presented to first and second place winners male and female, in five age categories including; 13 and under; 14-18 years of age; 19-29; 30-39; and, 40 plus.

Raffle tickets are available for 50¢ each at the Extension office or at the Village parking lot the day of the race. Drawings will take place following the run.

Motorists are asked to arrive early as police will have the road from the county line to

only one-lane traffic prior to the race.
