Two fire fightings classes offered

The Warm Springs fire management section, Branch of Forestry, is offering two basic fire fighting courses for anyone interested. On May 1, 1984 the class of "Introduction to fire behavior" (S190) will be offered. It is an eight hour course designed to give an unexperienced person the knowledge of fire and how it responds to certain types of

environment. It is a certified course and upon completion, attendants will receive a certificate.

"Basic Fire Fighter" (S-130) will be presented on May 2, 3 and 4. The course is designed to illustrate basic fire fighting techniques in fire suppression, hand tool uses, water use, fire cause determination and other techniques. Certification will

be presented to those who attend the entire three day course.

The two courses are being offered at the Community Center's Social Hall. The four day presentation will start on May 1 at 9 a.m.
