Weaseltail powwow May 25-27

Over \$8,000 in prize monies will be offered at the 17th annual Weaseltail Powwow in White Swan, Washington held May 25, 26 and 27. The powwow will be held at the White Swan Pavillion which is located 2.5 miles southeast of White Swan.

Memorial trophies sponsored by Harriet Doublerunner and family will be given for first place in men's and women's class. Categories in men's and women's will be Jr. Traditional and fancy; traditional and

fancy; tiny tots; and senior citizens. A special grass dance contest will be featured. A host drum will be chosen each night of the powwow. Registration opens Friday evening, May 25 and closes Saturday, May 26 at noon. On Saturday, a give away will be held from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. A co-ed softball tournament, four-mile fun run and stick games will also be held during the three-day celebration.

Camping and shower facilities are available at the

grounds. Concession stands can be set up at the grounds for a \$35 daily fee with arts and crafts stands at \$25 daily. The powwow committee will not be responsible for thefts, accidents and or injuries. The rule of no alcohol or drugs allowed on the grounds will be strictly enforced.

White Swan rodeo June 8-10

A super show with all the thrills and spills of rodeo can be seen at the 27th Annual All-Indian Championship Treaty Days Celebration rodeo at White Swan, Washington on June 8, 9 and 10, 1984. The rodeo is sanctioned by the Western States Indian Rodeo Association (WSIRA). The Tiinowit Powwow will be held June 7, 8, 9 and 10.

Rodeo events will be saddle bronc, bareback and bullriding with a long go-short go with the top ten to go in the Sunday show, each will have an added purse \$500 with the entry fee \$40, full riding will be limited to the first 48 entries. Calf roping, team roping, steer wrestling and barrel racing will be two goes with the top ten to go on Sunday, added purse for each of the events \$500 with an entry fee of \$40. Wild cow milking will be one go with added purse of \$500 and entry fee of \$40. Girls junior barrel racing for 12 years and under will have an added purse of

\$100 and entry fee of \$15. Slack will be Saturday at 8 a.m. and after the Saturday show for all events.

Special events at the rodeo will be the wild horse race, limited to the first eight entries, entry fee per team \$60 with an added purse of \$400; Indian pony express race to be held on Sunday, entry fee per team \$30 with an added purse of \$100; squaw race to be held on Saturday only, with an entry fee of \$20 and an added purse of \$100; and a kids small pony race to be Saturday only, horse size 52 inches maximum, ages 8-11 years for riders, prizes to be awarded.

A Calcutta will be held Sunday at 9 a.m. for saddle bronc, bull riding, team roping and barrel racing.

The rodeo books will open Monday, June 4, 1984 at 9 a.m. and close on Tuesday, June 5, 1984 at 9 p.m. Rodeo office hours will be 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Mail entries can be sent to Alta Sanchez, P.O. Box 671, White

Swan, Washington, 98952. Telephone entries (509) 874-2220, can be made Monday, June 4, 1984 after 9 a.m. Money must accompany entry or a WSIRA membership card number. No personal checks will be accepted.

Trophy buckles will be given in standard events to winners, also to winners in the wild horse race and junior barrel racing and Eagle Seelatsee Memorial. An all-around saddle will be awarded to the all-around cowboy.

Three dances will be held at Mt. Adams Community Center; Queen's dance-Saturday, June 2, 1984, 9 p.m. to 1 p.m.; cowboy dances, Friday, June 8 and Saturday, June 9, 9 p.m. to 1 p.m.

General admission for the Friday, June 8, rodeo will be \$2.50 and Elders free, for Saturday, June 9 and Sunday, June 10 admission will be adults-\$4.50, students and Elders-\$2.50 with young children admitted free when accompanied by parents.

An Indian encampment and concessions will be held at White Swan grounds. Teepee village Indian games of Wau-Luks, stick games and other Indian activities will be held at the encampment.

Smoke detectors do save lives

Smoke detectors are devices that automatically sound a warning when they sense smoke or other products of combustion. They are important because if you and your family are warned about a fire before it spreads, you'll be able to escape and call for help. Without them, you may never wake up.

Over 5,000 Americans die in home fires each year. The proper use of smoke detectors could easily save the majority of these lives. Most deaths occur from inhaling smoke or poisonous gases, not flames. Most residential fires happen between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m. when most occupants are asleep. It's a proven fact that smoke detectors save lives.

There are two types of smoke detectors. The first type, ionization, contain radioactive material that conducts electricity. When smoke enters, air molecules become ionized, causing the flow of electricity to slow down. The change in electric current flow triggers the alarm. These are most effective for sensing flaming fires such as those caused by paper or drapes.

They can be battery operated or powered from household current battery powered are recommended by Warm Springs fire chief Jerry Huff because they operate during periods of power loss and are easily installed-no cords or wiring to worry about.

The second type are photoelectric which contain a light source and a photocell, which is activated by light. Light from the bulb reflect off

the smoke particles and is directed towards the photocell. The photocell is then activated to trigger the alarm.

This type is most effective for sensing smoldering fires, such as those caused by a burning cigarette in a sofa or a smoldering rug. May be powered by either a battery or household current.

Again, the fire chief recommends the battery type because of frequent power failures and ease of installation.

Placement of smoke detectors is important. Consider which areas of the house you want to protect, where fire would be most dangerous, how many you will need, etc.

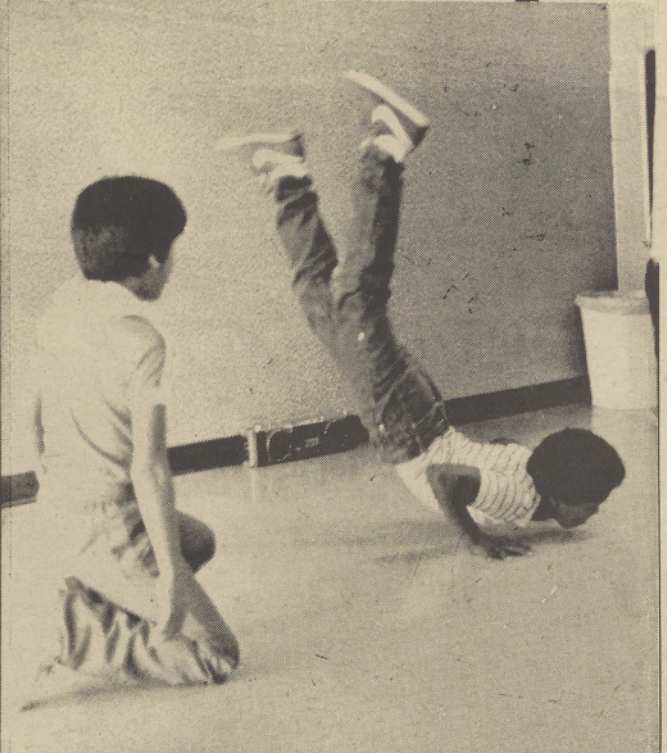
A large home needs more protection than a small one. Also, at least one detector per floor. Sleeping areas need the most protection. One detector in a short hallway outside bedrooms is usually adequate. If hallways between bedrooms are longer than 30 feet, one should be placed at each end.

If you sleep with the doors closed, you might want a detector in each bedroom for maximum protection.

Maintenance of detectors is simple. Replace batteries every year or as needed. Keep a spare on hand. Replace bulb on photoelectric type every three years or as needed. Clean the grill work often to keep it free from dust or grease.
