Users of PGE electricity in the Portland area were informed in their April bills that the increases seen in their bills were due to a BPA rate increase and the tax imposed by the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs. In actuality, the average homeowner's bill increased by only 14 cents. PGE has appealed, in federal court, the Tribe's right to tax.
