Health department reorganizing

It may be confusing at first, until community members get accustomed to the new locations, but the health department offices will be moving. The move, says health department manager Bob Jackson, will streamline services offered, make it "more convenient to the community."

eliminate confusion of where to go to receive services and consolidate "like—services" under one roof.

The move will begin July 2 and continue through the week. Hopefully, if the move goes smoothly and in a timely manner, it will be business-as-usual on Monday, July 9. It was stressed that no appointments will be made unless it is an emergency.

Here's the way it will be as of July 9.

Allied Health—Which includes the WIC, CHR, MCH, Welfare and Senior Citizen's programs, will be moving to the Vern Jackson Home. This facility was vacated earlier this year when it was decided to place children aged infant to 12 in private homes (shelter homes).

Youth Services—The Group Home, Foster Homes and Shelter Homes programs will all be administered at the Group Home, The Parole, and

Probation office will also be in the Group Home, on the south end of the building.

Clinical Services—Which includes all alcohol, mental health, drug and family counseling services will be located in what is now the Alcohol Building. It was decided earlier this year that, residential treatment care would no longer be offered in Warm Springs, but instead outside treatment center would be used. The program will now be focusing on early identification of problems, intervention, aftercare and family involvement.

Phone numbers for the departments will change. Rather than each department take their extension with them, the department will use the extensions in their new locations. It will be confusing at first, but by calling 553-1161, a caller will be connected to the proper extension. In case of emergencies before the move is final, it is advised to 553-1161, ext. 225.

Sockeye season possible

A Columbia River commercial sockeye season may become a reality for the second year in a row as biologists are predicting a run of between 100,000-150,000 sockeye.

The first commercial sockeye fishing season since 1973 took place last year when treaty fishermen landed 1,800 bluebacks in a seven day season. The Columbia River Compact will meet June 22 at 1 p.m. to consider the setting of

treaty and non-treaty seasons.

The treaty Indian season will likely entail all of Zone 6 beginning during the week of June 24, possibly as early as Monday, be 10 to 11 days in length and operate under a maximum 4½" stretch mesh size.

More information on the season and regulations will be available through the Natural Resources Department after June 22.
