White Swan lists 247 entries

With a total of 247 contestants entered at the White Swan All Indian rodeo, Randy Rogers of Reno, Nevada, emerged as the all-around champion this year. He managed to build up enough points to win the buckle and ward off any close competitors for the title.

There was plenty of action for everyone during the rodeo weekend with two western dances where cowboys meet girls and all kinds of concessions and other special attractions during the rodeo such as squaw race on Saturday which was won by Vera Eneas of White Swan, Washington, second was Claudine Flett of Wellpinit, Washington. A Pony Express race on Sunday won by **Ricky Graybael of Warm Springs** and second was Gabe Moses of Wellpinit, Washington.

Action was hard and fast in the rodeo arena during all the rough stock events, starting out with the bareback event there the spectators saw John Hammack, of Redmond Oregon, win that event. Hammack, one of the leading riders in the northwest gave a good showing of himself to win the buckle. Roy Begody, a Navajo now living in Wapato, Washington, placed 2nd and 3rd and 4th was split by **Tony Mitchell of Warm Springs** and Leno Hardin of Havre, Montana.

In the saddle bronc the event known as the Grand Daddy of all rodeo sports saw plenty of the top bronc riders from throughout the Western States and Canada hoping for a good draw to make a good showing for the judges, but when all the

points were tallied up Jerry Sam of Omak, Washington, came out the winner while Dave Best also of Omak took 2nd place, Vince Garcia of Chiloquin, 3rd and Louis Little Bear of Standoff, Alberta, Canada placed 4th.

The bulls put out plenty of bone crushing action during the rodeo. Roy Begody weathered the storm to win 1st place, Dave Best placed 2nd, Donny Quintero of Schurz, Nevada 3rd and Allen Flett of Wellpinit 4th.

They say calf ropers would be handy to have around during the Christmas holidays to wrap packages. Well there was some fast wrapping done during the calf roping event. Fred Kinerson, Jr., of Schurz, Nevada, won the event and Mel Joseph of Lone Pine, California 2nd, Roy Hicks of Nixon, Nevada, 3rd and Dennis Dahl of Lame Deer, Montana 4th.

The Canadian cowboys came south of the border to win the steer wrestling event as Virgil Jacobs of Calgary, Alberta, Canada took 1st place, Clarence Blackwater of Standoff, Alberta placed 2nd, Ron Luke of Yakima, Washington took third and Rocky Avery of Moses Lake placed 4th.

There was plenty of action in the team roping event where a local father and daughter team, came up just short of winning the event but was good enough for second place considering all the ropers who were entered in that event. But **Earl and C.R. Squiemphen** made a good showing for themselves at White Swan.

Winning the team roping

event was Dennis Dahl of Lame Deer, Montana and Carl Johnson of Schurz, Nevada.

Third place went to Cort Herrera and Wayne Hamlin, fourth place went to Lawrence Prettyweasel and Leland Walkingbear of Hardin, Montana.

The wild cow milking paid six monies: 1. Randy Rogers of Reno, Nevada; 2. Ben Bird of Browning, Montana; 3. Garry Rogers of Sparks, Nevada; 4. Denny Quintero of Schurz; 5. Carl Johnson, Schurz, Nevada and 6. Billy Valdez of Glenwood, Washington.

At every rodeo the girls barrel race is an eye opener and one of the highlights and winning this years barrel race was one of the top contenders for the barrel race title for the WSIRA is Snuffy Herrera who wowed the home crowd fans on her performances. 2nd place went to Charlene Jackson, Tsale, Arizona, 3rd Cathy Williams of Fallon, Nevada; 4th Betty Sampson of Wapato, Washington.

This year a 12 year old and under girls barrel race was added to the program where Shannon Williams of Schurz won 1st place; 2nd Jeanine Kness also of Schurz, Nevada and Billie Leith of Nespelem, Washington.

An event not one of the major events of rodeos but an added attraction which produces plenty of bumps and bruises to the cowboys and thrills the spectators is the wild horse race. This year the **Enos Herkshan team** were the winners of the buckle and the **Tony Suppah team** second. Both teams from Warm Springs.

Rodeo begins Saturday

For two days of action packed thrills and spills, plan to attend the 9th Annual All-Indian Treaty Days rodeo held at the Warm Springs Rodeo grounds on June 23 and 24. Show time for each day's performance is 1 p.m.

Plan to attend the rodeo and watch the saddle bronc, bareback, bull riding, calf roping, team roping, steer wrestling, girls barrel racing, wild cow milking, wild horse race, junior barrel and calf riding events. Give your

support to local cowboys and cowgirls with your attendance and applause.

Admission for adults will be \$3, for children under 12 years of age it will be \$1.50 and senior citizens will be admitted free.

A western dance will be held Saturday night at Kah-Nee-Ta Lodge. The dance will start at 9 p.m.

On Sunday, June 24 a Buckaroo Breakfast will be at the Agency Longhouse from 6-10:30 a.m. Cost of the breakfast will be \$3 per plate.

Endurance Race Set

The Juanita Bourland Memorial Endurance horse race is set for Sunday morning, June 24 starting at 10:00 a.m. The 20-mile race will start at the Park across the street from the Community Center and go west on the Shitike Creek road up into Wilford Canyon, up on the flats and down to the Razor Back, behind the West Hills housing area, down white hill and end in the Park area.
