Reservation hunting discussed

Preservation of natural resources for generations yet unborn is vital, to say the least. Such as it is on the Warm Springs Reservation. Because

reservation deer populations were alarmingly low. Tribal Council, through the recommendations of Natural Resources, closed reservation deer hunting in January of this year. Exactly when the hunting will reopen will be determined by Tribal Council.

A public meeting was held June 19 at the Agency Longhouse to discuss deer populations and their status, the closure and the possibility of seasons and other wildlife information. Attendance of the meeting was good and many voiced sincere concerns.

Wildlife biologist Terry Luther and natural resources director Gene Greene spoke of the hunting closure. They stated that the closure will increase deer herds—pregnant

does were not harvested throughout the winter and spring months thus larger herds. Ultimately this program will increase the herds to desired levels.

Members who attended the meeting seemed to accept the fact that they would have to forego hunting in order to rebuild depleted deer herds. With the rapidly growing reservation population, this program will ensure a healthy deer herd for future subsistence demands.

The possibility of a hunter's safety course on the reservation was mentioned. Luther will soon organize a source and it was recommended that Darrel Miller, a member of the Warm Springs Police Department, be
