Tribes receive grant

The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs recently received news that they were awarded a \$102,394 grant from the Public Telecommunications Facilities program for an educational FM radio station. The call letters for the station have not yet been decided.

The funding has been earmarked for the construction of a 200' transmitting

tower which will be atop Eagle Butte, a transmitter and radio equipment. The proposed site for the broadcast station is just north east of Warm Springs on Kah-Nee-Ta road above Miller Heights or southwest of the Longhouse.

Warm Springs will have two years to implement the funding.

Fire destroys residence Treaty steelhead season discussed

A short in the power box caused a fire that destroyed the residence of Vincent Macy and Susie LaRocca, a mobile home four-and-one-half miles southwest of Warm Springs. The fire awoke Macy and LaRocca early Sunday, July 17.

The flames started in a closet in the back bedroom and quickly spread to engulf the entire trailer. Macy and

LaRocca attempted to control the fire but were unsuccessful. LaRocca called the Fire and Safety department upon discovery of the fire.

Warm Springs Fire and Safety responded at 3:16 a.m. with a 16-man crew, two engines, a rescue unit, an ambulance and the tanker from Simnasho. By the time they arrived, the fire was fully involved.

The trailer was destroyed. Macy and LaRocca were unable to save any of their belongings from within the trailer. A minimum estimate of damage of fire was set at \$19,000 by Fire and Safety but fire chief Jerry Huff said a number of antiques were burned and it is hard to put a true value on antiques.

Huff warns that people need to check and make sure that electrical circuits are not overloaded, have fire extinguishers and smoke detectors in your home.

Donation jars have been placed at Macy's Store and Deschutes Crossing for people who wish to donate to Macy and LaRocca. They are presently staying with Macy's sister, Marcia Macy.

The possibility of a mainstem Columbia River gillnet season for steelhead is being discussed by tribal, state and federal biologists.

Currently, steelhead are passing Bonneville Dam at a rate of 3-4,000 fish per day. As of July 18 over 61,000 steelhead had passed the dam.

Approximately 80 percent of these fish are of hatchery origin.

It appears that a season will occur in August but specific dates, season length and mesh restrictions have not been set.

Under one proposal a season would run from noon August 6 to noon August 9 and noon

August 13 to noon August 16. All of Zone 6 would be open and a maximum mesh restriction of 6 1/2 inches would be enforced.

More information will be available after July 25 from the Natural Resources Department.

On Wednesday, July 18, the Tribal Council made a tour of the existing Celilo Village. One of the main purposes was to view the existing facilities

within the area in which the board of directors are responsible for. The B.I.A. has been doing the maintenance and up keep of the utilities in the past.

Superintendent Topash and Cecil Seyler, Facilities Management Officer for the B.I.A. also made the trip giving Mr. Topash first hand briefing of the buildings and utilities maintained by the B.I.A.

The tour was for the Wyam Board and any other Tribal Council who was interested in the future of the Celilo Village. Others making the tour was the secretary, Jamey Smith, Tribal Council secretary Doris Miller, Chief Nick Kalama, Vernon Henry, Jacob Frank, Ellen Johnson and tribal member Larry Dick.
