This year a repetition of activities of the past as years ago at He He a rodeo was staged where everyone pitched in to repair the chutes and gather livestock and have a rodeo. There were no champions by any means as everyone was out to have a good time riding, roping and an occasional horse race. This is where a lot of boys got their start at riding in the rodeo's, a place where one could ride as many as he wished for the practice. With three sanctioned rodeos and the regional finals rodeo for Western States Indian Rodeo Association yet to come, the race for top-money winner of each event will become intense. WSIRA members will vie for the top two berths in each event for the right to represent WSIRA in the National Indian Finals Rodeo November 8, 9, 10 and 11 in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

This year the WSIRA Regional Finals will be held at Sparks, Nevada September 22 and 23. The regionals will be open to all members of WSIRA. The two top money winners of each event will represent WSIRA at National Finals. With the three sanctioned rodeos and regional points yet to be earned, it could turn into a real "horse race" to the finish.

The three remaining rodeos

are Spokane Indian Days Rodeo, at Wellpinit, Washington September 1 and 2; Pyramid Lake All Indian Rodeo, September 8 and 9 at Nixon, Nevada; and Schurz All Indian Rodeo at Schurz, Nevada September 22 and 23.
