

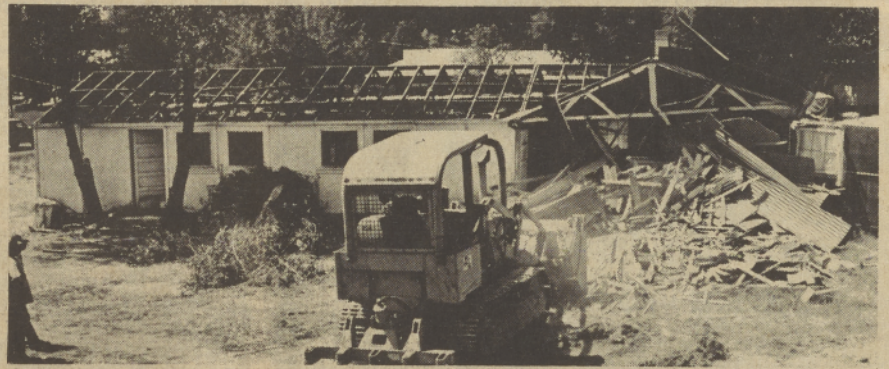
Community changed appearance in 1984



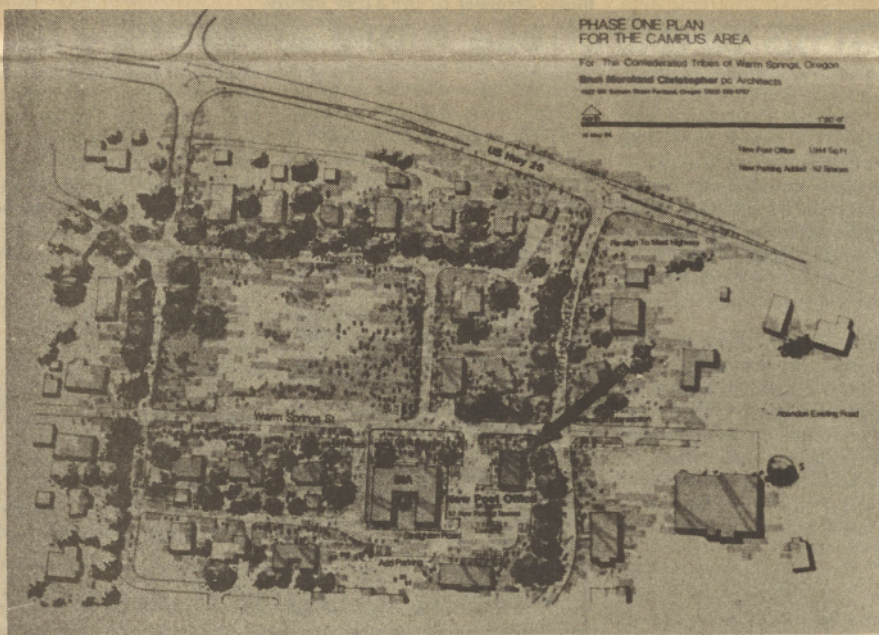
The Warm Springs Catholic Mission was rededicated on March 4 as the Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha Mission. In early years it was known as St. Williams.



Two homes were built by tribal members who were learning a skill under the Job Training Partnership Act. The homes were put up for sale to tribal members in the fall.



More than just a building burned with the Veterans of Foreign Wars hall in August. The building was destroyed because of "its age and possible unsafe condition." A parking lot has been placed on the site.

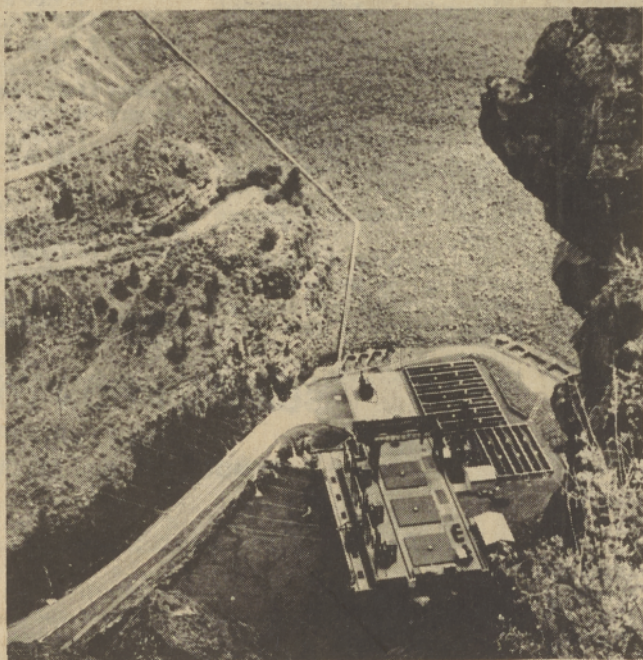


The final decision of where the new post office would be built in the community was decided during the summer. Construction of the post office will begin in 1985. It will be housed in a building by itself.

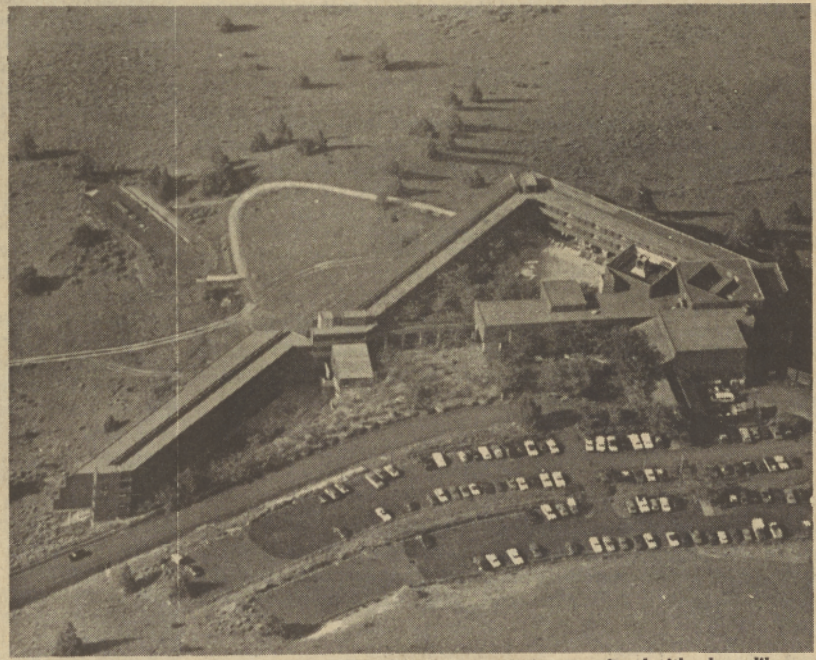


Construction began on improvements for the existing tribal jail. Tribal members rejected the idea of building a new facility in a referendum. The improvement is being funded by the Bureau of Indian Affairs who now holds title to the building. The project will be completed in the fall of 1985.

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Round Butte Dam (pictured) and Pelton Dam rental dispute between the Tribes and Portland General Electric was settled after many years. The Tribes were awarded \$18.150 million in back rent and annual payments beginning in 1985.



The Confederated Tribes and Economic Development Association were faced with a loan dilemma. The resort has not made a profit since the lodge was built in 1972.
