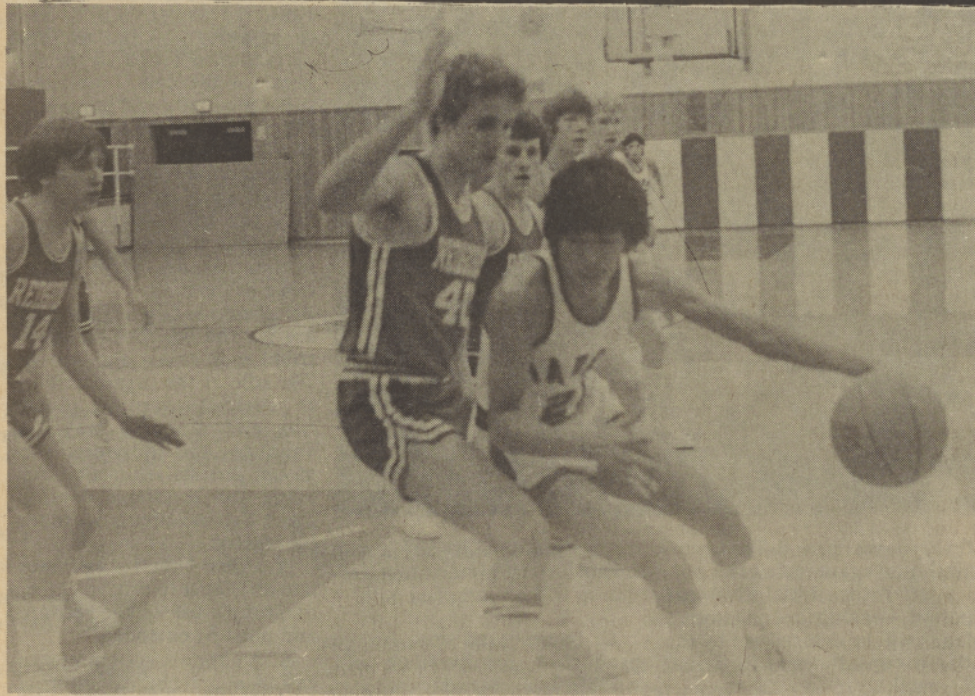

Bufs make sweep over Central

Scott Williams scored 11 points in the first half and 12 in the second half to top all scorers for the night to lead the Madras White Buffaloes past the Panthers of Central High School from Monmouth, Oregon. This making it a sweep for the two meetings of the two schools.

The Bufs jumped out to an early lead and right from the start they were in no serious trouble. They out scored the visitors 20-11, at the end of the first quarter. It was a game where all the boys saw some action especially in the second quarter the reserves carried the game pretty well as each player on the roster made statistics in one way or the other, by scoring points or making personal fouls.

Beside Williams sharp shooting, Ken Hausinger was four of seven from the free throw line and Madden was six of seven from the free throw line, all came in the second half. Nathan

Main added 14 points and had plenty of assists during the game. With his superior ball handling and play making kept Central off balance all evening long. Waldorf had five points and was one of the top rebounders in the game. Lowell Heydon also had five points and Dendauw three points.

Corey Amos was the high point man for Central with 12 points. There were a total of 17 fouls called on Central and 16 on Madras.

Now with pre-season games are all past, the conference games will be underway where a win really counts. The first league game for the Bufs is on the home court against the Vale Vikings, Saturday January 9, with the JV game getting underway at 5:45 and the Varsity game to start at 7:30 p.m. On the following Friday January 25, the Nyssa Bulldogs will come to town for the Bufs second league game with game times at

5:45 and 7:30 p.m. The next Tuesday there will be a non-league game in Madras between the Chemawa Braves and the Buffaloes with the JV game getting underway at 5:45 and the Varsity game at 7:30 p.m. The Chemawa Braves participate in the Capitol League around the Salem area. Chemawa has had its ups and downs lately and has been on the road of rebuilding. With the old school removed and the new school built just recently students are new, so the building of a good athletic program has had its problems.

After the Chemawa game the Bufs will be on the road for the next four games where they will travel to Mac Hi, Burns, Vale, and Nyssa. The next home game will be here on February 23, with Mac Hi, and on March 2, the final home game as well as the final game of the year and hopefully on to Eugene for the State tournament.

Girls win over Culver

The following weekend they will be home when they will host the Burns Hilanders with game time at 5:45 and 7:30 p.m.

Well next the girls will settle down for their own league games which will be starting in the near future and this experience might do good for them.

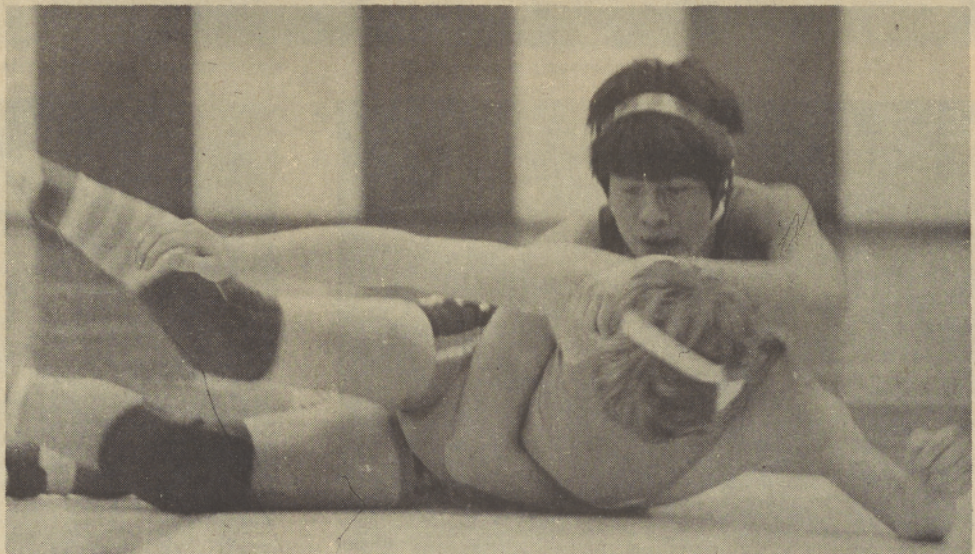
