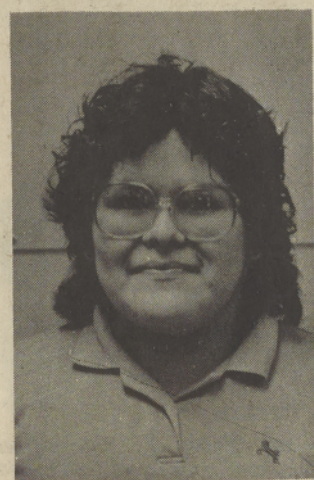

Information could reduce number of victims

While watching television recently, an individual whose seven-year-old son was abducted and murdered was explaining the mental anguish he had to deal with as a result. His hope was that others be spared the experience through learning from his mistakes.

He choked with emotion as he said that it's far more important for a child to learn how to avoid child molesters and not to go with strangers than it is to know their multiplication tables or the name of the first president of the United States. Through educating our children we will reduce the number of victims.

During the same week a program dealing extensively with the same subject was presented

on another channel. Sexual abuse of children has been getting much well-deserved attention in recent months as evidenced by similar programs, workshops, and meetings of concerned parents and agencies. Public awareness and education of parents and children will have an impact on this shocking problem along with time behind bars for offenders.

There is evidence which indicates that those who sexually abuse children were themselves victims when they were children. We must do something to break this chain. I think education is the something which we can do.

On occasion, school officials are approached by irate parents complaining about sex education spoiling their child's innocence. I imagine the school officials thinking something like this: (but probably not saying

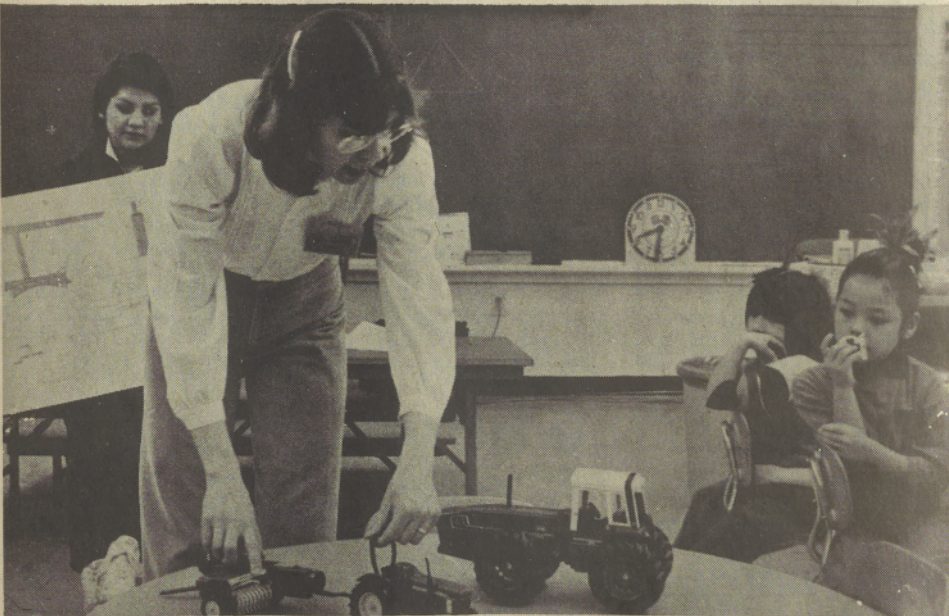
it) "We'd rather be the ones teaching your child than have a child molester teach them."

Parents in the Warm Springs community will be pleased to know that there is an effort to educate children about this subject.

Following the sexual abuse workshop at Kah-Nee-Ta, Mrs. Dawn Smith compiled a wealth of information on this subject, organizing it into a thirteen-page handout to inform parents of guidelines for providing sex education to children—important points to tell your child, facts about child sexual abuse, and identifying symptoms of sexual abuse. Her boys and girls took part in discussions on good, bad and secret touching. When I recall some of their responses to questions about touching and going with strangers, I feel relieved as the chances of them becoming victims have been reduced.
