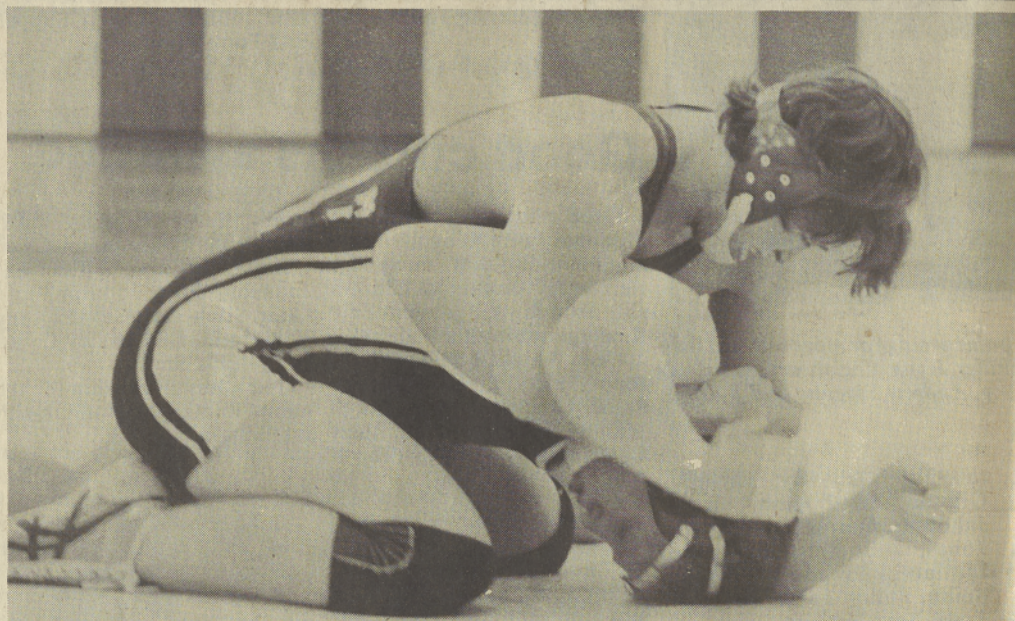

Boys and girls No. 1 in AP polls

Creswell, who has been leading the prep polls all year suffered its first defeat to the hands of Junction City, giving them a 15-1 record and topping them from the No. 1 spot which they maintained all year long. Another strong contender, North Valley of Grants Pass with a 16-1 record moved into the No. 2 spot behind the Madras White Buffaloes. They support a 16-0 record and the No. 1 spot in the latest Associated Press Oregon Prep basketball polls as of 2/12/85. Creswell fell to the No. 3 position.

The other teams who follow are No. 4 Seaside (13-2); 5 Pleasant Hill (14-3); 6 Myrtle Point (13-2); 7 Astoria (12-3); 8 Central Linn (12-3); 9 LaSalle (13-3); and 10 Burns (11-4).

The path is getting tougher down the home stretch of the basketball season and its most likely all these teams could see action against one another during the state tournament. Madras, North Valley, Creswell, Pleasant Hill and LaSalle were all seen at the State tournament last year with LaSalle coming out the champion.

It's always interesting to see who makes it to the state tournament. Sometimes the polls each week don't mean a thing, although it's always great to see the favorite team rated No. 1. This gives all the teams a goal to shoot for possibly knocking off the No. 1 team in the state.

In the AAA class there are just two undefeated teams who are No. 1 ranked: Corvallis with a 10-0 and No. 2 Parkrose with 17-0. The Madras White Buffaloes are the only AA team with a 16-0 record so far this year.

Henley is now in the No. 2 position; No. 3, Glide (14-2); 4, Seaside (16-1); 5, Central (13-2); 6, Nyssa (14-3); 7, Brookings (15-2); 8, Philomath (12-3); 9, Marist (13-3); 10, Siuslaw (12-4).

The girls have a good chance to wrap up the Greater Oregon League title and a trip to state with only three more league games. Nyssa and Mac Hi come to town February 15-16. The Buff girls play their last league game on the road as they travel to meet the Burns Hilanders, Saturday February 23. Nyssa gave the Buffs their toughest test so far this year on the road where they pulled out a close win to keep their perfect record.
