## One more win for GOL title

Scott Williams, with his 18 point performance, propelled the White Buffalo attack to their 18th consecutive win for the season over the Mac Hi Pioneers, who found it difficult to find any kind of a path to any new frontier.

But the pesky Pioneers made things a little difficult in the first quarter, as the lead changed hands several times. It wasn't until the final moments started ticking away to end the first quarter that the Buffs slowly chipped away to build a slim lead which put them ahead to stay 24-18.

It was Williams who kept the pressure on Mac Hi as he popped in ten points in the first period. Two other Buff players hit with pay dirt accuracy as

Ken Hausinger and Ryan Smith contributed 12 points each during the game. Hausinger led all rebounders and Ryan Smith did a good job stepping in for regular Ray Wladorf who has been sidelined under doctor's care. Ryan did a bang-up job on both offense and defense hitting six of seven from the field and also getting his share of rebounds. Hopefully Waldorf will be back in good health for the upcoming schedule which will be the final league game with the Burns Hilanders here in Madras, on March 2, and then on to the state playoffs March 12 through 16. A win over the Hilanders will wrap up another GOL conference title for Blinco and his Buffalo basketball team and the No. 1 seed to the state tournament.

The victory over Mac Hi comes with no surprise with the support from the rest of the team. Nathan Main, the ball handler, set up a lot of plays making good assists and also scoring ten points of his own. Jay Madden attracted a lot of attention from the defensive side of the Pioneer defense but he managed to get eight points and had several blocked shots on Mac Hi.

Coming off the bench full of enthusiasm were Ron Bain,

Lowell Haydon, and Bobby Sjolund. Bain collected 11 points Haydon seven and Sjolund two. David Dendaw and Don Bagley saw plenty of action also.

The final home game is with Burns Saturday March 12. Some believe it will be a barn burner and it could be just that. Burns always comes to town all fired

up especially from the two set backs handed them by the Buffs on previous meetings. The Hilanders have lost four games this year, two were at a tournament in Idaho, when one of their key players was on the injured list and two to the Buffs. In the first game, the Buffs won with a comfortable score during

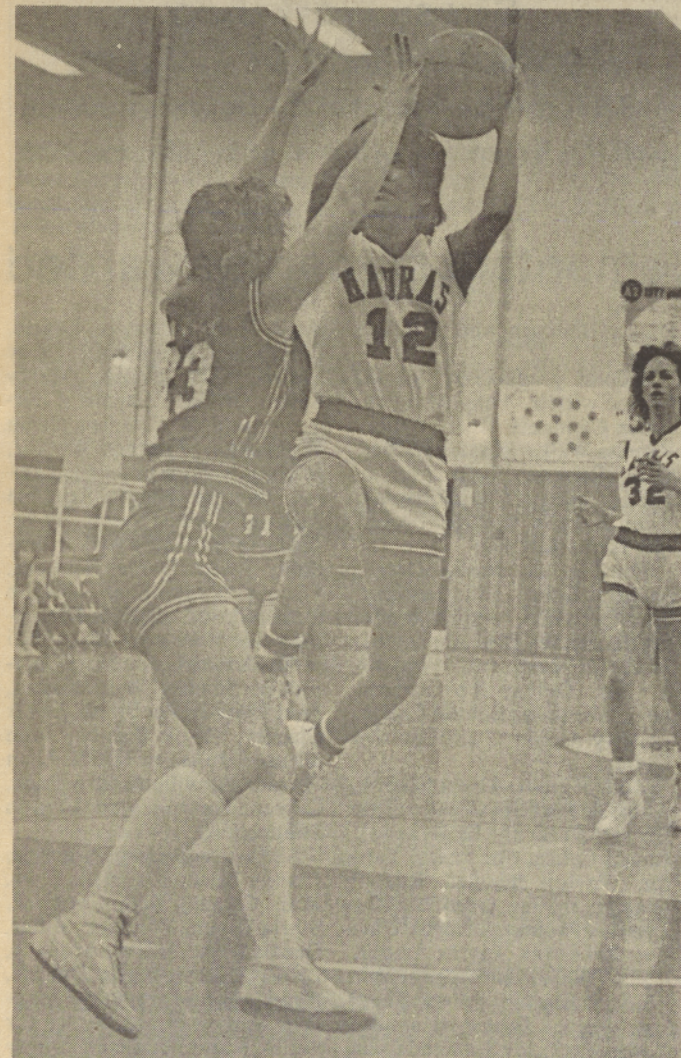
the Holiday tourney, but their last meeting the score was much closer.

If the Burns Hilanders should win this would create a tie for the GOL title and there would have to be a play-off to determine the champion. But a Madras win will settle everything and Burns will go to state the No. 2 seed from the GOL.

## Redistricting applications submitted

Three class AAA district schools have applied for a class change to District No. 7 Class AA beginning with the 1986-87 school year. If determined eligible by the Oregon School Activities Association, Baker, Crook County and Ontario would join Burns, Madras, Milton-Freewater, Nyssa and Vale.

Every four years schools have the opportunity to change district classes if a rise or fall in school population warrants it. Nine schools have asked for AA league class changes.

District No. 7-Baker (from AAA), Burns, Crook County (from AAA), Madras, Milton Freewater, Nyssa, Ontario (from AAA), Vale.

District No. 8-Cascade, Chemawa (to A) North Marion, Salem Academy, Silverton (from AAA) Stayton, Sweet Home, Woodburn.
