Marathon planned for April 27

The Kah-Nee-Ta Mini-Marathon will be held at Kah-Nee-Ta Resort Saturday, April 27. Starting time for all runs is 10:00 a.m.

Deadline for entries is 9:00 a.m. the day of the race. Entry fee is \$7.00.

All entrants will receive a T-shirt, swim ticket for the Kah-Nee-Ta Village pool and a raffle ticket. First place male and fe-

male and first place in all age divisions will receive awards.

Age categories include: 13 and under, ages 14-18, 19-29, 30-39, 40-older male and female.

The major run of 13.1 miles starts at the Kah-Nee-Ta Village and blend into rolling hills to a slight downhill run on a gravel road with blacktop the rest of the way. There will be hill climb before the finish.

The 6.0 mile run will be flat with one big hill. The last half of the run will be on dirt road.

The 3.0 mile run is on blacktop with the last half on dirt road.

Jenifer Jim of the Inter-Tribal Sports girls team and Brooker Jones of the Oregon Travelers team were voted the most valuable players in their divisions during the first annual W.S. Tribes team basketball tournament held in the Community Center April 5, 6, and 7. Both Jim and Jones received Pendleton blankets with the inscriptions, "Most Valueable Player."

There were five womens and eight mens teams playing in the tournament which started Friday afternoon at 2:30 p.m. and concluding Sunday evening.

The Inter-Tribal Sports girls team went through undefeated to win the championship beating the Hartlines of the Yakima Nation 70-60. This was the se-

cond meeting between the two teams where the Inter Tribal Sports (ITS) won both games, with the score in the first game 47-42.

In getting into the championship game I.T.S. beat the W.S. team 81-42, the Yakima Nation 97-22 and Hartlines 47-42, to remain the only undefeated team. Hartlines lost one to I.T.S. but made their way through the backdoor for the right to play for the championship.

Kim Manion led the I.T.S. team in scoring with her 21 points, Jenifer Jim added 20, Debbie Rios 12, Fran Moses 10, Jolene Estimo 4, Lorraine Suppah two and Ellen Taylor one. Rose Bud Mardell led the Hartlines scoring with 20, Ada Bil-

ley 17, Desi Smiscon 16, Connie Blodgett five, and Jody Pimms two.

Hartlines led at half time 37-36, but the ITS team came back strong in the third quarter to regain the lead for good. The All-Stars selected were Trina Sue of Portland; Vicky Snyder of W.S. Team; Rosebud Mandrell, Hartlines; Jenifer Jim ITS; Desi Lous Smiscon, Hartlines; Kim Manion, ITS; Fran Moses, ITS; J. Sarge, Yakima Nation and Lana Shike W.S. Lana also received the Ms. Hustle award and the sportsmanship went to the Yakima Nation which was the game ball. The final results were Inter-Tribal Sports first; Hartlines of Yakima Nation second and Warm Springs third.

Wrestlers placing in this meet may petition for qualification on the Oregon National Team. That tournament is held July 15-20 in Cedar Falls, Iowa.

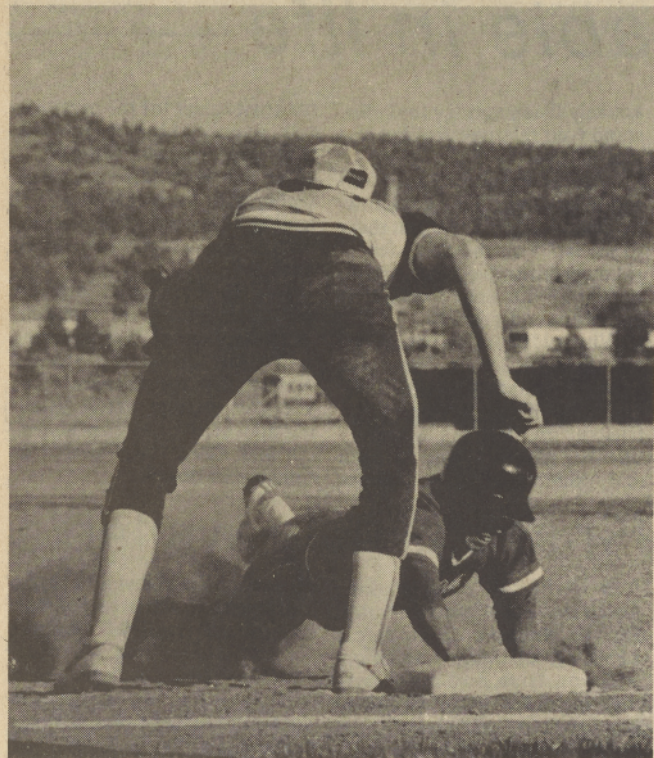
