The Indian Education Title IV, Part A parent committee will hold a meeting Tuesday, May 7 in the Headstart room at the Community Center to elect ten parents to serve on the committee. Chairperson Jerry Sampson asks that anyone interested in serving on the committee attend the meeting which will start at 7 p.m.

The committee is comprised of 22 members and each year, ten new members are elected to

serve a two year term. Federal guidelines require that the committee be comprised of parents of Indian children who are attending kindergarten through twelfth grade. A high school student is also elected to serve on the board.

Sampson said the committee is looking for parents who are willing to become involved and remain involved with the committee during their two-year terms.

New bail, bond procedures implemented

Effective March 25, 1985, the following procedures were implemented regarding bail and bonding for defendants appearing in Tribal Court on criminal charges.

After arrest and prior to arraignment, a defendant may post a cash bail in accordance with the bail schedule (which was revised 3/15/85). Signature bonds before arraignment will be in emergency situations only and will be up to the discretion of the judge on duty.

If a defendant is unable to post a cash bail before arraignment, then the following procedures will be followed:

1. Defendant appears for arraignment on the second ar-

raignment after arrest.

2. Defendant enters a plea:
 - a.) Guilty plea-sentencing (or)
 - (b) Not guilty plea-trial scheduled defendant served.
3. Bond or bail amount will be set.
 - a.) Defendant will be required to bring bondsmen to arraignment where the presiding judge will determine if they are reliable bondsmen. The clerk will call to the receptionist and ask for the rapp cards on the prospective bondsmen. The prosecution and legal aide will be given an opportunity to submit recommendations whether the bond should be the full amount or reduced. A bond agreement

will be signed and copies are distributed (or).

- b.) Defendant will be required to post bail before being released from jail. The prosecutor and legal aide will be given opportunity to submit recommendations on the bail amount (or).
- c.) Defendant may be released on own recognizance bond if it is decided by the presiding judge.

4. The clerk will put on the jailkeeper order the type of release that has been ordered.
 - a.) Eligibility for bail or bond will be noted in the Temporary Commitment Order by circling bail or bond and putting the bail or bond amount.
 - b.) The date and time of the

judge or jury trial will be indicated on the jailkeeper order in the temporary commitment section and on the bond agreement for the defendant to appear for trial.

5. Defendant will be taken to jail.
 - a.) Defendant will be released if a bond agreement has been signed (or)
 - b.) Defendant will post cash bail at the jail and will be given a receipt. The bail money will be forwarded to the court compliance clerk pending the disposition of the case and then the defendant may be released pending trial.

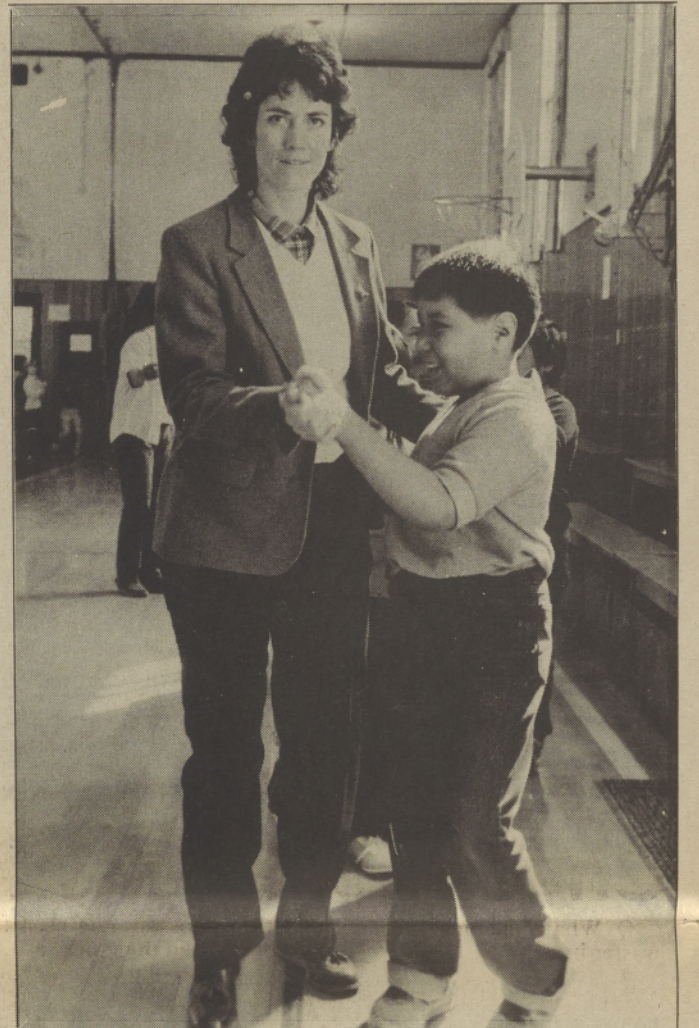
Notice of public meetings

Lava lands opens

Lava Lands Visitor Information Center opens for the 1985 season on April 28. The facilities will be open seven days a week from 8:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

The center will continue these hours until September 29, when it will be open seven day per week from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The facility closes for the year on October 27, 1985.

Lava River Cave opens tentatively May 12 to mid-September, from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Although the Cave opening is scheduled for May 12, this is dependant entirely upon the amount of ice accumulated in the Cave. The Cave will close for the season September 15, 1985.

Lava Cast Forest will be accessible by early June, weather conditions permitting.

The Lava Lands Visitor Center, Lava Butte and Lava Cast Forest areas are free to the public. Lava River Cave charges a \$.75 admission for individuals 12 years of age and older. Lantern rentals (\$.50 each) are also available at the Cave. Proceeds from the entrance fees and the Lantern rentals help defray operating costs.

Spring musical program May 8

The Warm Springs Elementary school will present their annual Spring concert on Wednesday, May 8 at the school gym at 1:15 p.m.

The program, "We are the World," will feature Songs from Many Lands. The first grade will sing two French songs in french. The second grade will do two songs from Germany featuring a number of soloists and instrumentals. Songs from Australia with a play of "Waltzing Matilda" will be presented by the third grade classes. The national dance of Israel, the horah will be demonstrated by the fourth grades, as well as two songs with solos and instrumentals. The fifth grade will feature Russia with two songs. The recorder player, an instrument similar to the flute will be played. Jamaica will be represented by the sixth grade with a medley of songs plus students will sing the Limbo song and demonstrate the dance.

The finale of the afternoon will be the entire student body singing the recent popular hit, "We are the World."

Action taken on ATV safety

Deeply concerned over the sharp increase in serious injuries and fatalities with 3-wheel, all-terrain vehicles (ATVs)—The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) today unanimously approved a seven-step plan of action. In the past three years there have been more than 100 deaths and over 100,000 injuries related to ATVs. Over 750,000 ATVs are expected to be sold in the United States this year, a figure likely to increase in the years to come.

The Commission announced that it will publish and Advanced Notice of Proposed Rulemak-

ing, the first in several years. The other six steps of the action plan include:

1. Conduct a hazard analysis to obtain detailed information on ATV use.
2. Undertake an engineering, human factors and medical analysis of ATVs and their use.
3. Hold a series of public hearings in five locations around the U.S. to solicit user and consumer input.
4. Monitor the development of voluntary standards of ATVs, pending review of future date and industry activity.
