Presbyterian church to observe Simnasho Sunday

The Warm Springs Presbyterian Church has a history that dates back to 1874. It was organized originally by the United Presbyterian Church of North America and through unions since that time has been supported by the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. and now by the recently established Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) At times the Presbyterian services were held at three locations; Seekseequa, Simnasho and Warm Springs. The buildings at Seekseequa and Simnasho can still be seen by visiting those areas.

At least during part of the history of the program, pastors were located at both Simnasho and Warm Springs. Our records are not complete because of the loss of the original record book some years ago but it would appear that the work at Seekseequa was carried out by the Pastor or laypersons from Warm Springs.

Eventually, because of the cost the separate pastorates were combined and the Pastor located at the present location of the Warm Springs Presbyterian Church and manse. The time that the services were discontinued at Simnasho, the reason for that decision and the deed of the property to the Confederated Tribes is not known to the present writer.

In recent months some interest has been shown in reactivating the services at Simnasho and this request was referred to

Magazine to begin publication

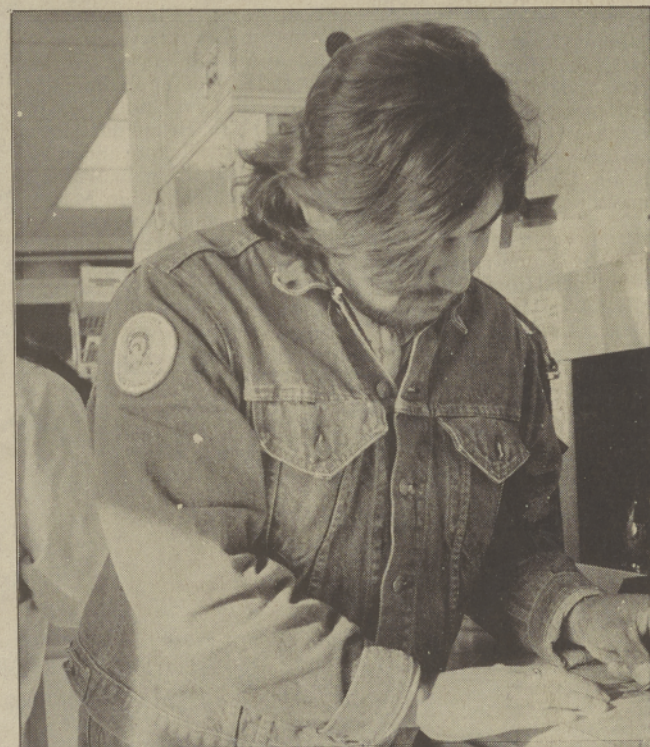

Headquartered in Bailey, Colorado, the magazine will be attempting to reach the nationwide Indian rodeo and stock industries audience through informative and entertaining coverage of the Indian rodeo, horse, and cattle industry throughout North America. In the process, the magazine will be focusing in on individuals of outstanding achievement in the business.

Utilizing a professionally printed, multi-colored product, the American Indian Rodeo Cowboy will fill the current void in positive, consistent coverage of the Indian rodeo and stock industries. While there are nine Indian regional rodeo associations as well as thousands of Indian tribes and individuals involved in the stock industry throughout North America, news articles and features in traditional western magazines have been practically nonexistent.

The American Indian Rodeo Cowboy's start-up issue, a 44-page effort with a total printing of 4,000, will feature the 1984 Indian National Finals Rodeo Champions, the 1984 Indian Rodeo Man of the Year, and the 1985 Miss Indian Rodeo North America. The magazine's purchase prices have been established at \$1.75 per single copy, \$16.00 per annual subscription, and a special discount rate of \$12 per year for Indian rodeo association members (plus a 3 1/2 percent tax for Colorado residents). Elders to be honored at powwow

Eugene—One of the largest Native American powwows in western Oregon will be held Friday through Sunday, May 10-12, at the University of Oregon.

Representatives of about 20 tribes from throughout the Northwest will be at the 17th annual Powwow, sponsored by the UO Native American Student Union. All events will be held at MacArthur Court and are open to the public without charge.

"The public can participate in circle dances, which are thought of as friendship dances, to share our culture," says Lori Edmo, a co-director of NASU a junior journalism major from Fort Hall, Idaho. "NASU is sponsoring the powwow to help preserve our cultural heritage and to help non-Indians better understand Native American cultural traditions."

Edmo adds that Native American elders will be honored during the powwow which last

year attracted more than 300 people.

"The elders are knowledgeable of tribal traditions and are respected among the Native American people," she says.

The powwow will begin at 8 p.m. Friday with the Grand Entry, featuring traditional dances, songs and Native Americans in colorful tribal regalia.

The powwow continues from noon to 5 p.m. Saturday, with Inter-Tribal and competitive

dancing and exhibits. The evening program features a Grand Entry at 8 p.m. and dancing until midnight.

Events for Sunday will be announced at the powwow.

Other activities include a donation drawing, and authentic arts and crafts will be on display.

featured focusing on such topics as self-esteem losing weight, make-up, you as a person. Call Lucinda Green at 553-1161, ext. 243 for more information.

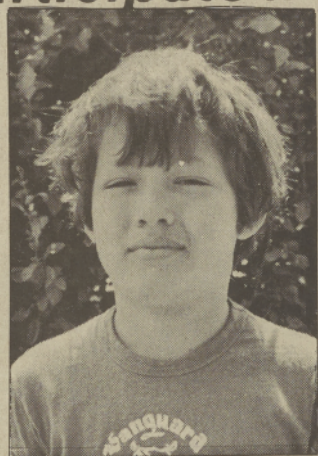
Parents meeting scheduled
