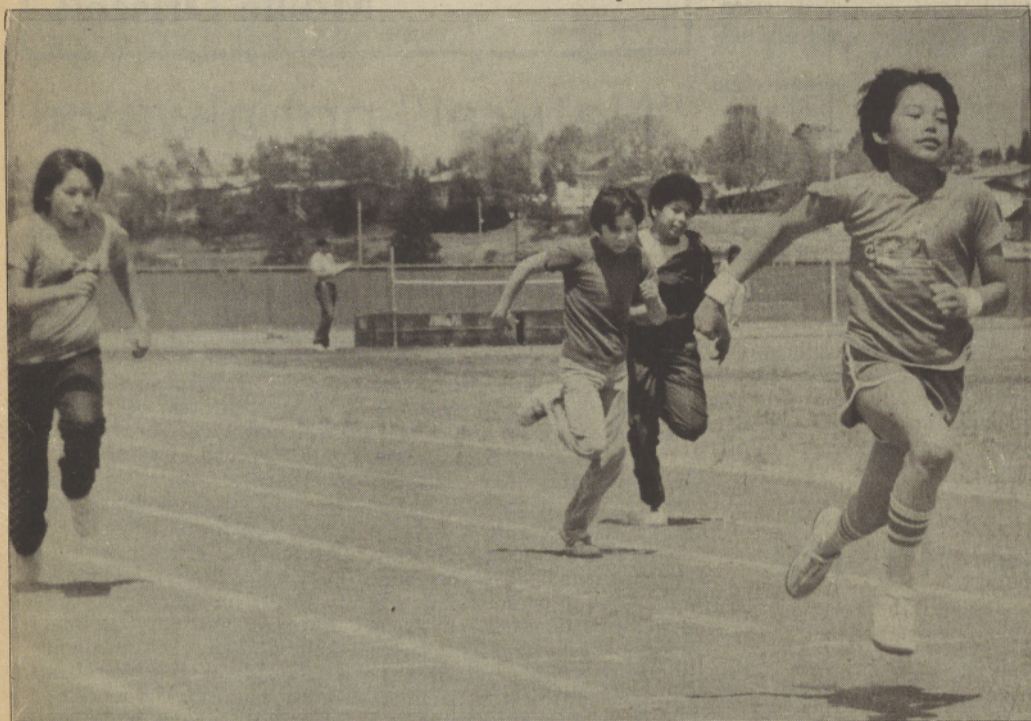

Grade schools compete in events Pi-Ume-Sha June 21-23

The Annual inter-school track and field meet was held May 24th at the Madras High School track between Warm Springs and Madras fifth and sixth graders. Following are the standings and results of Warm Springs boys and girls in the eight different events.

Sixth grade results

50-meter dash: Rachelle Beetles, with the time of 7.61, placed first for sixth grade girls. Otis Johnson, 7.50; Aaron Squally and Sonny Jackson placed fourth, fifth, and sixth respectively.

100-meter dash: Angela Smith, 14.56 and Vernice Switzler, 16.14 placed first and fourth.

220-meter: Otis Johnson, with the time of 30.43, took first place.

880-meter: Taking first place was Angela Smith with the time of 2:59.25 and fourth was Vernice Switzler, 3:36.24. In the boys division: Michael Cranford, 2:48.99, Tony Valde, 2:50.74 and Sonny Jackson, 2:53.60 placed third, fourth and fifth.

Relay: Rachelle Beetles, Kami Wahnetah, Morningstar Johnson and Rhonda Ike placed third with the time of 1:07.51 and fourth was taken by Harold Thomas, Angela Smith, Emily Lucei and Cheryl Suppah by the time of 1:07.68. Third place for the boys in the time of 1:03.19 was Otis Johnson, Victor Smith, Michael Cranford and Frank Kalama.

Softball Throw: Once again Rachelle Beetles placed well with the throw of 132-1 which gave her third place. Placing sixth was Carol Miller, 107-5. Tony Valde, 219 and Sonny Jackson, 144 placed first and fourth for

Long Jump: Wynema Wolfe placed sixth with a jump of 9'4". Otis Johnson's jump of 12'10" earned him a first, while Sonny Jackson took third with a jump of 11'3".

660-meter: Rosanna Jackson placed fourth with a time of 2:19.78; Vernon Suppah placed sixth in the time of 2:20.66.

High Jump: Again Rosanna Jackson left her mark in this competition by placing sixth, Scott Moses, third place; Jerrell Switzler, fifth and Tony Fuentes, sixth for the boys.

Softball Throw: Placing third was Rosanna Jackson, 94'6". Cara Shadley, 87'4" and Martha Johns, 83'3" took fifth and sixth place. Joel Colazo, 135', placed second; Mike Kalama, 130'2", third and Kanim Smith, 129', took fifth.

Pi-Ume-Sha Rodeo June 22-23

The tenth annual Pi-Ume-Sha rodeo will be held at the new Warm Springs Rodeo Association rodeo grounds, located in the Industrial Park, (on Hwy 3) June 22 and 23. Signs will be posted directing contestants and spectators to the new arena.

Eleven events will be featured at the two-day show. The events are: saddle bronc, bareback, bull riding, calf roping, team roping, steer wrestling, barrel racing, wild cow milking, wild horse race, junior barrels and calf riding. Entry fee for events is \$40 with the exception of team roping which is \$40 per man, wild horse which is \$75 per team, junior barrels and calf riding which is \$12. Added purses will be \$300 for all events with the exception of junior barrels and calf riding with added purses of \$50. Bull riding will be limited to the first 24 signed up. The

wild horse race is limited to the first eight teams signed up. In calf riding, the limit will be to the first 16 signed up. In team roping it will be two loops, enter twice. The events will be one go with the exception of wild horse race with two goes.

A contestant fee of \$7 per event will be charged with the exceptions being an added \$1 fee in barrels for the electric eye fee and for junior events of barrels and calf riding only \$2.

The books will open June 18 and close June 19 from 1 p.m. to 8 p.m. both days. All phone entries must have a current WSIRA card. Mail entries must reach the rodeo office no later than June 19. Fees must be paid by cash or money orders, no personal checks will be accepted.

A Matt Wewa Memorial Buckle will be given to the winner of the Saddle Bronc event. The buckle has been donated by Wewa's Family. Wewa was a well known roper and bronc rider in Northwest. His father Jazzy Wewa stated they selected saddle bronc because it was a favorite event of Matt's.

A western dance will be held at the Kah-Nee-Ta Lodge on Saturday, June 22 with music provided by El Coochise and the Country Express from 9 p.m. to 2 a.m.

For the "early-bird," a buckaroo breakfast will start at 6 a.m. on Sunday, June 23 at the Agency Longhouse until 10:30 a.m. Cost for the breakfast will be \$3 a plate.

Exercise your dancing feet

Requiring skill and stamina, the art of competition dancing at a powwow can be easily classified as a sport. Contestants spend many hours practicing to prepare for the powwow season. The Pi-Ume-Sha Treaty Days celebration will draw many dancers from throughout the United States and Canada. Pi-Ume-Sha will feature a number of contests during the three-day powwow, June 21, 22 and 23, for the throngs of powwow dancers.

Friday, June 21 will start the powwow with a grand entry at the powwow grounds followed by the little girls round dance (6 years and under), little boys war dance (6 years and under), little girls round dance (7-11 years old), and the little boys war dance (7-11 years old). On Saturday, June 22 a traditional dress parade will be held on Warm Springs Street at the Warm Springs Agency at 10:30 a.m. The afternoon session of

dancing will begin at 1 p.m. with the grand entry; featured contests will be the teen girls round dance (12-16 years old), teen boys fancy dance (12-16 years old), "Kussa" round dance (50 years and older), "Ol" warriors war dance (50 years and older). The evening session will feature the girls buckskin graceful war dance (16 and under), boys straight dance (16 years and under), women's team round dance (17 years and older), and the men's team dance open contest. On the final day, Sunday, June 23 the men's straight dance

(17 and older), women's individual straight war dance (17 and older), men's individual fancy war dance (17 and older) and the women's fancy shawl dance (17 and older). During the contests five semi-finalists will be picked at each session for men and women individual for the finals.

Indian stick games will start on Friday with the tournament on Saturday.

In the senior division as of June 5, the girls are in a pretty good position with a league record of three wins and 0 losses.

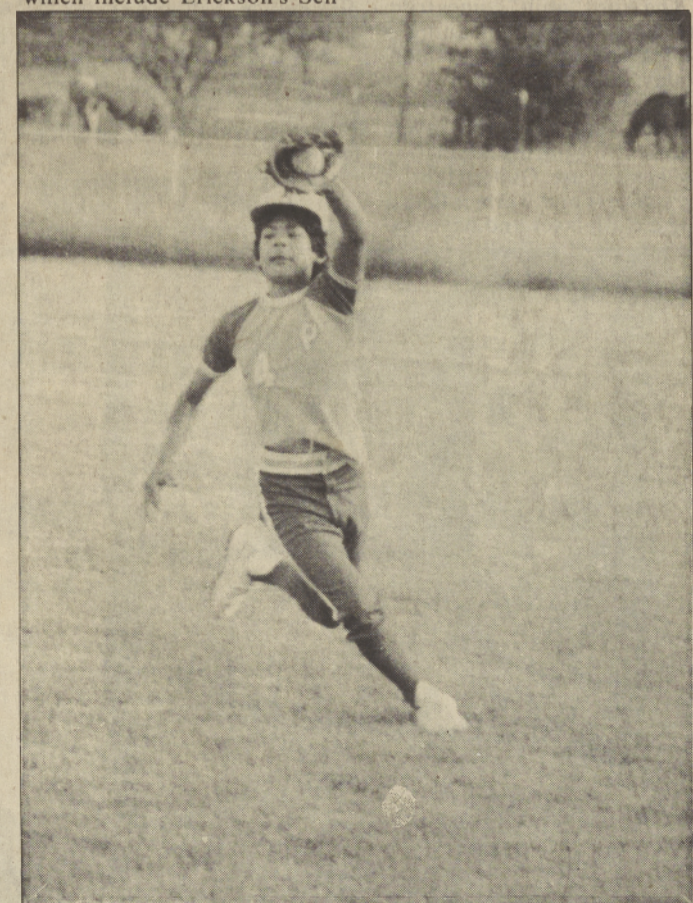
