

Field Day planned

The Jefferson County Crops and Experiment Station Field Day has been slated for June 13 states Fred Crowe and Martin Zimmerman, OSU Station Director and Extension Agent, respectively. This annual event is sponsored by the Jefferson county Seed Growers, the Central Oregon Peppermint Growers and Central Oregon Wheat

Growers.

Focus of the tour will be on new crops including flower seeds and onions; production practices in wheat, peppermint, grass seed and irrigation innovations. A new gravity pressure irrigation system will be included in the stops.

The afternoon will be the Experiment Station Field Day

which will focus on cereal varieties, hard red spring wheat research and garlic diseases. The expanded research capabilities of the station will be shown.

A no host lunch stop will be included in the itinerary. A bus will be provided by the sponsors. The tour will leave the Jefferson County Courthouse parking lot at 9:00 a.m.

Team works to inform public

The use of a team in Forest Management is not new. For many years, teams of men have fought forest fires, burned slash,

managed control burns and taught the public about fire prevention. But in recent years the concept of team work has

expanded. Locally, teams consist of foresters from different forest agencies in the Central Oregon area.

To enhance forest safety, Smokey the Bear makes annual visits throughout the nation. Each spring, Smokey's visits at Warm Springs have become a ritual for first graders. Foresters usually walk into the classroom and the teacher introduces the children to the team members. Students then break into small groups with a forester asking the children questions about fire and fire prevention. The group sessions are then followed by a short film strip to review what was discussed in the group. As the film strip comes to an end into the room walks Smokey the Bear, much to the delight of the first graders. Smokey presents the class with a certificate and greets the class.

The entire program was the team work of men who work in the area of fire prevention and suppression. Team members are selected from different departments of the various agencies. At the Warm Springs Grade School team members from the Ochoco National Forest Service, Deschutes National Forest Service, Warm Springs Bureau of Indian Affairs Fire Management and North Unit Fire Department. The team concept has become popular and necessary with the recent budget cuts for the various agencies. The working together of the agencies has enabled them to keep a number of programs they would have had to cut if the total cost was charged to them. It is one step further in the team concept.

Wapato nominated as representative

The Columbia River Intertribal Fish Commission (CRITFC) is pleased to announce that CRITFC Executive Director Tim Wapato has been nominated by Secretary of State George Shultz to represent the Northwest's 24 treaty fishing Indian tribes on the United States Section of the U.S.-Canada Pacific Salmon Commission.

The Commission is the central decision-making body created by and charged with implementing the United States-Canada Pacific Salmon Treaty, which was ratified this past March.

The U.S. Section of the Commission will have four delegates—a representative from the federal government, one to represent both Oregon and Washington, one from Alaska, and the treaty tribes' representatives. In

The Fourth of July parade begins at 11:00 a.m. Registration closes at 10:00 a.m.

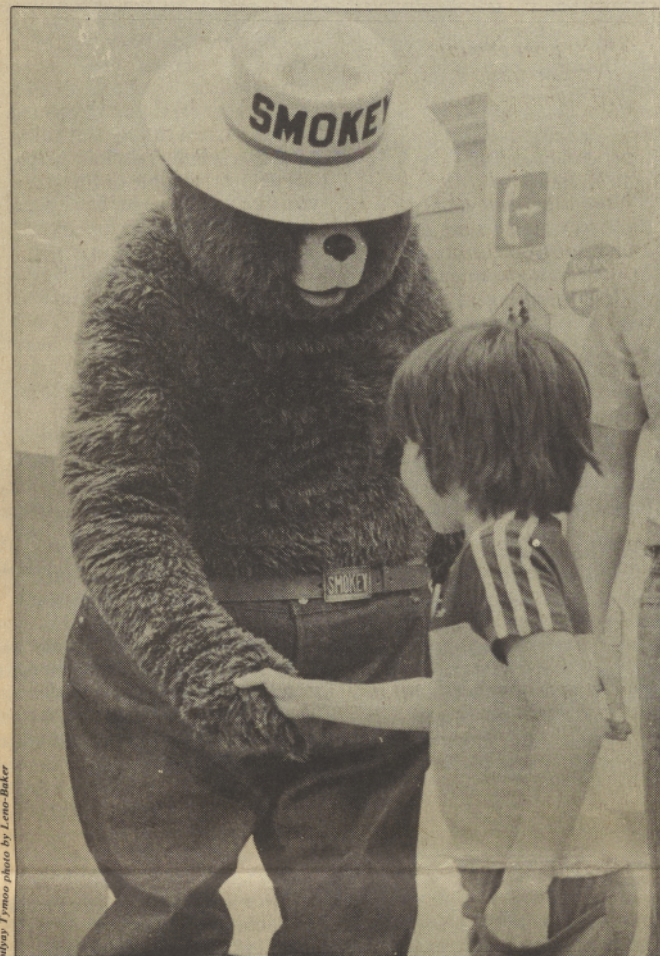

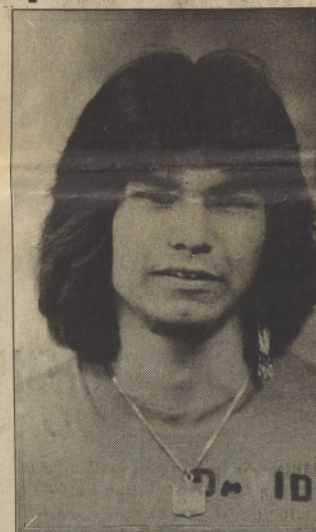

Eighteen-year-old enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, James Lee Wolfe, Jr., died at this residence May 31, 1985.

Wolfe was born October 3, 1966 in Prineville, Oregon to James and Beulah (Switzler) Wolfe. He attended grade school in Warm Springs, the eighth grade at the Chemawa Indian School in Salem, tenth grade at Inter-Mountain Indian School in Brigham City, Utah; and Madras High School. Wolfe had participated in Warm Springs baseball, basketball and the boxing club.

He is survived by his father, James Wolfe, Sr.; his mother Beulah Wahpat; nine brothers,

Lee James of Wapato, Anthony Wolfe of Yakima, Cyril, Kanet, Norman, Kosie, Sam and James Lee III Wolfe of Warm Springs and Gary Wahpat of Warm Springs; three sisters, Marena and Marissa Wolfe of Warm Springs and Jamie Lee of Wapato; a step-sister, Wynema Wolfe of Warm Springs, a grandmother Elvina Switzler of Warm Springs; and numerous aunts, uncles and cousins.
