The Jefferson County All-Stars softball team have started practice for the district softball tournament which will get underway Wednesday, July 10, at Culver.

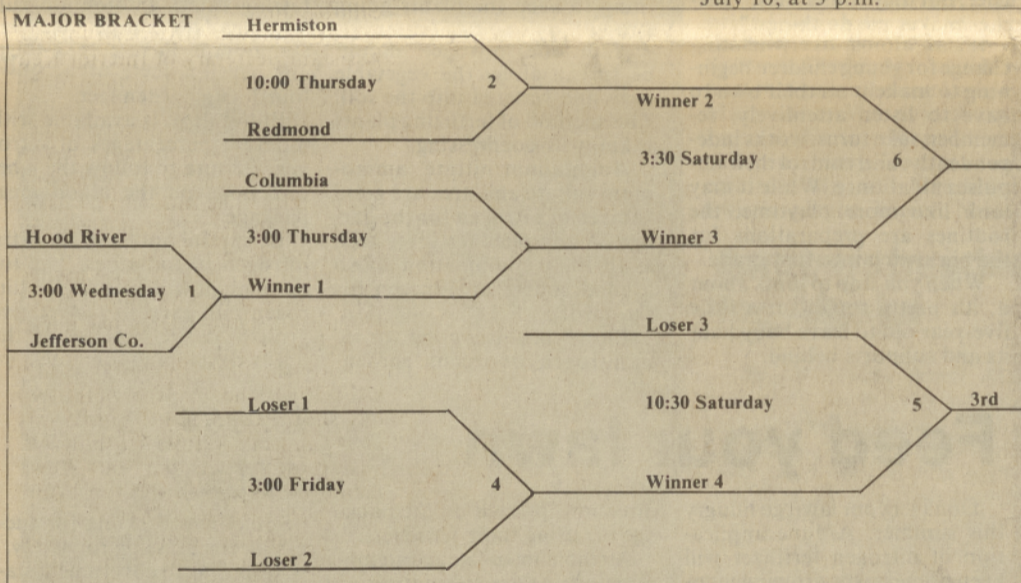

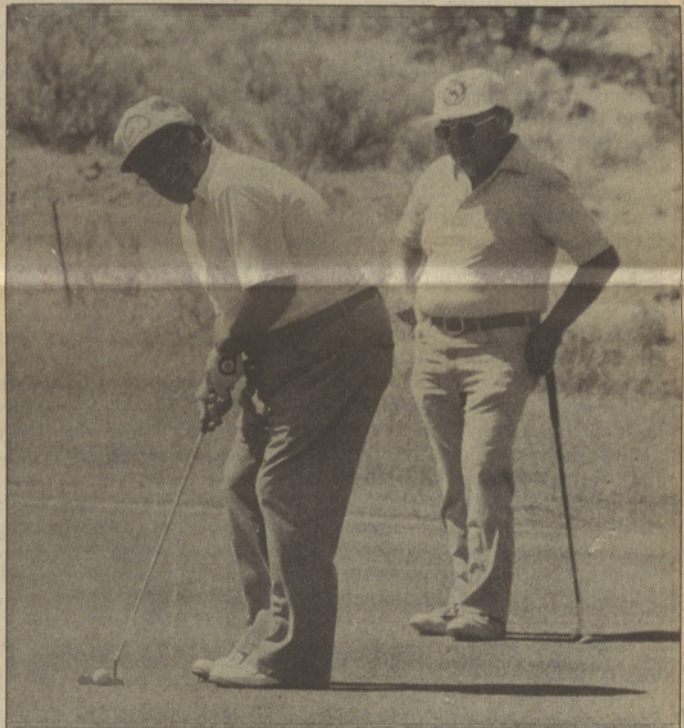

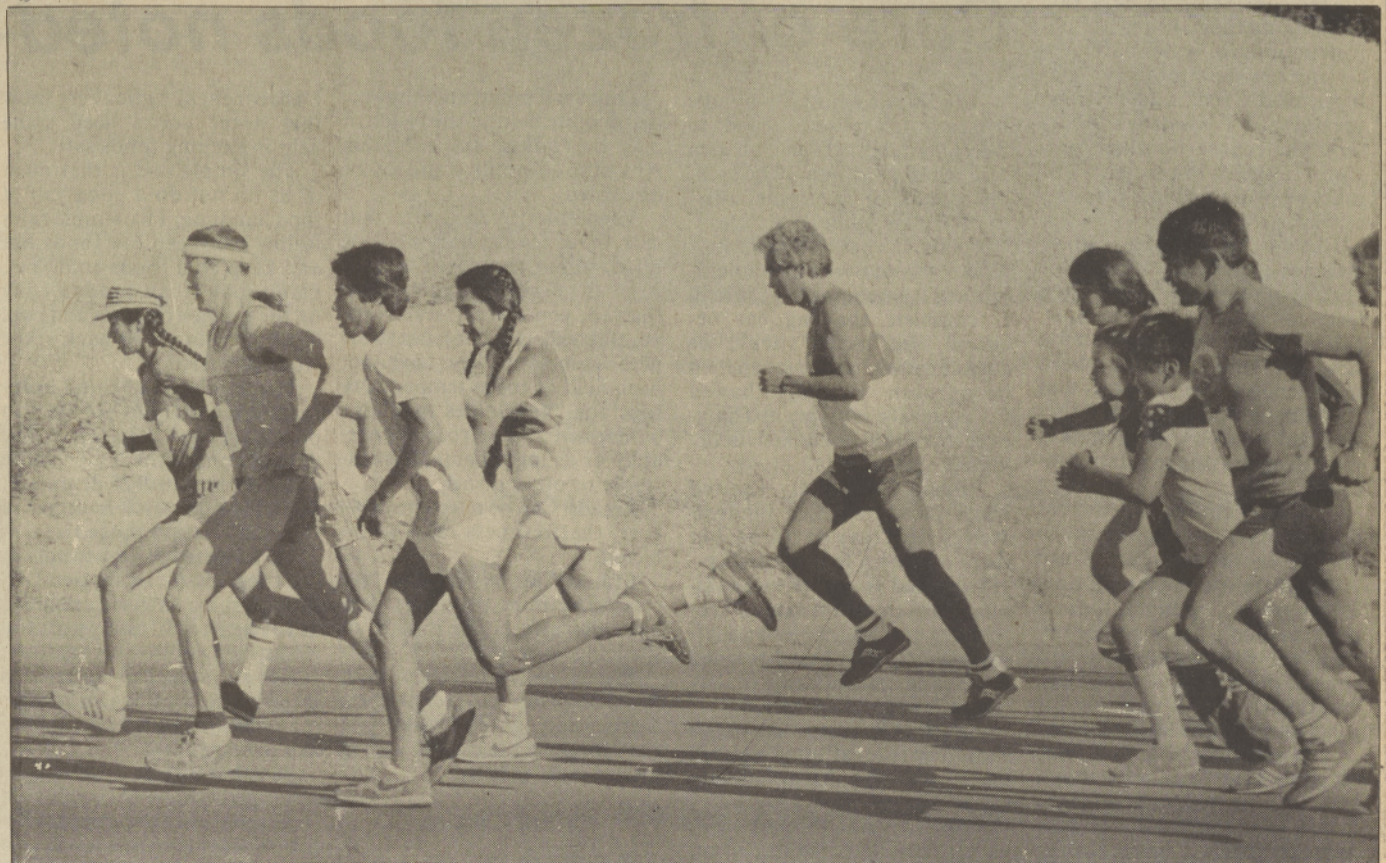
Pi-Ume-Sha run draws 26 runners
