## Nursing bottle mouth can be prevented

It seems as if a week can hardly go by without seeing a baby with seriously decayed teeth being brought into our dental clinic. The parents are worried because their baby's teeth are turning black and breaking down. They don't know why this is happening or how to stop it. What causes a baby's teeth to be destroyed by the gums by decay?

In almost all instances, we can trace the problem back to the bedtime bottle. Your child's teeth start to appear in the mouth at about five to six months of age; some baby's start even younger. The teeth can begin to decay soon after they appear. When you give your baby a bottle at bedtime containing sugar, and that includes honey, there's a good chance the teeth will

start to decay because of it.

The decay tends to spread rapidly. If the problems goes untreated, the teeth can easily become infected, causing the baby a lot of pain. When this happens, the teeth may have to be taken out. Even if treated early, the teeth can be difficult to fill and usually need stainless steel crowns.

Nursing bottle mouth can be prevented! Just remember these few important points:

1. Don't put a child to sleep with a bottle. If your child needs a bottle to sleep, fill it with cool, plain water or use a pacifier. Don't use sugar or honey on the pacifier!
2. Never give your child a bedtime bottle or glass containing sugar water, honey water, sweetened fruit drinks or soda pop.

Even formula contains enough sugar to cause a problem.

3. Clean your baby's teeth whenever possible, after each feeding. If your baby won't tolerate a small, soft, toothbrush, just wipe the teeth with a tissue or gauze.

What if your baby is already used to sugar and won't take plain water without crying? Start by diluting the sweetened drink with water. Every day, add less and less of the sweetened drink. Soon, your baby should be able to accept a bottle of water without much fuss.

Babies' teeth are so very important. Their loss can affect a child for the rest of his or her life. Don't be a parent who can only say "...if only I had known." You know how to save your baby's teeth!

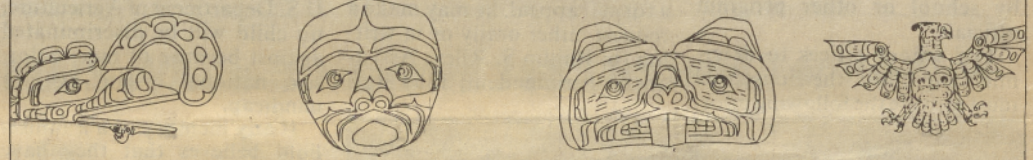

## Special tenant meeting held

A special tenant meeting was held at the Agency Longhouse August 15 with the purpose of starting a tenant organization for tenants in Simnasho tribal

units. Kah-Nee-Ta hamlets, Tenino apartments, regular tribal units, tribal trailer courts, seniors citizens HUD, Senior citizens, tribal, HUD rental units

and LHA mutual help housing program.

Representatives will be elected by the tenants to serve on the tenant board from the various housing units. The board will serve as a liaison between the housing department and the tenants to work on problems and solutions in the community. Some of the problems identified were burglaries, parties, vandalism, animal control and child/sexual abuse.

Tenant manager Neda Wesley informed the tenants that Warm Springs was one of the few reservations that doesn't have a tenant organization working on solutions and problems in the housing areas. Other reservations have had great success with tenant boards and the input from the boards have made a more positive working relationship for housing departments and tenants.

Members elected on the board will be solely voluntary, they will not receive compensation for their time and effort. People who are interested in serving on the board can contact housing to submit their name for the upcoming election for board members.

It was proposed at the meeting to start a tool loan project for the tenants. The project would start raising monies to purchase a lawn mower that tenants could rent for a small fee. It was suggested that perhaps tenants could assist Anna Hurtado, training coordinator

with ideas and projects to raise the monies needed to purchase the mower and other tools. Tenants at the meeting started the project with donations totaling \$13. Contact Anna Hurtado if you would like to make a donation, have suggestions or would like to help with projects.

The board will consist of 14 members with Simnasho with one member (Sylvia Wallulatum was selected by Simnasho tenants); Kah-Nee-Ta hamlets, one representative; Tenino apartments, two representatives; regular tribal housing, two representatives; tribal trailer courts, two representatives; Senior citizens-HUD, one representative; Senior citizens tribal, one representative; HUD rental units, two representatives and mutual help housing, two representatives.

"Bag-It Days 85" is a program that Oregon Governor Vic Atiyeh proclaimed from September 21 through October 4, 1985 and he invited the Warm Springs community to take part in the cleanup program. The state has provided 1,700 litter bags to be used in the community to pick up litter and debris. "Bag-it" bags can be picked up at the housing department. Neda Wesley urges all tenants to take part in the cleanup project.

A tenant meeting is tentatively planned for September 18 at the Agency Longhouse. All tenants are invited to take part in the selection and formation of the tenant board.

## Obituary

Lee Vernon Hulburd

Lee Vernon Hulburd, 80, of a long time resident of Madras died August 11, 1985 at Mountain View Hospital in Madras, Oregon.

Hulburd was born September 19, 1904 in Minneapolis, Minnesota to Arthur Downs and Maria Evadne Hulburd. He had coached Little League baseball for thirteen years in Jefferson County. In 1974 he was selected as "Father of the Year" in Jefferson County. He was a member of the Grange in Wallowa County and the Methodist Church.

He was well known to the people in Warm Springs as "the man who delivered the gas" when he worked for the Jeffer-

son County Co-Op. He also worked as delivery man for Kilgore Dairy. He retired from the Jefferson County Roads department.

Surviving him are three daughters, Mae Esbenhade of Cove, Oregon, Phyllis Kollen and Jean Green of Madras; a brother William C. Hulburd of San Diego, California; a sister, Evadne Richmond of Portland, Oregon; eight grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.

Services were held at the United Methodist Church in Madras August 14 with burial following at the Mt. Jefferson Memorial Park Cemetery in Madras.

## Howlak Tichum Franklin William Trimble

Franklin William Trimble, 63, died August 22, 1985 at Mountain View Nursing Home in Madras, Oregon.
