Day-long cattle, resource tour planned for September 20

Central Oregon's third annual cattle and resource tour will be held September 20 beginning at 8 a.m. at Macy's Hereford Ranch. The tour will also include seeing Kah-Nee-Ta, a tour of the fish hatchery, the lower Quartz Creek riparian improvements and lunch at HeHe Longhouse.

At 1:45 p.m., participants will tour the Warm Springs Rockin 4-H club range and livestock area. Following the tour of Warm Springs, the group will return to Macy's Ranch and then tour Fessler ranch in Gateway and the Norstar cattle company in Willowdale.

Following the tours will be a

steak barbeque and a dance at Norstar.

Registration is \$10 per person. The tour is sponsored by the Jefferson County Livestock Association, Deschutes County

Cattleman's Association, Crook County Stockgrowers and the OSU Extension Service in Jefferson, Deschutes and Crook counties.

WSFPI rated as lumber leader

The July issue of *Forest Industries* magazine printed the 1985 Annual Lumber Review tabulation of the leading lumber producers in the United States and Canada (1984 production figures.) Among the top 400 companies are four tribal forest products enterprises.

They are: Fort Apache Timber Company in 98th place with a

production of 105.9 million board feet; Navajo Forest Products, Inc. in 187th place, with a production of 45.4 million board feet; Warm Springs Forest Products Industries in 192nd place, with production of 45 million board feet; and Menominee Tribal Enterprises in 347th place with a production of 14.3 million board feet.

Oregon sales tax debate set

A debate on the proposed Oregon sales tax will be held before members and guests of the Jefferson County Chamber of Commerce at a special noon forum on Monday September 16 at Charley's Pizza.

Featured in the debate will be State Representative Bill Bellamy, who will speak in favor of the measure, and local business person Rick Allen, who will speak against the tax.

Time will be allowed for a question and answer discussion.

Police offer "house check"

Residence Security Patrol is a service provided by your police department. We say "house check" for short.

HERE'S HOW IT WORKS

FIRST: You come by or call the police department to tell you are going away and want to use our service.

NEXT: You complete a simple form about your house and yard, who is allowed there during your absence and any special instructions.

THEN: The patrol supervisor, on each shift, assigns an officer to make periodic checks on your house and yard. The officer will walk around your house and yard. He/she will check to see that things are the way you left them.

If something is different, or suspicious, it is reported to the supervisor and investigated.

WHEN YOU RETURN: We will cancel the house patrol once you are back home and contact us about it.

IMPORTANT: We can't guarantee that nothing will happen while you're away. Intruders are less likely to intrude, though, and the officer pays attention to little things before they get big.

INTERESTING: Did you know that while our police department provides this service, most other police departments around the state do not?

NOTE: See if you don't have a nicer feeling about being away, knowing that a "house check" has been filed with your police department.

Detox procedures established

Resolution No. 6980

Be it resolved by the Tribal Council of the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon pursuant to Article V, Section 1 (l) and (p) of the Constitution, that the attached detoxification procedures are hereby adopted and made a part of the Warm Springs Tribal Code as Chapter 363.

CERTIFICATION

The undersigned, as Secretary-Treasurer of the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon, hereby certifies that the Tribal Council is composed of 11 members of whom 7 constituting a quorum were present at a meeting thereof, duly and regularly called, noticed, convened and held this 26th day of August, 1985; and that the foregoing resolution was passed by the affirmative vote of 6 members, the Chairman not voting; and that the said resolution has not been rescinded or amended in any way.

Warm Springs Tribal Code Chapter 363 Detoxification Procedures

363.001 Legislative History and Intent

This Chapter is intended to establish procedures for detoxification of persons on the reservation for the protection of themselves and others. These are not criminal procedures but are intended solely for the protection of persons and property. Persons taken into custody for detoxification may or may not be charged with crimes.

363.050 Custody of Intoxicated Persons.

A person who is intoxicated

by drugs or alcohol may be taken or sent to his or her home or to a treatment facility by the tribal police. If the intoxicated person is incapacitated, the person's health appears to be in immediate danger, or the police have reasonable cause to believe the person is dangerous to himself or herself or to any other person, the person shall be taken by the police to an appropriate treatment facility or to the tribal jail. The person shall be considered incapacitated when unable to make a rational decision as to the acceptance of assistance.

363.100 Lodging and Jail

An incapacitated person may

be lodged in the tribal jail if medical treatment is not needed or can be administered at the jail for a period not to exceed 48 hours. The intoxicated person shall be released when he or she is no longer intoxicated or incapacitated, unless he or she is being held on tribal, federal or state criminal charges pursuant to WSTC Chapter 202.

363.150 Transportation to Treatment Facility.

If an intoxicated person taken into custody requires emergency medical treatment, the police shall immediately take that person to an available treatment facility or seek ambulance services to do so.

Season restrictions confirmed

The Columbia River Compact confirmed the following seasons for all Zone 6 pools:

The September 14-18 season calls for an eight (8) inch mesh restriction.

From September 6-11 there are no mesh restrictions; a Spring Creek sanctuary from tunnel 5 downstream of hatchery to one-fourth mile above the fishway is in effect, river mouth sanctuaries remain in effect.

Restrictions for the September 20-24 season will be determined at the September 13 Compact hearing.

No lower river commercial seasons were set at the September 5 meeting. In-season adjustment may occur at scheduled Compact hearings.

Check phone bills for errors

Pacific Northwest Bell is asking its Bend, Prineville, Madras, Gilchrist, and Warm Springs customers with telephone prefixes 382, 388, 389, 433, 553, 593 and 475 to review the charges on their phone bills for long distance calls placed between August 2 and 15. A few custo-

mers will find incorrect charges, said Glenn Kennedy, PNB's area manager for community affairs.

A wrong data code in the company's long distance billing system caused some uncompleted calls—where the caller received a busy signal or no answer—to be billed.

The company will make adjustments for any incorrect charges. Customers should call the PNB billing office.

The telephone number is listed on customer bills and in the call guide at the front of the telephone directory.
