## Locals in WSRAA first place

Three local men have taken over the first place lead in the pro rodeo association for wild horse racers in the nation. At this time they have totaled more points than any other team in the nation for the Wild Horse Racers Association (WHRAA). The three-man team of Jason Smith, Anson Begay and Edison Yazzie, all of Warm Springs began the season in June which gave them only four months to catch teams who had been on the circuit for at least seven months of the 1985 season. The season begins in October of each year.

The team members, Jason, 18, Anson, 17 and Edison, 23, are relatively young as teams go in the association but their youth has not hampered the trio in gaining first place for the season. Many of the teams competing in the association have years of experience over the local team but it would appear that in future years they could be the team for wild horse racers "to reckon with."

Within the last month the team traveled to Pueblo for the Colorado State Fair and rodeo, where they won first place monies totaling \$1,400 and the buckles; following that rodeo they went on to Ellensburg, Washington where they took another first place, winning \$1,260 and buckles; the last rodeo they entered was at Lewiston, Idaho and again they won first place monies and buckles.

They had planned to enter at the Pendleton Roundup but Jason has entered college at Pacific University in Forest Grove for the fall term. He is on the football team and committed to practices and games. The team decided to go with the
