Garbage pickup limited

Garbage men are not responsible for picking up anything but the trash in your garbage cans (and neatly bagged or boxed trash). Huge items such as the above, damage the trash compactor on the garbage trucks.

Utilities department—A new credit policy went into effect in

July, 1982 that many people are unaware of. Once again, for your information, the following is now in effect. Any person wishing to have work done (Under \$500.00) is required to fill out a credit application with the Accounting department.

When filling out the credit application, please let them know: 1) Your mailing address, 2) Your four digit house number with street name, 3) Phone number where you can be reached, 4) Best time to have work done, and 5) If anyone is going to be home. After this has been done they will notify us and let us know if you are eligible for credit.

Please do not ask to have work done without first doing the paper work with the Accounting department. This procedure is required so that anyone delinquent with other departments (as well as ours) will pay off their bills. If an emergency should arise, the above procedure still has to be taken. Any questions regarding this procedure should be directed to Accounts Receivable at ext. 217-220.

Trio leaving clinic staff

Karen Smith, Dr. Paul Balmer and Janice Cranford will all be leaving the Warm Springs Indian Health Clinic this month. All are headed for new and exciting directions and locations.

Smith, who has served as

IHS nutritionist for the past six years, will be nutritionist at Mt. Edgcombe Health Service center located near Sitka, Alaska. Smith says she's excited about her new position, and took it sight unseen. Smith will be going

out to about six villages ranging in population anywhere from 500 to 2,000 people.

Smith and her husband, Tim, will take a three-day ferry trip from Seattle to their new home following her last day October 25.

Dr. Paul Balmer, who arrived in Warm Springs in July, 1983 will be transferring to Chemawa Indian Health Clinic, which serves 12,000 to 15,000 patients a year. He will be the second physician there, since the number of patients eligible for Indian health service care has increased with the restoration of the Siletz and Grand Ronde reservations. Balmer said that Chemawa students make up a small portion of patients seen at the clinic.

Janice Cranford, X-ray technician at the clinic for the past five years, will begin her new job as matron at the Warm Springs police department after her resignation October 18. Cranford is taking EMT classes which require day-time lab work at St. Charles Medical Center in Bend. Her present job does not allow her the time, thus the career change.

A going away coffee is planned October 23 in the clinic conference room beginning at 11 a.m. Everyone is invited to say farewell to Smith, Balmer and Cranford.
