To: Julie Governor

You are hereby notified: That the above cited case (s), as filed in the Warm Springs Tribal Court, has been scheduled for a show cause hearing at 9:00 a.m., on the 5th day of November, 1985.

You are hereby ordered: To be and appear at the Warm Springs Tribal Court at

the time and date shown, to show cause why the suspended sentence of 7/16/85, should not be imposed for your failure to comply with the sentence imposed against you. This hearing will not be a full hearing on the merits of the case; you must appear and defend against a complaint that you failed to obey the Order of the Court.

If you fail to appear as so ordered, the Tribal Court shall enter a complaint for contempt of Court and issue a warrant for your arrest. If you have any questions, you should seek legal assistance immediately.

No fee is charged for these classes. Any session may be attended.
