Film aired

A fifteen-part English subtitled series, "From Oregon With Love," is being aired on KOIN-TV Sunday evenings at 6:00 p.m. The Fuji Television Network production will run through January 19.

The Japanese film company produced the movie on location in Central Oregon, often using Central Oregon residents as cast members.

The series, aired on Japanese network television, has provided promotion for the Oregon tourism industry. Over 60 million Japanese have watched the series equalling approximately \$46 million advertising campaign for the state.

The story in the film centers around a nine-year-old orphaned Japanese boy who comes to live with his aunt and uncle on a Central Oregon ranch. It incorporates landscape scenery and wildlife throughout the state.

Legal advice available

People who need advice or counsel or tribal law concerns or need a spokesperson for tribal court hearings can contact Gene Smith. Smith, a tribal member, began his Tribal Court Advocate practice earlier this fall.

Smith can be contacted through the Legal Aide Office, 553-1161, ext. 257, 269, 304 or 305 or 553-1612. At this time he does not have an office established and will be working from

his home.

He is not employed by the Tribe so a fee will be charged for his services. Fees will be discussed during the initial interview. His practice will be solely within the Tribal Court system.

Smith has 17 years of law enforcement with the Bureau of Indian Affairs; various sheriff's department (Jefferson and Clackamas); Warm Springs police department; and the Sandy City police.

Whitewolfe hangs shingle

Celeste (CeCe) Whitewolfe, tribal member, officially opened her Tribal Court Legal practice recently. She will be interviewing clients every Friday morning at the Legal Aide Trailer. Call the Legal Aide office for an appointment, extensions 257,

269, 304 and 305. CeCe's practice is limited to appearance in Tribal Court. She is not a tribal employee and will require a retainer to be paid before she accepts a case. Initial fact-finding interviews will be at no cost.
