Buffaloes come out on top

If the Beavers can beat the Huskies, why not the Buffaloes over the Bulldogs? That's just what happened on Saturday afternoon October 19, in the Buff stadium before a near capacity crowd.

The Buffs, like the Beavers, were expected to come out on the short end of things meaning the score but the determined Buffalo team had other plans as they beat the visiting Woodburn Bulldogs in a non-league encounter 28-16.

After a scoreless first quarter the Buffs just about laid the golden egg for the Bulldogs as they bobbled a pitch-out where the Bulldogs recovered the fumble in good field position near the 20 yardline. It just took a couple of plays for the Woodburn workhorse Cummings to crack over for the score and with the PAT they led 7-0.

It didn't take the Buffs long to get back into striking distance where Spud Smith hammered his way into the end zone

from five yards out, Lytle's kick evened the score at 7-7 to end the first half.

At the start of the second half the Buffs were on pretty shaky ground once again when they lost the ball on the snap from center giving the Bulldogs another scoring opportunity. Once again they called on Cummings to punch the ball over for the score. This time the kick went wide to the left giving them a 13-7 lead. Well, they did it again, losing the ball on another fumble

again giving the Bulldogs good field position. The defense was not to be denied as they stiffened up to hold the Bulldogs, forcing them to go for a field goal and to extend their lead to 16-7.

As they say, "it's the darkest just before dawn," as Madras kept popping away until Smith cracked over for the score bringing the Buffs back into striking distance and with Lytle's kick they were down by two. The defense went to work as the entire line started to put pressure on their quarterback and some good sacks by Tony Yee along with some good hits by Butch David holding the Bulldogs and forcing them to punt. Lytle broke through and blocked a Bulldog punt and fell on the ball in the end zone for six Buff points, and with his kick the Buffs led for good 21-16. But the Buffs were not through yet as they got their hands on the ball once again they marched down field to punch in the final score for the day from the hard running of Spud Smith to give them the winning margin of 28-16.

The statistics were not so bad as they piled up more yardage than the Bulldogs for a total of 173 to 136. There were 138 yards from rushing and 35 from passing as Donny Bagley hit Tony Stacona on the 35 yard gainer.

The next game will be at home against Mac Hi in another conference game which will get underway at 7:30 p.m. Friday. So far, the Buffs are sitting in third place with a one win, one loss record.

Silver Gloves Boxing tourney set for Oct. 26-27

Boxing tournament set for October 26-27, here in the Community Center with the weigh-ins starting at 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. Physical exams will also be done at that time and the drawing will be done at 11 a.m. There will be an entry fee of \$2 per boxer, the entry fees should be turned into the Community Center as soon as possible.

Divisions and ages are Junior Divisions for ten and 11 year old at 60 pounds with five pound graduation to 115 pounds, one minute rounds.

Intermediate Divisions for boxers 12 and 13 years old starting at 70 pounds with five pound graduations to 100, 106, 112,

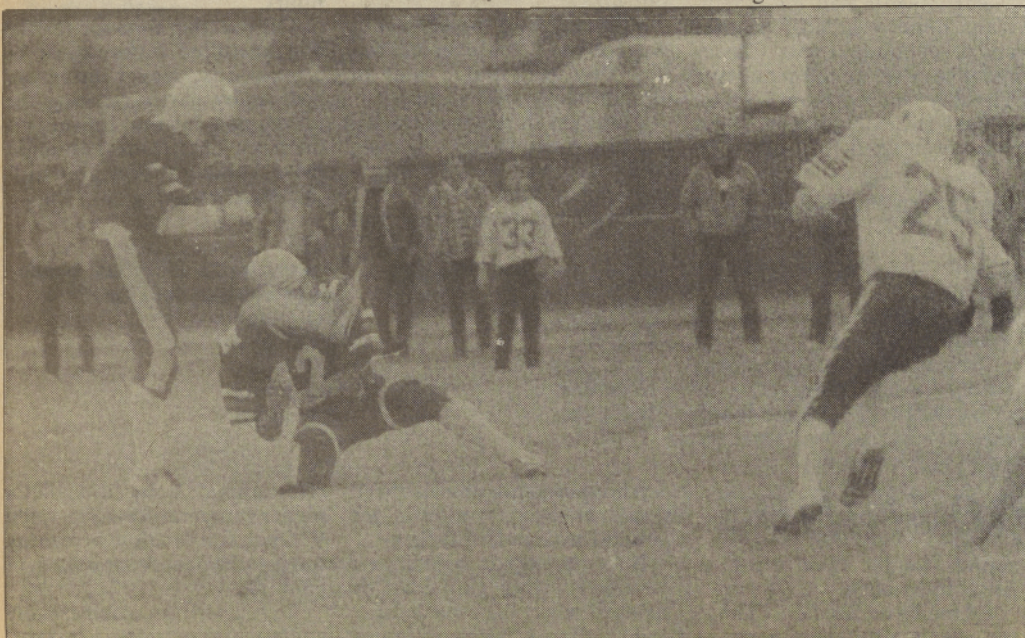
119, 125, 132, 139, 147, 156, 165, 178, heavy-weight 179-200 and super heavy weight 201 and over, two minute rounds.

Open senior and special senior divisions starting at 106 pounds, and the rest the same as the Senior/Junior weight divisions. Two minute rounds, special seniors ten bouts or less and who have never entered in a open tournament, three minute round.

Awards will include Windbreakers to all champions, T-shirts to runners-up. Team championship trophy, first through fifth place. Outstanding boxer trophy in each division.

There are 12 teams on tap for the three day affair starting Friday night first pitting the Roadrunners against Beatty at

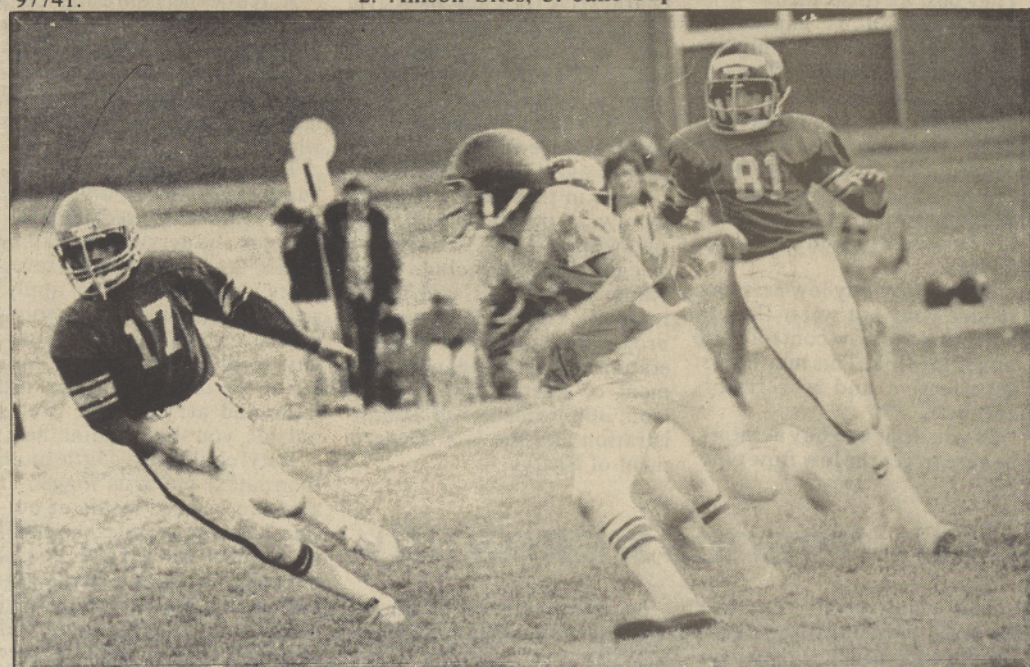
Sign-up for civil war game
