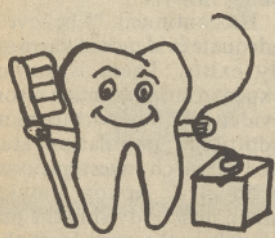


Help child develop good attitude

In all the years that I've been working in a dental office, I can only think of eight or nine people who genuinely didn't mind going to the dentist. On the other hand, I've lost count of all the people who were utterly terrified. The worn-out armrests on most dental chairs are testimony to the hundreds of gripping, white-knuckled patients who've sat in them. Sometimes the fears get a little extreme. For example, I've had women tell me that they would rather have babies than have their teeth worked on. Others have flinched at the touch of a cotton roll. What's been going on here? Why is there such a universal fear of the dentist?

Many, many adults, myself included, have had bad experiences with the dentist. Most of

these experiences stem from childhood and a lot of us just haven't gotten over them. Luckily, dentistry has come a long way in the last fifteen years, so really painful experiences aren't very common anymore. There's always the patient who has had a toothache for months and won't go to the dentist because they're afraid. Eventually, the tooth crumbles, infection sets in and then they decide it's time for the dentist. The dentist is faced with a remnant of a tooth that is as soft as a marshmallow plus an infection so bad that the tooth can't get numb. Because the tooth is so infected, it must be removed and, of course, it is a very difficult extraction. The patient leaves with their fear of dentists reinforced and the dentist has aged a few years trying to get the tooth out. Fortunately, this type of thing doesn't happen very often. Most people will come into the dentist's office at the first sign of trouble.

We adults have to deal with our fear as best we can. But what about our children? Children are not born with a fear of dentists; they learn to fear. If mom moans for a week about her upcoming dental appointment and talks about how much she hates "those shots," her child

will pick up on it. Mom's fears become the child's fears. Soon the child is talking about the evils of the dentist to friends and now, even before the child has even seen the inside of a dental office, the dentist is someone to be feared.

To help your child develop a healthier attitude toward dentists, begin regular dental treatment early, before the child has any serious dental problems. The first appointment for a two-year-old may frighten the child because everything will be new. To prepare them, it's best for parents to talk with the child about what will be seen at the dentist in a positive way. Tell them about the chair that moves up and down and the strange noises all the different special tools make. Tell them the dentist will count their teeth and look at them with a special mirror. They might even get their picture taken.

Hopefully our children will be able to grow up without an unreasonable fear of the dentist. They'll be less likely to put off treatment and because of this, their appointments will be easier and their teeth will be healthier. Fear of the dentist is one tradition that doesn't need to be passed on.

disabling. Motor vehicles injuries showed 53 percent needing first aid, 24.7 percent medical treatment, 17.3 percent disabling, 2.5 percent fatal, 2.5 percent no treatment.

The highest percentage of injuries came from falls followed by struck, vehicles, cuts, strains, other, animals, burns.

Applications must be received by 5:00 p.m. on October 28, 1985.

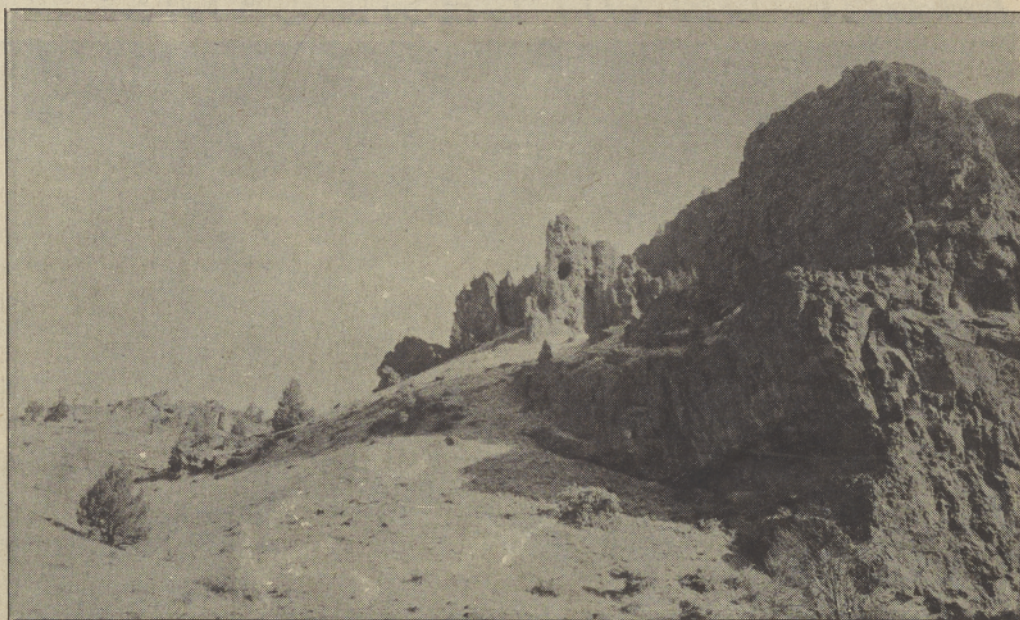
Garbage pickup limited

They will not haul away your old furniture or appliances, tree branches, grass trimmings, or anything other than usual household "trash." Huge items such as the above, damage the trash compactor on the garbage trucks.

Utilities department—A new credit policy went into effect in July, 1982 that many people are unaware of. Once again, for your information, the following is now in effect. Any person wishing to have work done (Under \$500.00) is required to fill out a credit application with the Accounting department.

Exhibition displays, literature illustrations

An exhibition of illustrations from children's literature will be on view until October 30, 1985 at the libraries of Madras High School, Madras Junior High School, Madras Elementary, Buff Elementary and Metolius Grade School.

The exhibition, entitled "Picture That!," provides a glimpse into the development of children's literature in America. Award-winning illustrations, selected from the Special Collections department of the University of Oregon Library, were chosen to represent a wide variety of styles and techniques from the 1930's through the 1970's. "Picture That!" also includes a brief history of children's literature, samples of artist's lay-out books, expanded labels outlining each artist's career, and supplementary copies of children's books which may be read by visitors at the exhibition site.

The exhibition is being circulated by Visual Arts Resources of the University of Oregon Museum of Art, with funding from the National Endowment

for the Arts, the Oregon Arts Commission, the Friends of the Museum, and private foundations.

Wilson Steve Bobb, 94, died October 14, 1985 at the Gold-leaf Convalescent home in Ellensburg, Washington.

Bobb was a member of the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde reservation. He was born January 2, 1891 to Levi and Lucinda Bobb at Grand Ronde. Bobb spent most of his life at Grand Ronde. He attended school at the Chemawa Indian School and Haskell Indian Institute. During his life time he worked as a logger, farmer and was the chairman of the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde for many years.

Bobb was stationed on the Warm Springs Indian reservation and the Yakima Indian reservation during the 1930's with the Conservation Corp.

He is survived by seven children, 27 grandchildren, 32 great-grandchildren, 2 great-great-grandchildren and a nephew.

Funeral services were held October 19, 1985 at the Adamson's Sheridan Funeral Home in Sheridan, Oregon with Bishop Kym Widdison officiating. Burial was at the Grand Ronde Agency Cemetery in Grand Ronde on that same day.

Colleen Eleanor Tufti

Enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, Colleen Eleanor Tufti, 35, died October 12, 1985 in Madras, Oregon.

She was born November 25, 1949 to Charles and Lenora (Polk) Tufti in Redmond, Oregon. She had lived in Warm Springs all of her life.

Surviving her are three sons, Perry Kalama, Jr., Leander

Squally and Bobbie Jo Stuntz; two brothers, Lawrence Tufti and Thurman "Gus" Tufti; and aunt, Dorothy Wally; and one granddaughter.

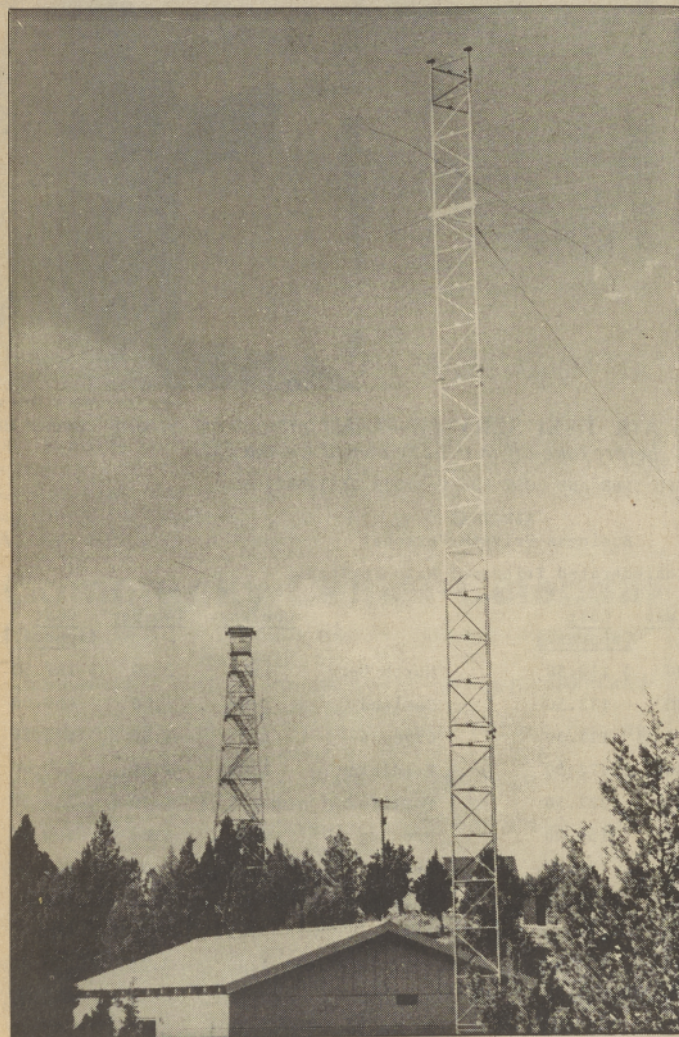
