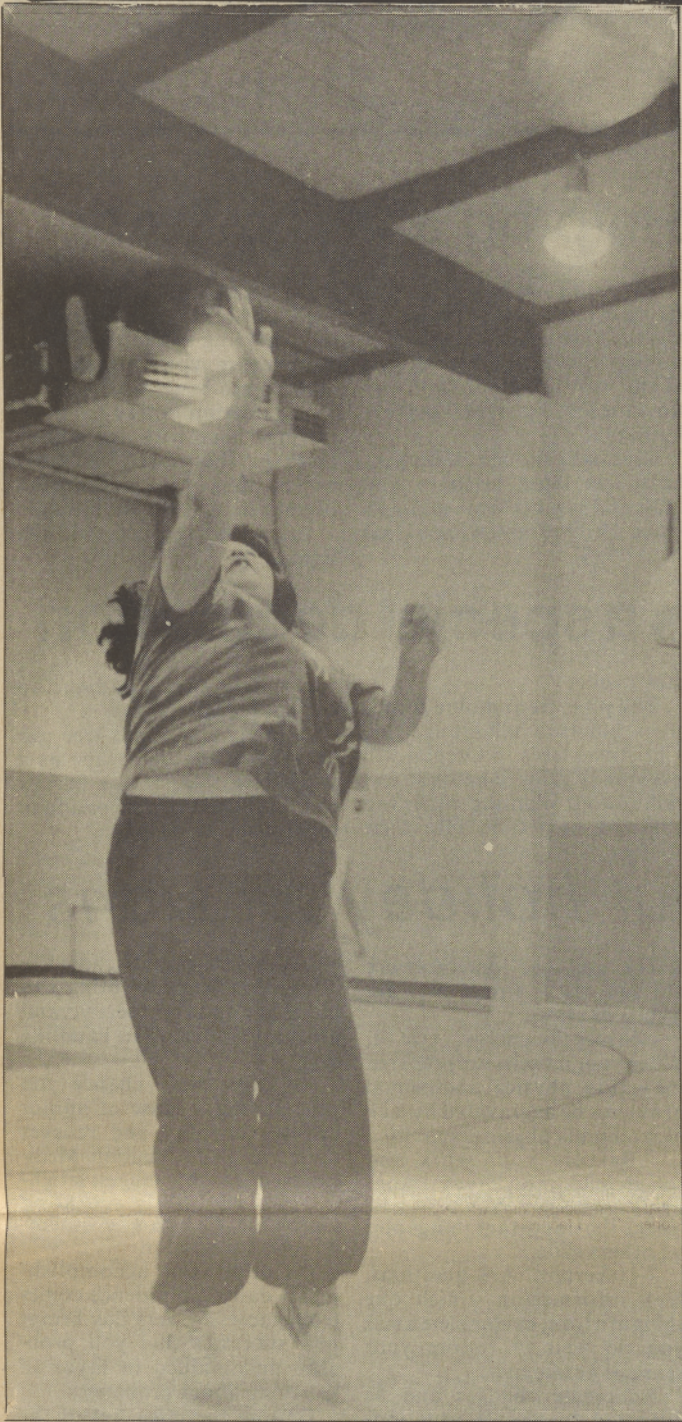

## NASU takes championship

Through the gruelling 16 game tourney NASU emerged the winner to earn a spot in the annual holiday tournament held during the Christmas holidays, where teams from all parts of the country are at hand for the Warm Springs Classic.

The Warm Springs Cougars and the NASU of Eugene squared off in the championship round in what appeared to be a real good game as the score was at a deadlock at the end of the first quarter at 26 apiece. Going in the intermission NASU pulled ahead by three points to take the lead at 52-49.

In the third quarter the NASU team started to take control of the game out scoring the Cougars by nine points to lead 84-72. NASU really took control in the final stanza scoring 32 points while the Cougars could only score 22, thus giving the NASU team the victory.

Jerome Davis was the high scorer for that game with 33 points while Roman Suppah added 25 and Dion Smith 22, James Scott 18, Lance Wagner 14 and Dawson Fire Moon four. The NASU team coached by Delson Suppah will join the

Magpies who are the host team for the holiday tournament.

The Cougars were led in scoring by Willie Stacona with 23, Ryan "Smitty" Smith 19, Max Mitchell, 21, Bob Main, ten, Owen Danzuka 12 and Nathan Main nine.

Teddy Walsey of the Valley Panthers was the high scorer for a single game with 39 points in a losing effort to the Tribes of W.S. The final score in that game was the Tribes 105, Valley Panthers 103. It was a close game all the way. The Tribes poured it on to lead 27-17 at the end of the first quarter and 52-38, at the half mark, at the end of the third quarter the score was 81-62, but in the fourth quarter the Valley Panthers poured it on out scoring the Tribes 41-24, which closed the gap to three points at the final quarter.

Teams participating in the tourney were the Oregon Travelers NASU (Native American Student Union) of Eugene, Sohapp, Cougars, Reservation Renegades of Chiloquin, W.S. Tribes, the Rainbows and the Valley Panthers of Satus, Washington.
