are valid and justify a recount or new election, the Secretary of the Interior shall so order.

10. Electioneering: There shall be no electioneering during voting hours within fifty (50) feet of the polling place. Sample ballots will be permitted at the place where the voter marks his ballot.

11. Amendments: The constitution shall be considered amended if a majority of the qualified voters vote in favor of the amendment, providing at least 30 percent of those registered to vote shall in the election, and the amendment shall become effective when approved by the Area Director, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Portland Area Office.

Summary and Description of the Amendment to the Constitution of the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon

The Secretary of the Interior was petitioned by 562 enrolled members of the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon, on January 31, 1986, to conduct an election to amend the Tribal Constitution.

An election will be held May 15, 1986 to vote on whether or not Article IV, Section 2 of the Warm Springs Tribal Constitution should be changed.

At the present time, the section reads:

Section 2. Apportionment—Article IV—Organization of Tribal Council.

Section 2. Apportionment—Representation from the districts shall be as follows: Simnasho District, 3 elected members and the recognized Chief of the District, or his successors; Agency District, 3 elected members, one of whom shall represent the Sidwaller Flat area, together with the recognized Chief of the District, or his successors; Seekseequa District, 2 elected members and the recognized Chief of the District, or his successors.

If a majority of voters votes "yes", the Constitution would be changed to read:

Article IV Organization of Tribal Council Section 2. Apportionment. Tribal Council elections to fill the eleven (11) council seats will be done at-large in a general election of the people.

If a majority of voters approve the change to Section 2, it will have an effect on twelve (12) other sections of the Tribal Constitution. The Tribal Council will still have eleven members, but they will all be elected by

the eligible members of the Tribe, and not by districts.

Following is a summary of the changes that will be made to other sections of the Constitution.

Other areas of Article IV—Organization of Tribal Council impacted by this election:

Section 1 Presently reads: Section 1. Composition—The Tribal Council shall be composed of members chosen as hereinafter provided. The Council shall consist of eleven members, to be selected from the districts as set forth hereafter.

Section 1 would be amended to read: Section 1. Composition—The Tribal Council shall be composed of members chosen as hereinafter provided. The Council shall consist of eleven members, to be selected at large in a general election.

Section 3 presently reads: Section 3 Term of office—Members of the Council shall be elected for terms of three years except that the chiefs shall serve the life, and their successors shall be selected in accordance with tribal custom.

Section 3 would be amended to read: Section 3. Term of office—Members of the Council shall be elected for terms of three years.

Section 4 presently reads: Section 4. First Election—The first election of the Tribal Council shall be called by the present Business Committee as soon as possible after the adoption and approval of this Constitution.

Section 4 would be amended to read: Section 4. First Election—The first election of the Tribal Council shall be called as soon as possible after the adoption and approval of this Constitutional amendment.

Section 5 presently reads: Section 5. Right to vote—All members of the Community of either sex, who are over 21 years of age, are entitled to vote in the district in which they reside.

Section 5 would be amended to read: Section 5. Right to vote—All members of the Community of either sex, who are married, or who are over 21 years of age, are entitled to vote.

Section 6 presently reads: Section 6. Time of Election—Election for membership on the Council shall be set up by the Tribal Council at least 30 days in advance of the expiration of the term of office of the members. Duly elected councilmen shall take office on the first regular meeting date of the Council following their election.

Section 6 would remain as written.

Section 7 presently reads: Section 7. Manner of elections—Elections shall be by secret ballot, or by prevailing customs, as may be desired by the people of the district.

Section 7 would be amended to read: Section 7. Manner of elections shall be by secret ballot.

Section 8 presently reads: Section 8. Vacancies and removal from office—If a councilman or official shall die, resign, permanently leave the reservation, or be removed from office, the Council shall declare the position vacant and appoint a successor to fill the unexpired term; provided, that the person chosen to fill such vacancy shall be from the district in which the vacancy occurs.

Section 8 would be amended to read: Section 8. Vacancies and removal from office—If a councilman or official shall die, resign, permanently leave the reservation, or be removed from office, the Council shall declare the position vacant and appoint a successor to fill the unexpired term; provided, that the person chosen to fill such vacancy shall be the person with the next highest number of votes. In case of a tie, Tribal Council shall determine by secret ballot.

Section 9 presently reads: Section 9 Impeachment—The Council expel a member for cause by a 2/3 vote, after the due notice of charges and allowing an opportunity to be heard.

Section 9 would remain as written.

Section 10 presently reads: Section 10. Recall—A member of the Council may be recalled by the electors of his district in an election which shall be called by the Tribal Council upon presentation of a petition for the recall of such member signed by at least 30 percent of the eligible voters of the district. Successors to recalled councilmen shall be elected.

Section 10 would be amended to read: Section 10 Recall—A member of the Council may be recalled by the electors in an election which shall be called by the Tribal Council upon presentation of a petition for the recall of such member signed by at least 30 percent of the eligible voters. Successors to recalled councilmen shall be elected.

Section 11 presently reads: Section 11 Officers—The Tribal Council shall select from its membership, a chairman and Vice-chairman, and from within or outside of its membership, a

This form, upon completion and return to the election board, shall be the basis for determining whether you qualify to have your name placed upon the list of registered voters and to receive a ballot.

Completion and return of this form is voluntary.

Secretary-Treasurer. It may also select such other officers and committees as it may deem necessary for properly conducting the business of the Council.

Section 11 presently reads:

Article V—Powers of the Tribal Council. Section 1(s)—To appoint subordinate boards and tribal officials, and to provide for the popular election of subordinate district councils, and to delegate such boards, councils, or officials or to cooperative associations which are open to

all members of the Confederated Tribes, any of the foregoing powers, reserving the right to review any action taken by virtue of such delegated power.

Article V would be amended to read: Section 1(s)—To appoint subordinate boards and tribal officials, and to provide for the popular election of subordinate councils, and to delegate to such boards, councils or officials or to cooperative associations which are open to all members of the Confederated Tribes, any of the foregoing powers, reserving the right to review any action taken

by virtue of such delegate power.

The By-Laws presently reads: Article V—Meeting and procedures Section 9—It shall be the duty of each member of the Tribal Council to make reports to the district from which he elected concerning the proceedings of the Tribal Council.

The By-Laws would be amended to read: Article IV—Meetings and Procedures, Section 9—It shall be the duty of each member of Tribal Council to make reports concerning the proceedings of the Tribal Council to the people.

Travelers travel with ball

The Oregon Travelers of Simnasho placed fourth in the 33rd Annual Klamath Basketball Tournament March 21-23. The Chiloquin team took their first game (150-120) against Beatty. It was the first step in Chiloquin's march to the championship title.

In their first game the Taholah, Washington team easily beat Sprague River with a final score of 117-98. Taholah was dusted in their second game when they went against Chiloquin (123-108). In their final game, Taholah won by a one point lead against Chico giving Taholah third place in the tournament.

In the fourth game of the tournament Chico met the Travelers and introduced them to defeat (119-103), only to end

their run for the title in the next game played against Nespelem. Nespelem won (129-116). Chico then went against Taholah, won, giving them third place in the tournament.

Nespelem won their first game earlier against Carson City, Nevada (128-117). With two wins under their belt, Nespelem had earned a shot at the championship title. Going against Chiloquin the Nespelem gave way to the Chiloquin team leaving Chiloquin the title.

Beatty met Sprague River, winning with a final score of 125-103, thus ending any hope for the title. Beatty was then pitted against the Travelers' machine and go under in defeat by a mere one point lead. The

win would mean the fourth place award for the Travelers.

Mike Wilbur of Nespelem earned the "Mr. Hustle" award. Nespelem was given the "Sportsmanship" trophy. Jason Raye of Chiloquin was selected as the "most valuable player."

Named to the all-star team were Skip Barney, Adrian Whitecraft and Tony Wallace of Chiloquin; Brooker Jones, Mike Wilbur and Buck Jones of Nespelem; Tandy Charley and Art Escalanti of Taholah; James Scott of the Travelers; Art Hernandez of Chico; Jamie Henry for Beatty; and Terrence Covers-up from Carson City.

The Oregon Travelers will be traveling to the upcoming NIAA National Basketball Tournament in Billings, Montana April 15-19.

Mini-marathon scheduled for April 26
