Role of Indian artist topic of seminar

Artist and teacher Lloyd Kiva New of Santa Fe, New Mexico, will teach a limited-enrollment seminar, The Dynamics of American Indian Art, at the Oregon Art Institute, July 7 through July 11. The seminar combines studio instruction with special films and gallery discussions.

The seminar will survey the past and current accomplishments of American Indians in the arts on a region by region basis, focusing on what New describes as "traditional American Indian arts in transition." He will examine many of the external factors affecting Indian arts and the role of the artist, including the rise of the individualist in contemporary Indian art and the effects of economic pressures, changes in lifestyle, the impact of art dealers and collectors, museums and galleries. New was the director of the

Institute of American Indian Arts in Santa Fe, New Mexico from 1967 until his retirement in 1978. He is the founder of Kiva Craft Center and Lloyd Kiva Studios in Scottsdale, Arizona and is a noted lecturer and author on American Indian Art.

The seminar is offered in conjunction with the exhibition, Women of Sweetgrass, Cedar and Sage which features innovative work by 30 Native American women from 20 tribes. The exhibition will be on view at the Art Institute's Museum through July 27.
