Rodeo, races, exhibits part of Wasco County Fair

The Wasco County Fair held during the weekend of August 23, 24, 1986, at Tygh Valley, where a great number of locals were involved in various activities. There was a powwow at the Indian encampment where the Jr. Buck, and Princess was crowned on Saturday morning. The exhibit hall for the Indian regalia was all decked out with keepsakes of beaded items and artifacts dated back for several generations. The rodeo and races were a lot of the local cowboys and cowgirls participated. There were five races on Sunday, four of them were memorial races where various prizes were put up for the winners, horse blankets, halters, jackets, and buckles were donated by various individuals.

The first race for the day was the relay race which was won by the Scott Stables, 2nd was the Vernon

Spino team and third went to Delvis "Bullneck" Heath. In the first of the memorial races LeRoy Scott won the race in honor of Martina Heath, a blanket, a trophy and a belt buckle was presented to the owner and rider. LeRoy Scott also won the Zeke Scott memorial race, also receiving a blanket, trophy and belt buckle. Jacob Frank was the winner of the Lloyd Woodside memorial race receiving a blanket, trophy and belt buckle also, and the Wesley-Green Acres won the Son Son Heath Memorial race and also receiving the same, a blanket, trophy and belt buckle.

Jeffery Frank was the leading jockey and was presented a Jacket, Jacob Frank was the leading trainer and received a jacket. Lester Poitra won the sportsmanship award, and a jacket.

Joel Florendo won the All-Indian

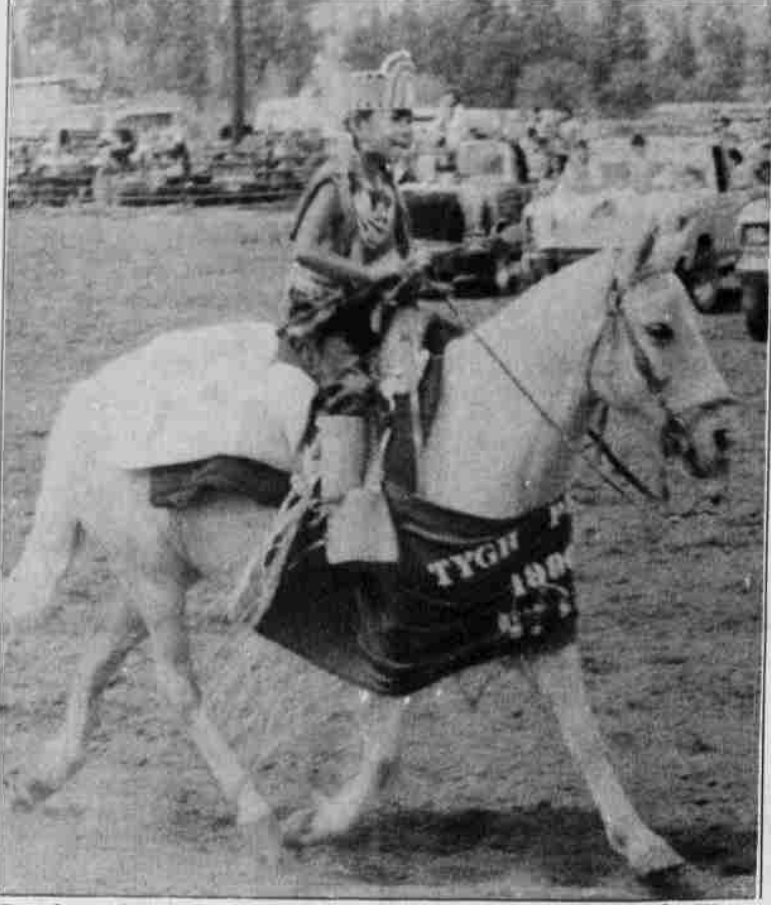
bareback buckle from the two rodeos, the first one was at the Jefferson County Fair, and the Wasco Co. Fair. The Belt Buckle was put up by Bob Miller, to create more interest among the local boys. Bob Miller known by most rodeo people around the Central Oregon area, being a rodeo rider at one time. Joe Scott placed 4th in the saddle bronc as there were three riders who marked a 71 during the two day rodeo.

In the businessmen wild cow milking Gordon Scott won the event during the first performance and Tom Begay won the second go round on the final day. Shana Johnson and Bridgett Scott participated in the girls barrel race, however their times were not fast enough.

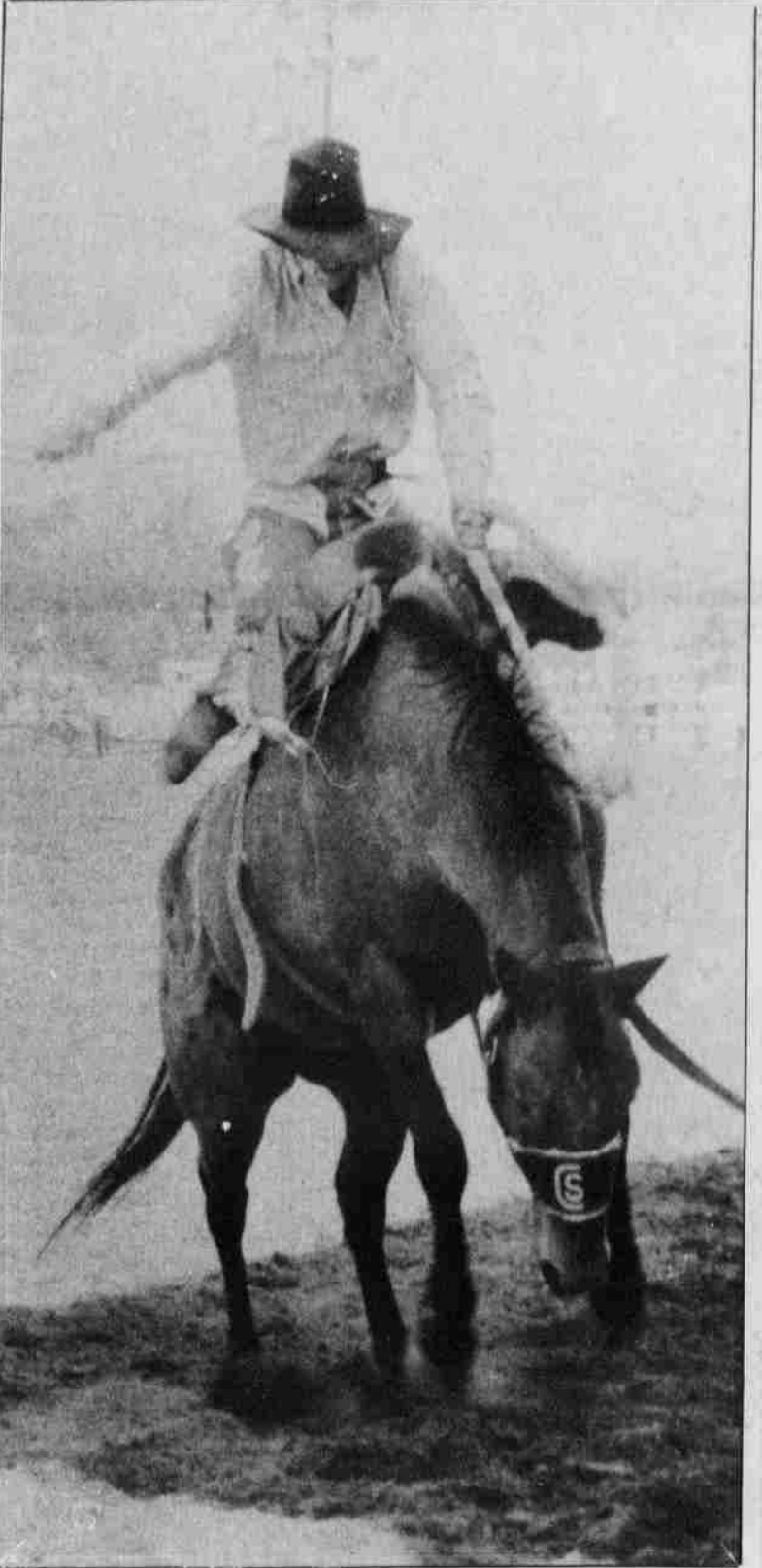
The action was so fast and furious, some of the participants might have been over looked. This year they

added the wildhorse race to the program with a total of five teams signed up which include the Charley Smith team, Randy Guess team, Hobo Patt team, Lewis Spino team, and the Winston Wewa team. The first day it was the horses 5 and the cowboys 0. On the second day it was decided that since there were no winners from the first day that the winner take all during the final performance, which was won by the Randy Guess team, who saddled their horse rode it between the judges took off the saddle and presented it to the judges to win the event.

The fair one of the highlights for the tribal members for the year, saw a good teepee encampment where the powwow was held. Another year has come to pass and on toward home the participants went.



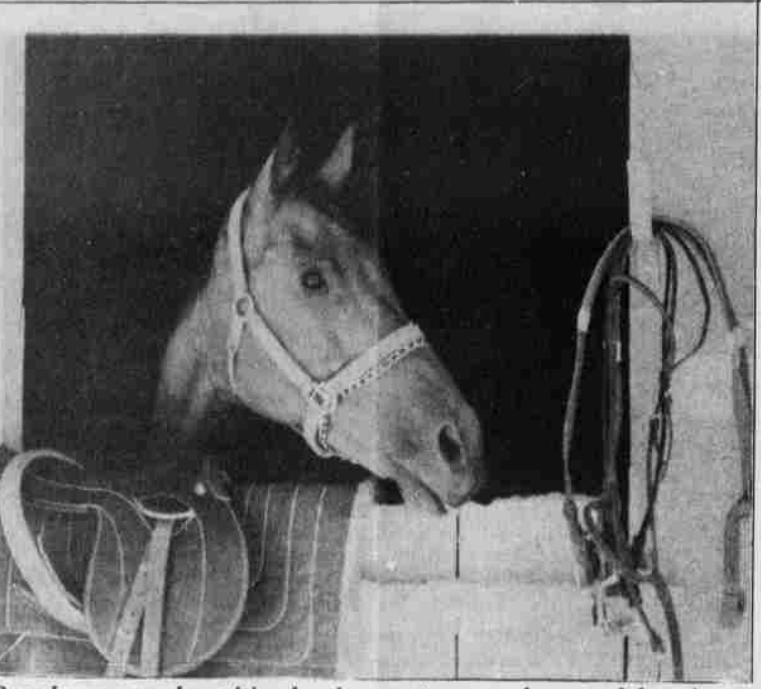
Roselynn Marie Scott, the Princess at the powwow, during the Wasco County Fair, riding in the grand entry.

Performances are September 3 at 7 p.m.; September 4 and 5 at 10 a.m. for slack, 7 p.m. for show and slack following; September 6 at 1 p.m. and the final day September 7 at 1 p.m.

The Sparks, Nevada rodeo is September 20 and 21. There is \$1,000 up per event with \$2,000 up in team roping with entry fees for all events \$100.
