


The Wasco County Fair held during the weekend of August 23, 24, 1986, at Tygh Valley, where a great number of locals were involved n various activities. There was a powwow at the Indian encampment were the Jr. Buck, and Princess was crowned on Saturday morning.

The exhibit hall for the Indian regalia was all decked out with keepsakes of beaded items and artifacts dated back for several generations. The rodeo and races where a lot of the local cowboys and cowgirls participated. There were five races on Sunday, four of them were memorial races where various prizes were put up for the winners, horse blankets, halters, jackets, and buckles were donated by various individuals.


