Tom wins All Around title

"What is he going to be like in another five years?" is a question a number of people in the world of rodeo are asking about eight-year-old Justin Tom. Justin is in his second year of actively participating in rodeos. During this 1986 season he traveled to 21 peewee and junior rodeos. He belonged to the Central Oregon Peewee Rodeo association, High Desert Peewee Rodeo association and the Northwest Rodeo association. In the Central Oregon and Northwest associations he was a strong contender for the 1986 all-around cowboy titles. In the Central Oregon competition he won the title and the prized all-around saddle, which is presented to the winner.

In the finals of the Northwest, a twist of the rules and regulations prevented him from bagging the saddle. Usually, in rodeo, the total points for every event are totaled and the person with the highest number of points wins. But in the Northwest the points of just three events were totaled. Justin lost that title and saddle by just two points.

He is a strong contestant in bucking ponies, calf riding, goat tying, pole bending and barrel racing. In the past summer months he won more than enough buckles for his family. But he has also won ribbons, trophies and halters. His awards are hung in the living room at his parents Seekseequa home.

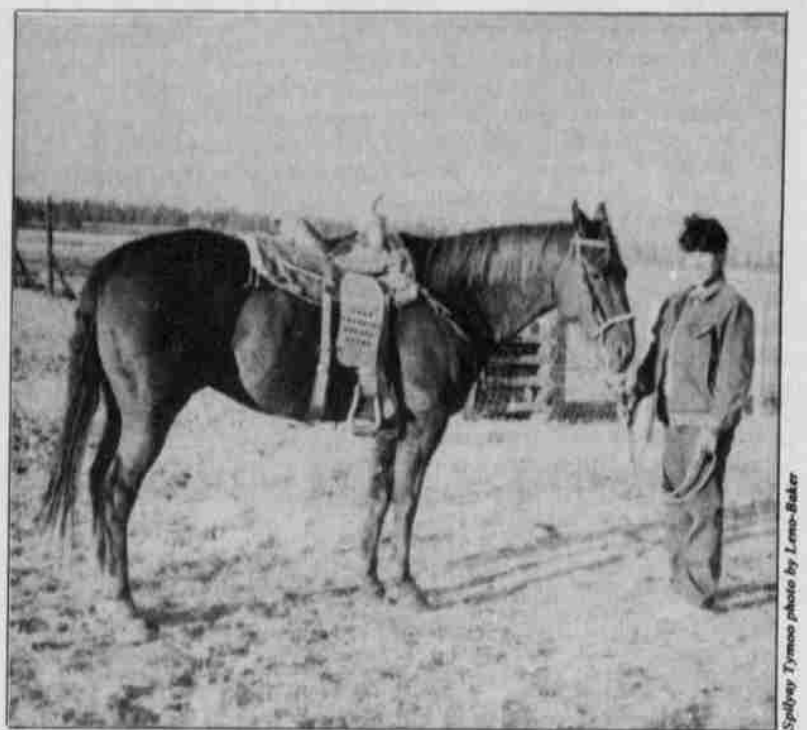
This past season his family backed the young cowboy in the pursuit of his dreams and goals to win the all-around title. His father, Lee Tom, also fills in as the boy's coach, driver and sidekick. He is the person to keep Justin on time and ever-ready for the events. His mom, Cheryl, is Justin's book-keeper. She keeps a running total of his points in each event and in each association. His little sister, Lianna, is one of his foremost fans. She cheers her brother on in all events. It is really a "family affair" for the Toms.

What are the dreams for an eight-year-old who has won an all-around title? Justin dreams of the day when he can make his living at rodeoing and be on his way to the National Finals held each year for the Professional Cowboys Association. The dream, at times, has presented its problems. Just recently he told his teacher he was not worried about school because he was

going to be a professional cowboy and he didn't think he would need a lot of school for that goal.

And just what does a champion do when the rodeo season is over? Well, in the recent "punt, pass and kick" contest held at the Warm Springs Community Center, Justin won his age division. The mark of a true champion—a person who strives to do his best in everything.

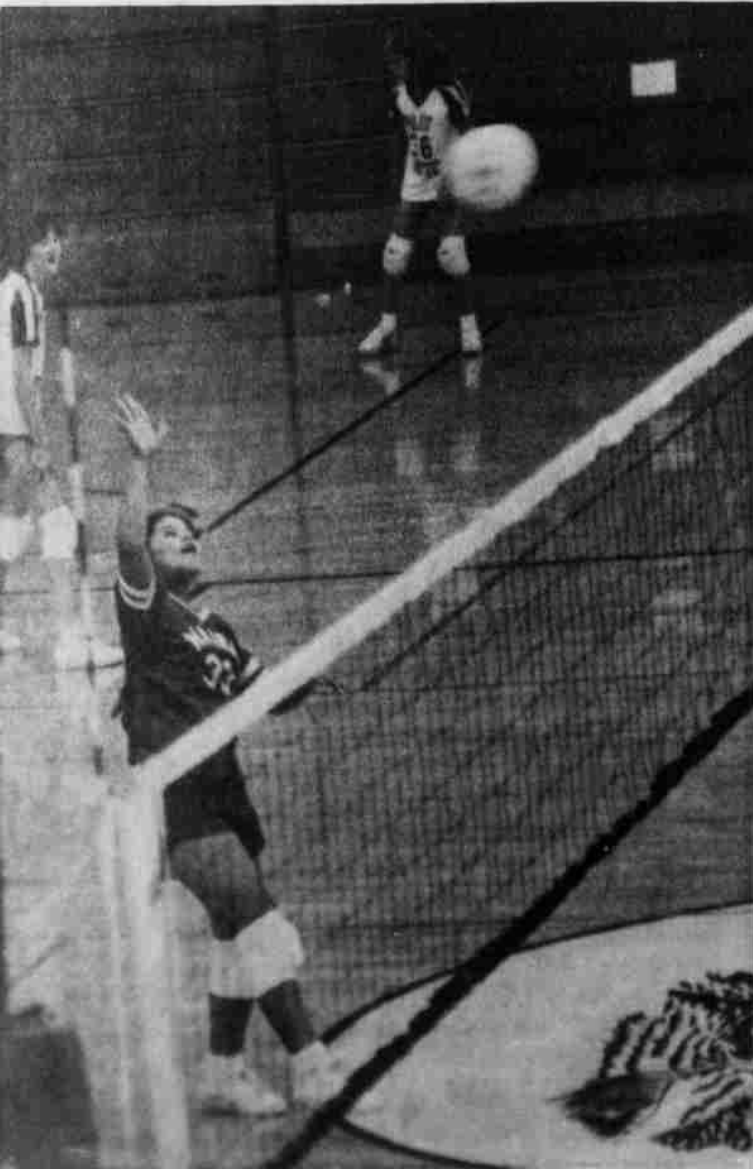
Relay, fun run scheduled in Lapwai, Idaho
