



Of all the punctuation marks, the comma is the one most frequently misused. Many writers suffer from "comma-itis"-that is, they use unnecessary commas. Commas, like all punctuation marks, are for clarity. They should be used to make meaning clear to the reader. There are several rules for comma usage; the best rule is to use a comma only if it is necessary to


