Only the rough and ready need apply for Tygh Valley action

It was more than just "alive and well" for the 38th annual All-Indian Tygh Valley rodeo, it was ripping, jumping, jabbing, stomping, alive and kicking for contestants as well as for spectators. With a record number of 324 contestants, the rodeo dispelled any thought that the rodeo was not doing well as rumors had reported earlier this year. A total of \$18,534 was paid out in prize monies.

A Washington cowboy, Shawn Best, placed a first on Saturday in the bareback and a third on Sunday for a second in the average. He tied with Donny Quintero for third and fourth in saddle bronc and won the bull riding with a score of 66, plus he participated in wild cow milking. It gave him enough to win the All-Around title and the saddle.

Another Washington cowboy, Darin Brady, of Wapato was the high money winner with a first in team roping and a fifth in wild cow milking. He won over \$1,200 for the rodeo.

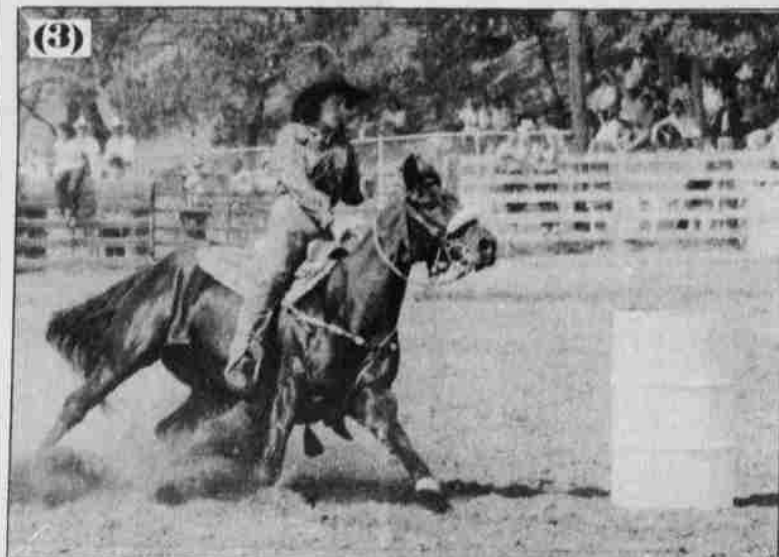

Tracksters qualify for state

Todd McGuire is leading the Buff tracksters to the state championship meet this weekend at the Mt. Hood Community College oval, with the meet starting Friday and concluding on Saturday.

In district action the boys came out with a surprising second place behind Ontario who won the meet with a total of 127 points. The White Buffaloes edged out Nyssa 101-100 for second place. Todd McGuire was a double winner in the high jump with the height of 6 feet 4 inches. He stands among the top high jumpers in the state with the height of 6 feet, 8 inches. He won the long jump with the dis-

tance of 21½ feet. The other winner for the Buffs was Clark Hulsey who won the shot with a toss of 45.6 feet. Holliday placed 5th in that event.

In the running events who qualified for the state meet by placing second were Todd Beamer in the 300 hurdles and Ron Blincoe in the 800.

There were only two girls who placed and qualified for the state meet they were Kelly Jividen who won the long jump at 15.7½, which was her best jump for the year, and Ellen Blincoe placed second in the 400.

Girls win tennis title

It was the doubles team of Teresa Simmons and June Commonore who powered their way past a Baker team who hadn't lost a set all season long.

Five of six entries advanced to the semi-finals as the girls won the District 7AA title with the score of 47 points which was well ahead of second place Baker who compiled 23 points.

Annual Pi-Ume-Sha rodeo promises plenty of action

For an action packed of thrills and spills and gaiety, come and attend the 12th annual Warm Springs Rodeo Association's Pi-Ume-Sha All-Indian Rodeo, June 27 and 28, here in Warm Springs, Oregon.

Show time is 1:00 p.m. both on Saturday and Sunday, in the new rodeo arena two miles East of

Warm Springs on the Kah-Nee-Ia highway. This is a WSIRA approved rodeo as all cowboys will be in there trying to build as many points in their special events for the championship at the end of the year.

A revolving trophy for the All-Around Cowboy, the contestant must win 3 times to take home and must place in a timed event and a

judged event to qualify. The trophy sponsored by the Wewa family. There will be jackets for all event winners and the All-Around Cowboy.

The events include the Saddle bronc, bareback, bull riding, calf roping, team roping, steer wrestling, sr. barrel racing, wild cow milking, wild horse race, jr. barrel race and calf riding. There will be a purse of \$500.00 in each event except for the Jr. Barrel race and calf riding which the purse will be \$75.00. The entry fee is \$50.00 per event, with the bull riding open to the first 32 paid entries only. The entry fee is \$50.00 per man, \$100.00 per team in the team roping with two loops, and must enter as a team. The Wild Horse Race the entry fee is \$90.00 per team for 16 teams. The Jr. Barrel Race entry fee \$8.00 for 12 year old and under with the purse of \$75.00. The Calf riding entry fee is \$8.00 for 12 year old and under with the purse of \$75.00.

8:00 a.m. and close June 20, at 5:00 p.m. Phone entries call (503) 553-1482. Call back, June 23, from 6 to 9 p.m. Only WSIRA members can phone entries; others must make arrangements with WSIRA rodeo secretary. Mail entries must be received no later than June 20, 1987 at 5 p.m. Local hometown cowboys and permittees must have their entries paid by 5:00 p.m. on June 20, no personal checks, pay by cash or money orders only, no Canadian currency accepted. There will be no free passes issued.

A buckaroo breakfast Sunday morning June 28, at 7 a.m. at the rodeo arena \$3.50 per plate, sponsored by the Warm Springs Rodeo Association.
