

Child abuse training scheduled

Nationally known expert on child sexual abuse Jan Hindman will present a one-and-a-half day training session Wednesday and Thursday, May 27 and 28. The training session is sponsored by Youth Services and will be conducted at the Warm Springs Community Center. The community is invited and there is no cost for the training. The tentative agenda will include the following:

May 27 morning session: An introduction and overview of sexual abuse. This will include discussion of the problem of sexual abuse, a session that is intended for the entire community. The Warm Springs community awareness group, leaders and members from all areas

of the community are especially invited.

May 27 afternoon session: Investigating child sexual abuse. This session will include identifying signs and symptoms, and documenting possible evidence such as behaviors and child statements.

Also included in the afternoon session will be information on conducting a formal investigation and investigations by teams. This session is designed for police and youth services. Also on the agenda will be the sexual abuse interview, medical examination and follow-up.

May 28 morning session: Treatment for victims of sexual abuse will be discussed including the goals and objectives of treatment, methods

and modalities of treatment and when reunification of the family can occur.

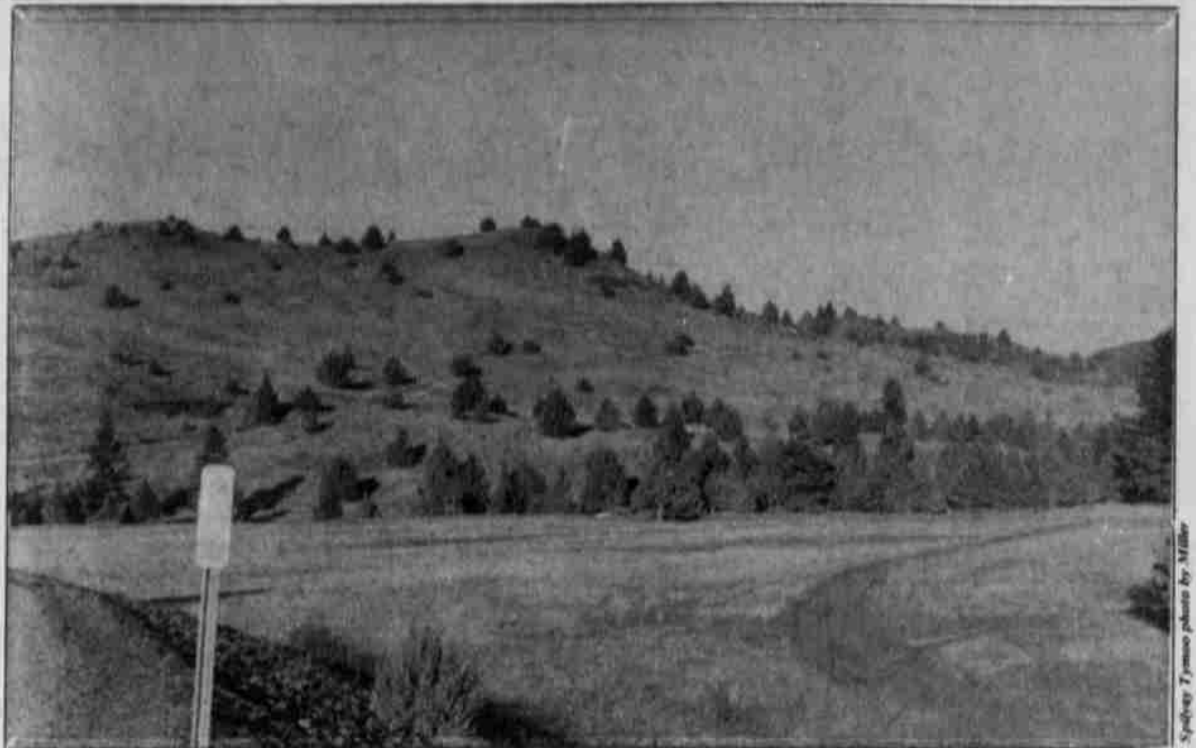

You are hereby ordered: To be and appear at the Warm Springs Tribal Court at the time and date shown to defend against the charge(s). You may bring any documents you believe are relevant to this cause, and you may bring witnesses to testify on your behalf. You may request the Court to subpoena your witnesses, however, you must submit your list of witnesses no later than two weeks prior to trial; failure to do so will not be considered sufficient reason to postpone the trial.

If you fail to appear as so ordered, the Tribal Court shall enter a complaint for contempt of court and issue a warrant for your arrest. If you have any questions, you should seek legal assistance immediately.

Tailfeathers join American Indian Dance Theatre

Charles and Danell Tailfeathers have left the peaceful quiet of Warm Springs to join the American Indian Dance Theatre, a venture that will take them throughout the United States this spring and early summer and then to Europe this fall for a 10-week tour.

The father-daughter duo left last week to join 25 other Native American dancers from Canada and the U.S. in Colorado Springs, Colorado. The troupe was selected by Barbara Schwei of the Theatre for their abilities in dance and cultural expertise. Of the 27 originally chosen for the Theatre, 10 will be replaced so that the Troupe will consist of "the best dancers in the country," said Charles.

Schwei said Charles, traveled extensively throughout the U.S. to powwows for several years to observe dancers. She personally selected the best dancers, gaining a true insight to the culture and heritage of each tribe and region. While preparing for the tour, each dancer will perform his or her speciality plus participate in some group dances. Once all the dances are incorporated, the show will be approximately 90 minutes in length.

Initial rehearsal for the troupe will be in Colorado Springs and last about two weeks. Their first public performance will be May 28. They then will travel to Los Angeles and then New York. They will perform five shows a week. Each performer will be paid \$500 a week plus hotel accommodations, food and transportation.

Charles said the troupe includes Pueblos, Apache fire dancers, Eagle

dancers, Plains people traditional dancers, ladies fancy shawl dancer and hoop dancers. Charles, a Cree born in Toppenish, Washington and raised in Rocky Boy, Montana, will narrate the dances, interpret traditional values and culture and explain the changes in costumes as well as dance. Danell will perform the shawl dance.

The troupe will remain in Europe

for several weeks, then travel either to Africa or Australia. Their last trip will be to Japan.

Danell postponed her plans to join the Air Force for a year so that she can participate in this exciting venture. She is a 1986 graduate of Madras High School and she was recognized for her artistic and academic skill throughout her school years.

Obituary Robert Brewer

A former Madras High School band and chorus teacher, Robert Brewer, 63, died Saturday, May 9 at his Milwaukie, Oregon home.

Brewer was born in Artesia, New Mexico and moved to Medford in 1932. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II.

He graduated from Lewis and Clark College in 1949. He became a band and chorus teacher in the Madras High School from 1950 to 1959. He left Madras to accept a teaching fellowship at Lewis and Clark while working for his master's degree in music. In 1961 he joined the teaching staff at Gilbert Middle School. In 1967 he moved to the Milwaukie area and retired in 1980.

He played the trombone in various musical groups, was a member of the Oregon City Traditional Jazz Society, Musicians Union Local 99 and Milwaukie American Lodge Post 180.

Survivors include his wife, Mary; a son, Daniel S. Milwaukie; a daughter, Barbara Gumm, Seaside, a brother, John R., Portland; a sister, Emma Jane Hill, Kingston, N.Y.; and two grandchildren.

Graveside services were held Wednesday, May 13 at Willamette National Cemetery.

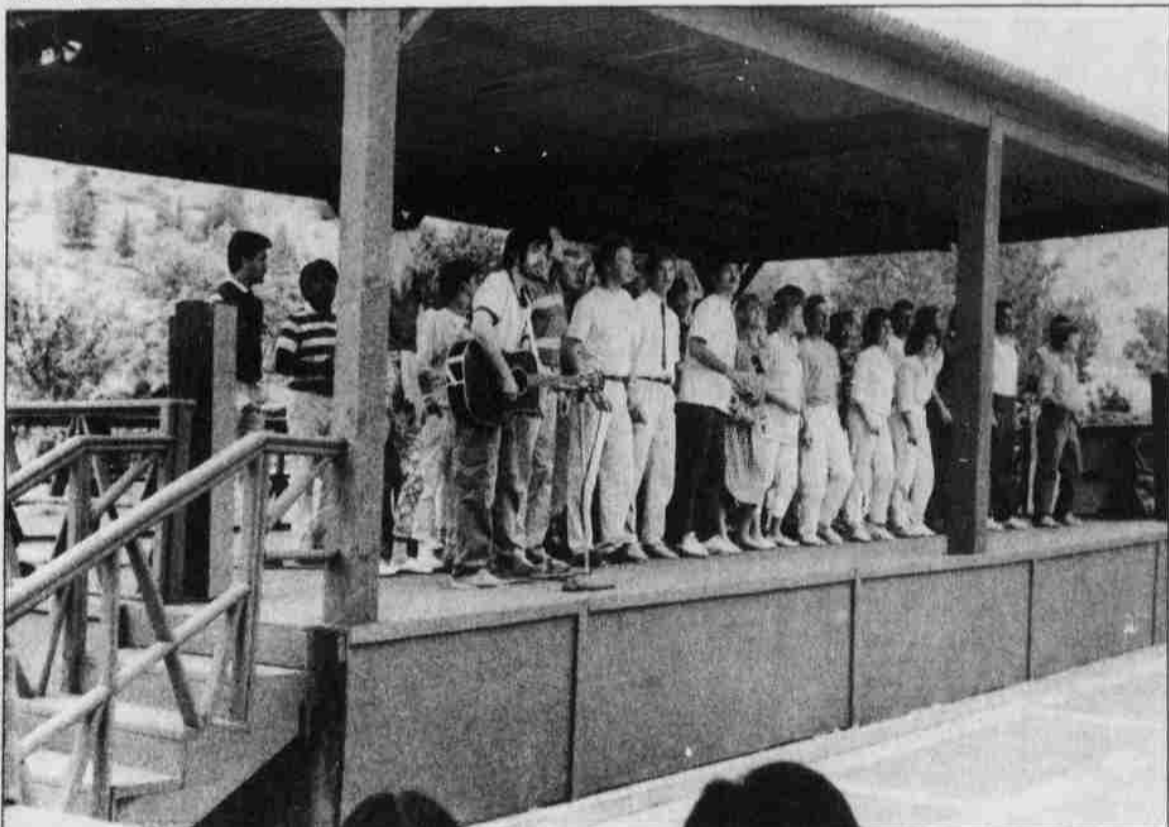
A reunion of all former Stewart Indian School students, staff, their families, and friends will be held
