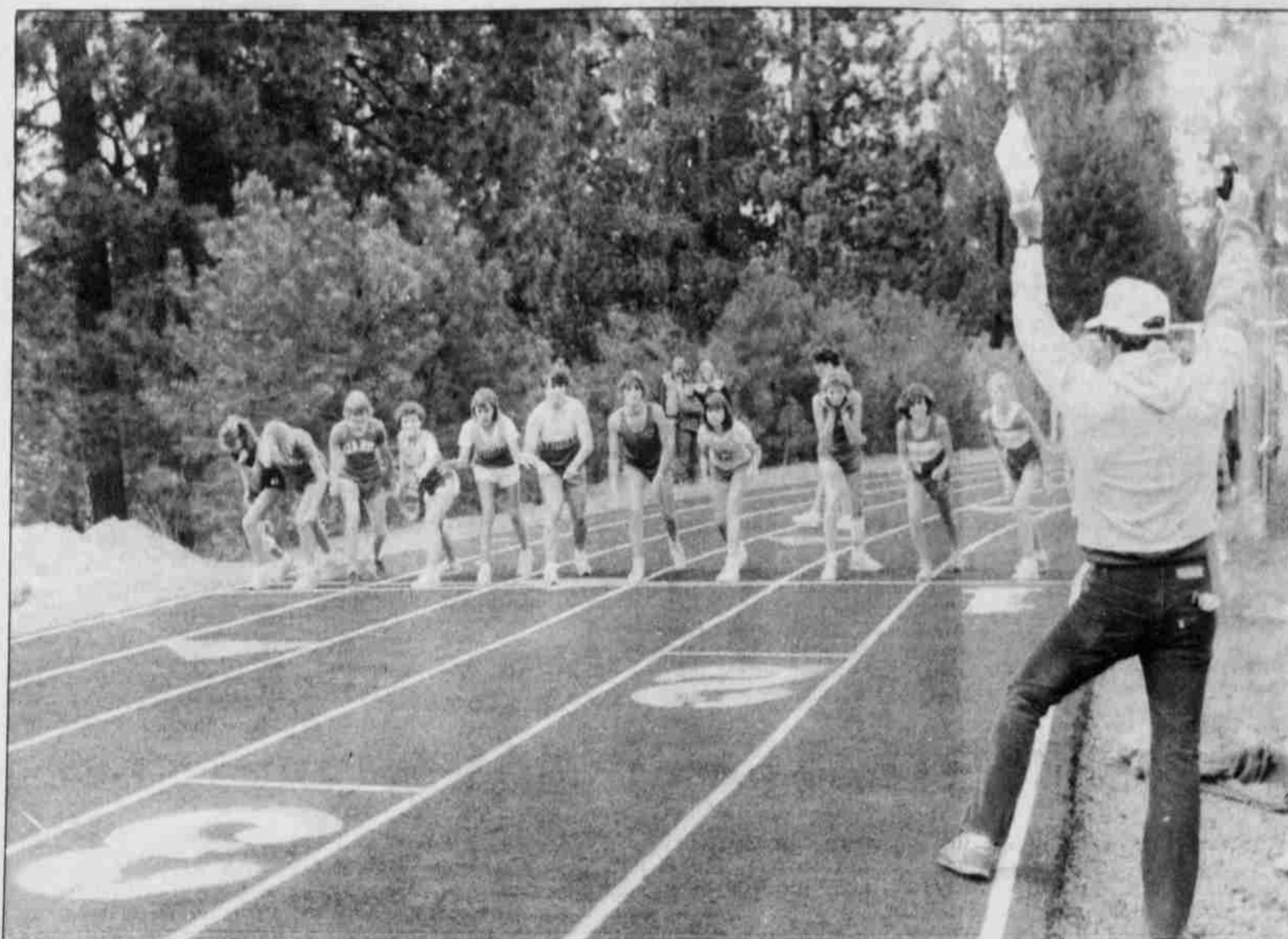

Memorial Endurance Race scheduled for June 27

The annual Nick Kalama Memorial Endurance horse race will be held Saturday, June 27 at 10 a.m. This year there will be the annual memorial in Kalama's name; the "In Memory of Wilma Scott" ladies trophy; and the junior division "In Memory of Harold Culpus" trophy. A new course has been plotted for races. The mens and womens races will be over a 18-20 mile course with the races starting and finishing at the Warm Springs Shaker Church. For the junior race a course between 5-10 miles will be plotted.

The races are open to all. A \$1,000 purse will be given in the races. Prizes for the mens race are first place—a yearling colt, buckle and satin jacket; second place—a

buckle and a satin jacket; third place—a satin jacket and horse gear (nylon tiedown and strap and head-face and reins); fourth place—satin jacket and horse gear; fifth place—a satin jacket and a leg on the Juanita Bourland Perpetual trophy. To win possession of the Bourland

trophy a leg must be won three years.

In the junior division in addition to the Culpus trophy there will be other added prizes. Other prizes to be donated by the Kalama family. All riders must use a stock saddle. For more information or to obtain

Show time is 1:00 p.m. both on Saturday and Sunday, in the new rodeo arena two miles East of Warm Springs on the Kah-Nee-1a highway. This is a WSIRA approved rodeo as all cowboys will be in
