activity. Throughout the year teachers and students have invited famiel members to participate in activ-
ities in theirclassroom and in special ities in their classroom and in special

thank all of you for making an extra effort this year to share in
your child's school program your child's sctool program.
2.0 Improve student academic performance in a targeted area Each grade level has chosen one
area to emphasize this year. Below area to emphasize this year. Below
you will find a list of those areas you will find a list of those areas
that are getting extra attention at each gradelevel: First grade- - ocibulary and speaking in complete
sentences; Second grade-Capitalisentences; Second grade-Capitali-
zation and punctuatoon; third
languadezation and punctuation; third grade-

Result of this year's achievement testing indicate that our students have made significant improvement
in their learning. The following
