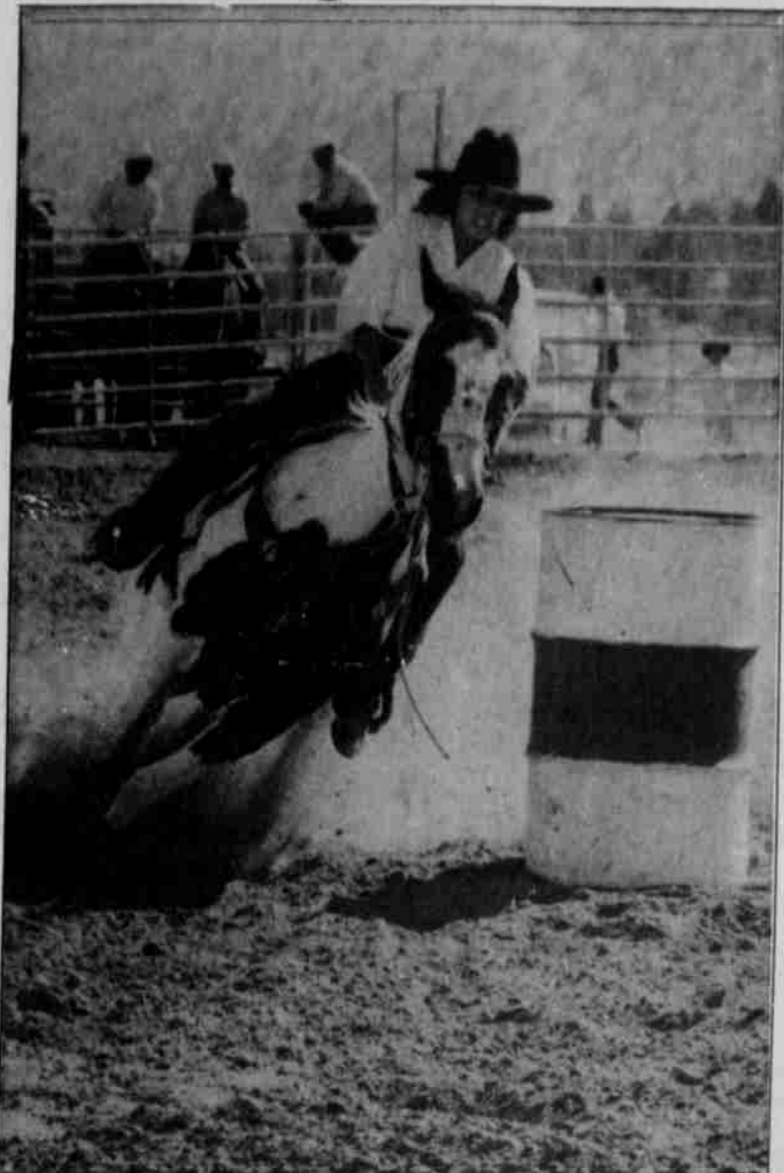


Plenty of action offered at annual rodeo

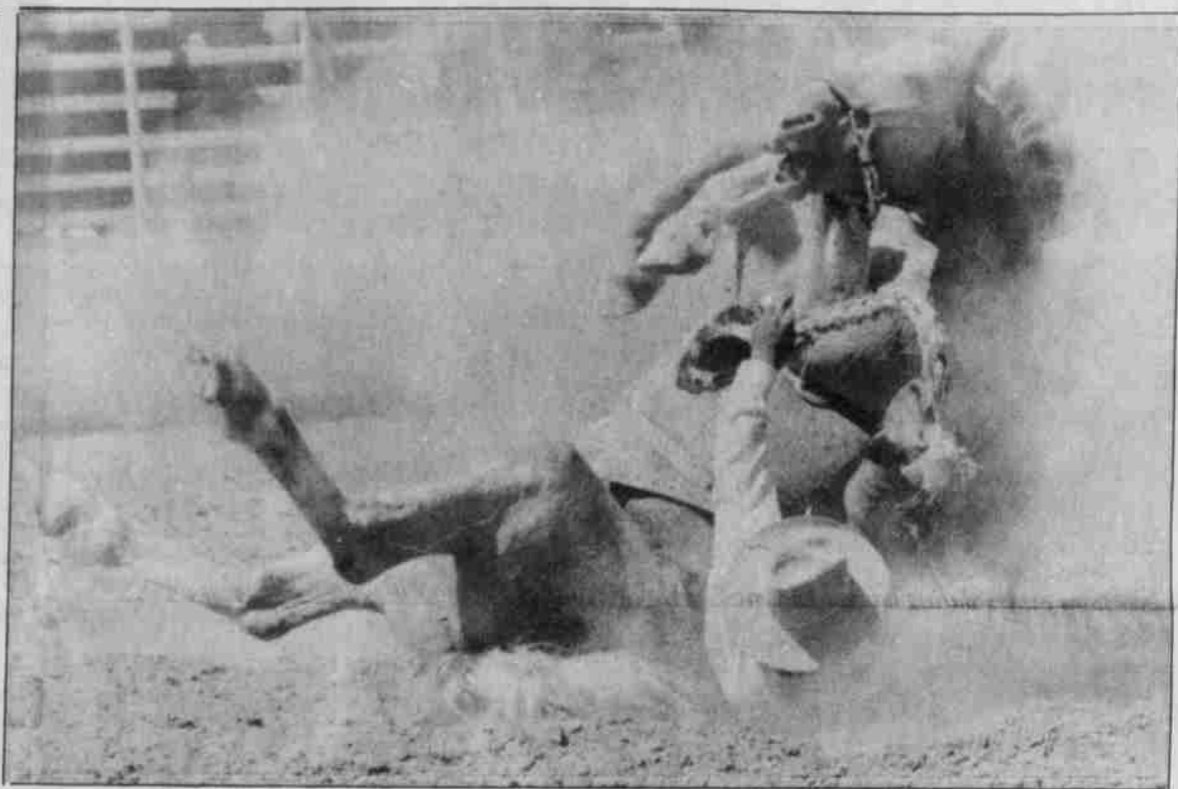

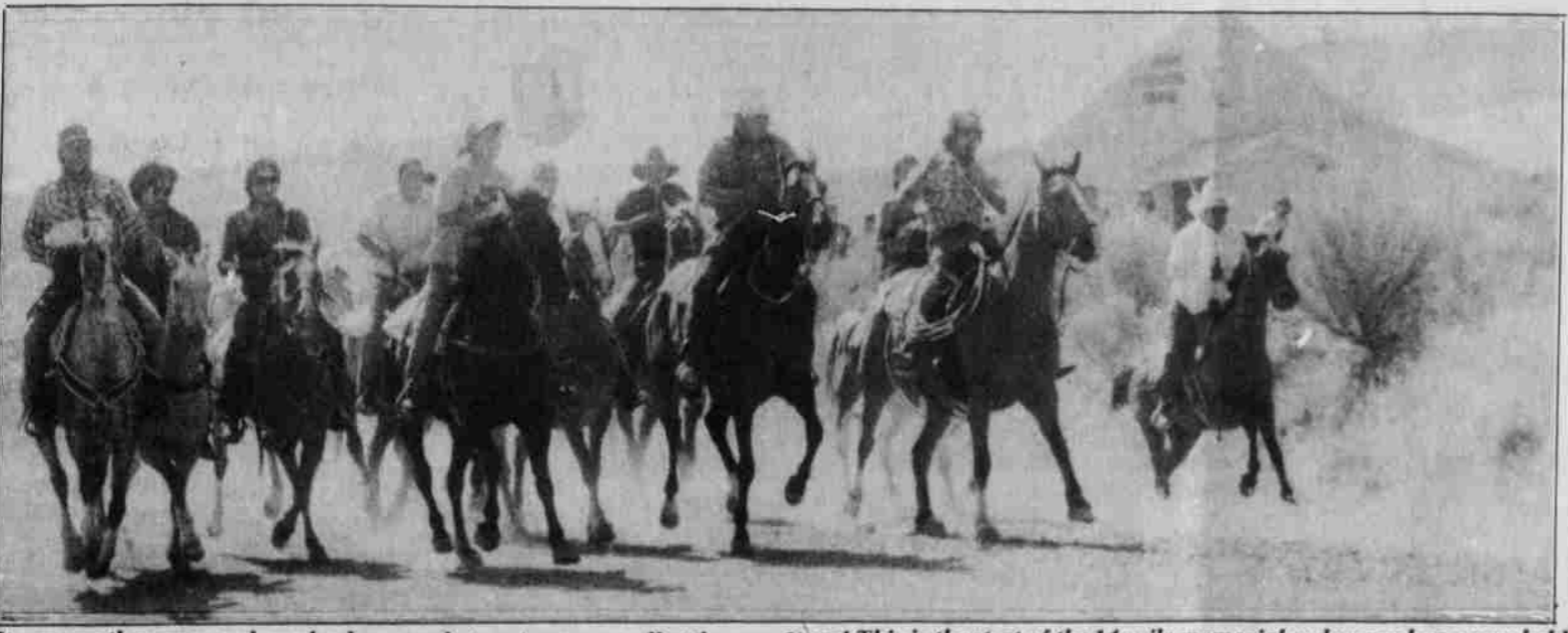

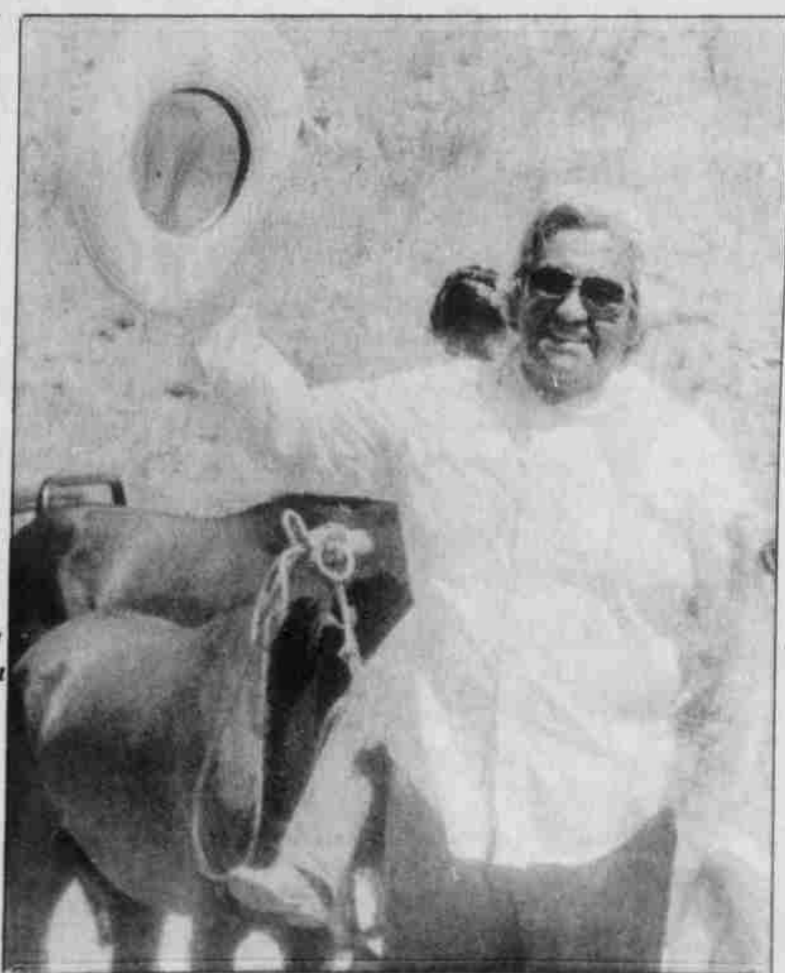
