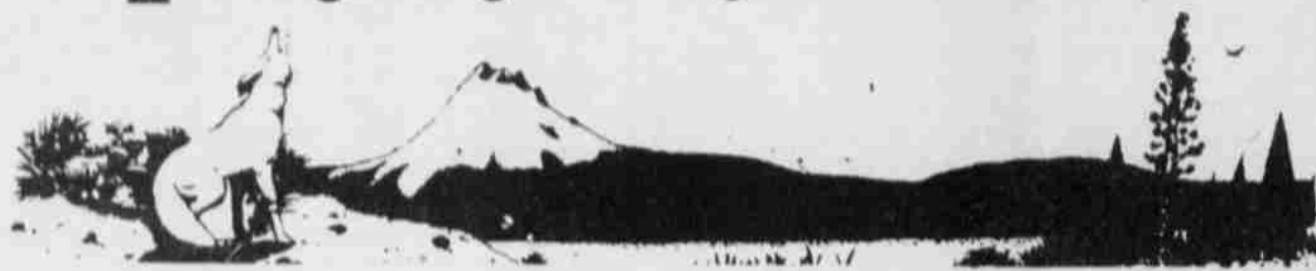

Hellon entered the 50 mile Ultramarathon held at Vancouver, Washington. The event is sponsored by the Oregon Road Runners of Portland. The run is divided into ten mile segments with rests each ten miles. Hellon stated he participated in the run because he is a runner and running keeps him in shape for his favorite sport, basketball.

The winner of the event ran the course in about five and a half hours. Hellon completed it in 11 1/2 hours. His goal was to complete the run. He said the only time he questioned his being in the run was during the last five miles. After he finished he was sore but glad he took part in the run.

Hellon hopes to enter the Sacramento, California marathon in December, 1987. His running goal is to enter and complete the annual Boston Marathon.

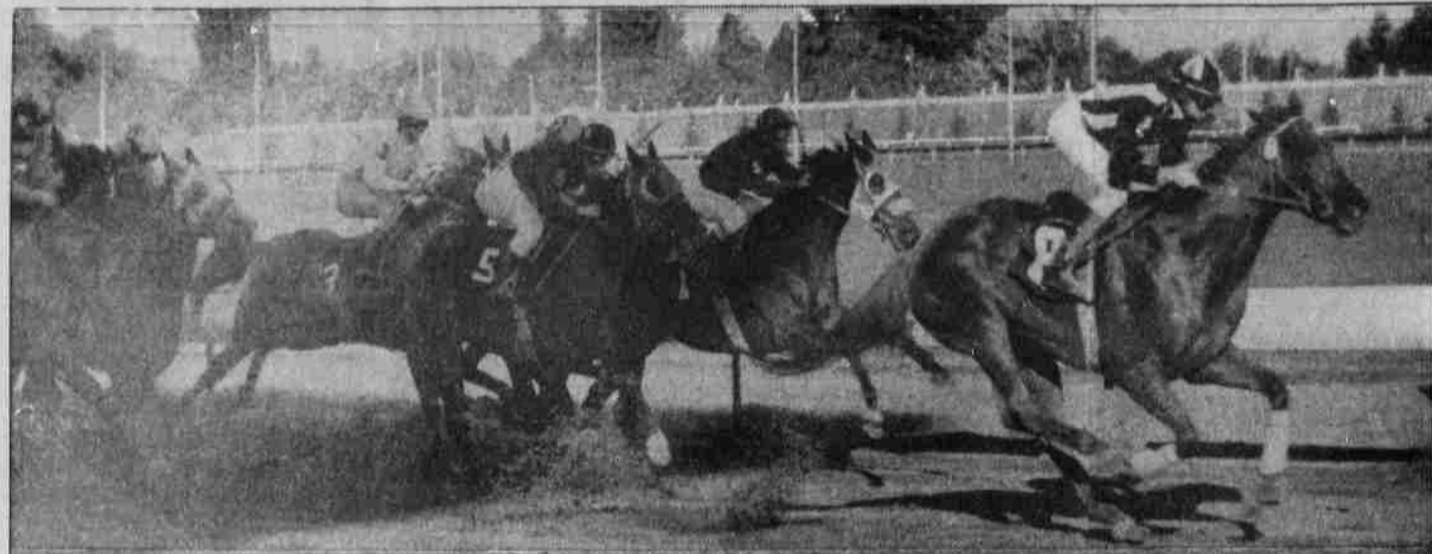

Hud Estimo: Training horses a busy career in the racing circuit

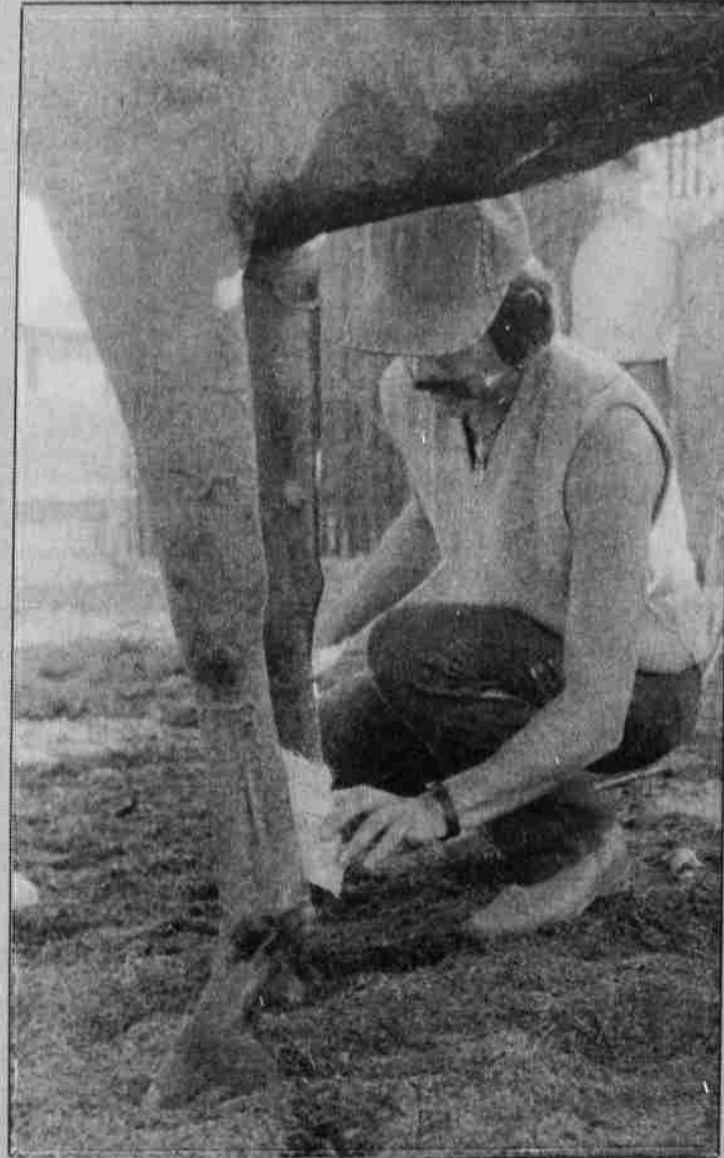
Tom "Hud" Estimo, Jr., 31, is the only one of Della Smith's five children who has made horses his living. Through his years of experience, Hud has learned the ins and outs of the racing world as well as the dos and don'ts of horses.

Hud worked as an "apprentice" under Della for 15 years. And, when Della decided to return to the reservation a year ago, Hud took over her California stable of three horses. Two of the original horses have since been retired or semi-retired. The third, Pete's Scepter, continues to run for Hud.

During the past year, Hud attained his certification as a trainer and has moved his home base to Portland Meadows. He is currently training four thoroughbreds, all of which belong to Hud.

Pete's Scepter, a five-year-old gray gelding, continues to be a prolific runner. Della bought him for \$500 in 1986 and he has won about \$7,000 since then. Winter Express, a three-year-old bay gelding, has won \$500 since it was purchased earlier this year, but won over \$6,000 while running for a previous owner in California. Another horse, Indian Search, has not won any races for Hud. He's still trying him out, having just run his first race at Portland Meadows last weekend. Yellow Rose, a three-year-old filly, is still in training and is due to hit the tracks later this month.

As a trainer, Hud must evaluate a horse, condition him and select the right feeding program. He also selects and enters the right races and jockeys.

His current stable consists of "horses that are culls. They're horses nobody wanted," says Della. "He brought them from that condition to be winners." Because of this success, prospective owners are interested in contracting with Hud to work as their trainer.

Like his mother, Hud actively participates in all aspects of a horse's performance. It's that careful tending and his expertise that have helped Hud and his stable become the success that they are.
