

Christmas arrived early for F & S

A bright new red fire truck is what some small boys will ask Santa Clause to give them for Christmas. Warm Springs Fire and Safety received a "bright shiny red"

truck early in the fall. The truck is a new 1987 GMC pumper-tanker. The new truck is stationed at the Simnasho fire hall. It could be termed as a "sensation" in fire

fighting equipment because it is possible for just one man to respond and run the truck at a fire.

The vehicle is equipped with a turbo-charged engine, automatic transmission, preconnected attack lines, booster hose reel. A deluge gun that delivers 750 gallons of water per minute, a monitor gun that delivers 250 gallons per minute, a 3,000 gallon tank that is able to pump 1,000 gallons per minute.

According to Fire Chief Jerry Huff, all of the Fire and Safety personnel have been trained and are familiarized with the truck and its equipment. Huff added that the new truck is designed to give more thorough and adequate structural protection.

Assistant Fire Chief Dean Seyler stated the Fire and Safety department is in need of able-bodied volunteers in the Simnasho area. People interested in volunteering should contact Seyler at 553-1161, ext. 200 or 208.

Howlak Tichum Thurman Henry

Thurman Henry, 46, resident of Warm Springs died November 26, 1987 at the Mt. View Hospital emergency room. He was a member of the Warm Springs Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs.

Henry was born May 30, 1941 to Peter and Ethel (Helson) Henry in Simnasho, Oregon. He lived in the Warm Springs area most of his life. He attended schools in Simnasho, Warm Springs and Madras. He also attended Anadarko Indian School in Anadarko, Oklahoma where he majored in business administration. He had worked at the mill, ranching, gill netting on the Columbia River and had trained race horses. He enjoyed hunting and fishing. He was a member of the Warm Springs Shaker Church.

Surviving him are two daughters, Teresa Suppah and Tamera Henry both of Warm Springs; an aunt Geraldine Blodgett and an uncle Wilkins Helton; nephews, Henry Kalama, III and Edmond Kalama; two neices, Illone Thomas and Jarita Spino and numerous relatives at Warm Springs and on the Columbia River.

Dressing ceremonies were held November 27 at the Colonial Belair Funeral Home in Madras with Delbert Frank officiating. Funeral services were held at the 1910 Indian Shaker Church in Warm Springs November 27 with burial at the Red Lake Cemetery near Simnasho. A traditional giveaway and dinner was held at the Simnasho Longhouse November 30 by family and friends.

Lillian (Kalama) Tulee

Enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs and resident of Toppenish, Washington, Lillian (Kalama) Tulee, 61, died in Yakima, Washington November 27, 1987.

Lillian was born to Oliver and Katie (Henry) Kalama at Warm Springs July 8, 1926. She spent her childhood years in Warm Springs. On December 15, 1942 she married Clifford B. Tulee at Warm Springs. The couple made their home in Washington. She was a member of the 1910 Shaker Church of White Swan, Washington.

She was preceded in death by her parents, three sons, one daughter and four brothers. Surviving her are her husband, Clifford Tulee, Sr.; three daughters, Patricia Tulee

and Marie Tulee, both of Warm Springs and Loretta Martinez of Toppenish, Washington; four sons, Clifford Tulee, Jr. of Harrah, Washington, Leonard Tulee of Toppenish, Francis Tulee and Cecil Tulee, Sr. of Warm Springs; and a sister Kathleen Moses of Warm Springs.

Dressing ceremonies were held at the Merritt Funeral Home in Wapato, Washington on November 28 with overnight ceremonies held at the family home in Toppenish. Services were held at the 1910 Indian Shaker Church in White Swan on November 29. The body was then taken to the 1910 Indian Shaker Church in Warm Springs for services held November 30 with the burial following at the Kalama Cemetery in Warm Springs.

Delton Jay Switzler

A lifelong resident of Warm Springs and enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, Delton Jay Switzler, 58, died December 1, 1987 at Mt. View Nursing Home. He had been ill for a long period of time.

He was born September 8, 1929 at Warm Springs to Jasper and Ruby (Smith, Coon) Switzler. He was a member of the U.S. Army during the Korean War era. He married Maxine Winishut on September 3, 1954. During his lifetime he had worked as a carpenter, timber faller, timber contractor and rancher. He was a member of the tribal timber committee. During his younger years he had been a member of the Warm Springs Calf Roping Club.

He is preceded in death by his

father Jasper; his mother Ruby Coon; and two brothers, Wilbur Switzler and Emil Switzler. Surviving him are his wife Maxine Switzler; four daughters, Valerie Aguilar, Eydie Switzler, Lori Switzler and Tina Aguilar; four sons, Victor, J.D., Wendell and Clinton Switzler; five sisters, Edith Danzuka, Evangeline Trimble, Beulah Calica, Leota Saunders and Susie Coronado; and 11 grandchildren.

Dressing ceremonies were held at Colonial Belair Funeral Home in Madras on December 2 with overnight ceremonies following at the 1910 Indian Shaker Church at Warm Springs. The Warm Springs Veteran of Foreign Wars held a casket draping ceremony. Burial was at the Agency Cemetery December 3, 1987.

Darin Wayne Lawver

Darin Wayne Lawver, 27, of Portland, Oregon was killed in a car accident just south of Albany, Oregon on 1-5 November 27, 1987.

Lawver was born January 1, 1960 in Portland to Ben and Sandra (Meachem) Lawver. He grew up in the Portland area. After high school he went to work as an assistant coach at Chemawa Indian School in Salem. Many people in the Warm Springs area became acquainted with him during celebrations as he was a dealer and trader of Indian jewelry.

Surviving him are his parents Ben Lawver of Salem, Oregon; his mother Sandra Lawver of Portland; a brother, Todd Lawver of Por-

land; two sisters, Denise Fricke of Boise, Idaho and Tracy Lawver of Portland; his grandparents Cliff and Kathleen Meachem of Wapato, Washington; two aunts, Maxine (Meachem) Stephens of Prineville, Oregon and Colleen (Meachem) Reimer of California; two great-uncles, Zane Jackson and Max Jackson of Warm Springs; and numerous other relatives in Warm Springs, Yakima and Klamath Falls.

Funeral services were held at the Chapel of Ward's Funeral Home in Klamath Falls on December 2, 1987 with burial following at the Chief Schonchin Cemetery near Beatty, Oregon.
