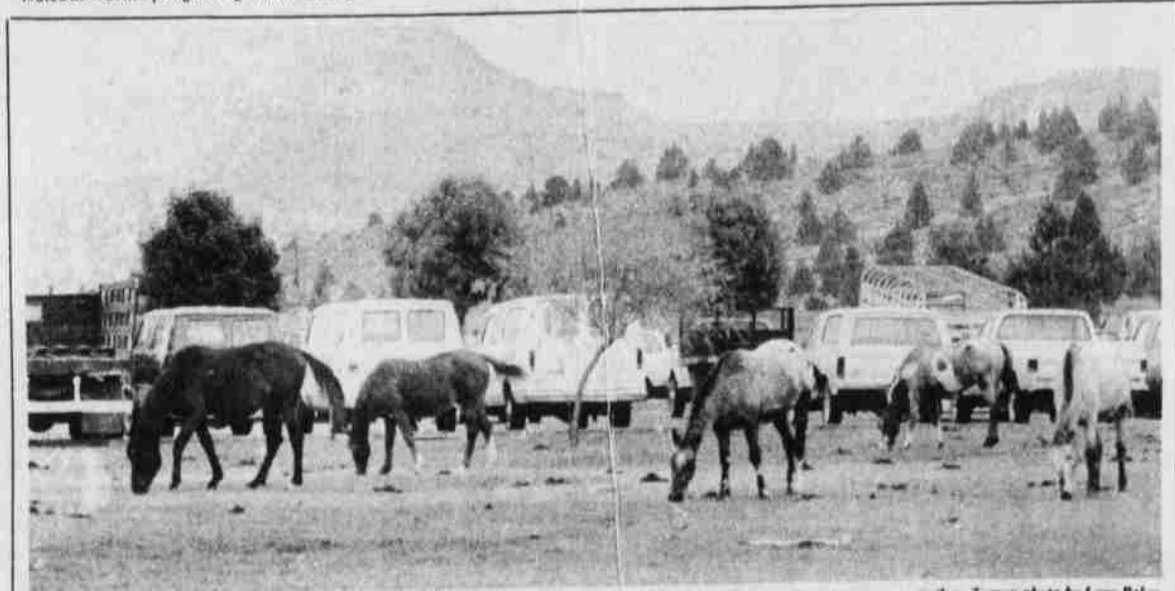

She was born to Paiute Chief Raymond Johnson, Sr. and Henrietta (Kalama) Johnson in Redmond, Oregon March 24, 1964. Chief Johnson preceded her in death in 1975. In 1971, she was adopted by Chris and Vickie Still of Warm Springs. Margaret was raised in the Warm Springs area. She attended schools in Warm Springs and Madras. In 1982, she graduated from Rosemont High in Portland, Oregon. She held special interests in basketball, horse back riding, beadwork and Indian dancing. During her younger years she was active in 4-H clubs.

Surviving here are her adopted mother Vickie Still Hellon, adopted father Chris Still, her grandmother Etta Johnson, brothers Francisco Martinez, Jr., Henry Martinez, Raymond Johnson, Sr., Lee Johnson, Carl Martinez, Paul Martinez, Dennis Martinez, Lewis Hellon, Lee Hellon and Moses Hellon; sisters, Myra Johnson Shawaway, Rose Mary Martinez, Caroline Cruz, Rozella Martinez, Ernestine Martinez, Doreen Johnson, Carrie Johnson, Francina Sanders, Laura Still, Debbie Still and Kelli Hellon; daughters Angelina Sanders, Jessica Sanders and Marie Hernandez; numerous uncles, aunts and cousins.
