

Contact VFW for assistance

The VFW Elliott Palmer Post #4217 would like to apologize to the family of Frenchie Thomas for not assisting with his funeral and interment. "We were waiting for the family to contact us," said post commander Jim Foltz. Families must contact the VFW before the VFW can participate in funerals, he added. When a veteran dies, the family is urged to contact quartermaster Alvin Smith at 553-1441. He will make the necessary arrangements for the VFW.

Foltz also advises that when making funeral arrangements, the family must sign all Veteran's Administration papers. Doing this ensures the family that paperwork concerning such things as a grave marker and a widow's pension will be taken care of as quickly as possible.

The Tribe has asked the local VFW to present the colors and conduct opening prayers at the upcoming Constitution celebration to be held February 12, 13 and 14. All VFW members are asked to participate in the activities at the

Agency Longhouse Saturday and at the Simnasho Longhouse on Sunday.

The local VFW needs additional membership to help fight for veteran's rights. If you're a vet, call Alvin Smith. "We're fighting for those vets who aren't members," said Foltz. He added that Elliott Palmer Post has helped 13 Warm Springs families in the last year. They were successful in gaining assistance for 11 of those families. "You can't get anywhere without the VFW."

Children's Dental Health month to begin

The Warm Springs Indian Health Service dental clinic is not making any new appointments at this time so that they can complete their work on their current patients. If you are in need of dental care, contact the clinic to have your name put on the waiting list. The clinic is currently concentrating on operative work, such as fillings and root canals, rather than exams and emergencies.

Emergencies will be seen every day, except Wednesday, from 8 to 9 a.m. and from 1 to 2 p.m. It is advised that you sign in early as the clinic can only see two or three patients during the one-hour time periods. Emergencies are of priority nature, such as relief of pain, swelling, trauma and extractions.

Persons missing two appointments will be issued a warning card. On the third appointment missed, the person's name will be put at the back of the waiting list.

The dental clinic will be working with diabetics and nursing home residents. More information will be made available at a later date.

February is National Children's Dental Health month. Information concerning children's dental care will be presented to the public in three categories: clinic, school- and community-based.

In the community category, parents will be encouraged to visit the dental staff. This will hopefully lead to increased parental involvement in children's dental care.

Parents will also learn how the dentist works on their children.

The theme for February at the dental clinic will be "Healthy Smiles Can Show Your Style." There will be a healthy smiles contest in which children will be invited to the clinic to have their picture taken. A date and time will be announced soon so that children can have their photos taken.

Two contests for children will

also be sponsored. A coloring contest, for Head Start through first grade students, will be held. All students are encouraged to color their very best for this contest. For second through fifth graders, there will be a poster drawing contest. Entries will be judged on ideas and participation. Prizes for both contests will be as educationally beneficial as possible.

You are hereby ordered: To be and appear at the Warm Springs Tribal Court at the time and

date shown to show cause why the suspended sentence of 9/2/87, should not be imposed for your failure to comply with the sentence imposed against you. This hearing will not be a full hearing on the merits of case; you must appear and defend against a complaint that you failed to obey the Order of the Court.

If you fail to appear as so ordered, the Tribal Court shall enter a complaint for contempt of court and issue a warrant for your arrest. If you have any questions, you should seek legal assistance immediately.

Hints given for warmth

The combination of freezing temperature and dry warm temperature inside do an excellent job of removing moisture from the air.

This dry air allows for many minor problems. Most commonly: static electricity, dry nasal and throat passages, and that "chilly feeling" even though it is quite warm inside.

Any time moisture is removed from your skin it causes a drying, cooling effect—something we all enjoy

during the summer months.

A suggestion to feel warmer and better is to add moisture to air indoors where we spend a lot of time. This can be accomplished as easily as putting a tea pot of water on the stove each day to boil off or automatically by adding a humidifier that will maintain a constant moisture level. If neither of these ideas suit your fancy, take heart, it's just over fifty days until spring.

The old religions of the Indian people were given to them by our Creator named God, or sometimes referred to by an Indian name, which changes from tribe to tribe. Our creator instructed them on how to drive the dark tormentors out of our homes and lives, but if you neglect to keep him out, he will return to the same place he was before.

All of us need exact instructions on how to help one another with every kind of problem, and you must understand that the spirit of darkness is our major problem. "He" is killing our young people, not you and I, and not the lack of having. He will case you to reject these words that I am speaking to

you today, because he wants you to be unaware, that he has intentionally planned to destroy you, your family, your friends and everything that you stand for. Why is he so determined to destroy us? Because we are created in the image of God, ... like it or not.

Beware of the road on which you walk my friend, and find that person or persons, who have been patiently waiting for you to deliver yourself into their arms. They have been praying for all of you who feel lost, or who are lost, and feel unloved, or are unloved. They have been praying for you, and others like you, who are drinking and doping their life away, or who is

standing alone in this cold world, just wanting someone to know that you're alive, some who cares. Get out of your house if you have things pretty much together, and find these ones who need your today. All children are you're children, and all parents are you're parents, you cannot possibly find a good reason to let the enemy keep a hold on them.

Return to the spiritual life that is awaiting you. Let the ways of God clean you very being and fill you with truth and light.

Heartsavers course set for Feb.
