Feasibility study being conducted

The High Desert Museum in Bend, Oregon, is conducting a feasibility study of the Malheur Field Station, located 32 miles southeast of Burns, to determine the potential for continued operation of the facility. This study comes in response to Pacific University's announcement that as of June 30, 1988, it will end its 15-year management of the Field Station.

According to Executive Director Donald M. Kerr, a \$16,000 grant was obtained from the Fred Meyer Charitable Trust to investigate various scenarios for continued operation of the Field Station.

"The Museum, one of 25 institutions represented in the Malheur Field Station Consortium, is currently gathering data on the facility and its operations in order to present a plan for the future of the Field Station to the Consortium," says Kerr.

"It is possible that the Museum may consider management of the Field Station if the feasibility study results are positive and if major funding is available," said Kerr.

A decision on a new supervising institution for the Field Station will not be made until early June.

Leadership conference set for July 10-22

The Northwest Portland Area Indian Health Board, in coordination with the Indian Health Service and the Bureau of Indian Affairs, proudly announces the second Annual Summer Youth Leadership Conference. At Evergreen State College in Olympia, Washington July 10-22.

This will be an intense, two week program designed around Indian

treaty curriculum, college testing and recruitment and health promotion and disease prevention.

Invited to attend will be 100 high school or GED students from the three-state area of Oregon, Washington and Idaho. Two representatives from each of the 38 federally recognized tribes and 24 urban and other tribes will be selected based

on community involvement, leadership potential, and grade in school (priority will be given to graduating seniors). Absolutely no drugs or alcohol will be allowed. Meals, lodging, and travel expenses will be paid by the NPAIHB.

A former resident of Warm Springs, Eugenia "Gena" Wolf of Pendleton, Oregon died May 1, 1988 at the Good Shepard Community Hospital in Hermiston, Oregon. She was 56.

Gena was born July 23, 1931 to Rufus and Anna (Andrews) Wolf in Thornhollow, Oregon. She had lived in Warm Springs for 21 years, leaving in 1975 to move back to Pendleton. She was an enrolled member of the Umatilla Tribe and also a member of the George Saint Dennis Post 140 American Legion Auxiliary. She was preceded in death by a daughter, Anna Wewa January 18, 1979 and a son, Matt Wewa August 27, 1984.

Surviving her are a daughter, Arlene Wewa of Warm Springs; two sons, Wilson Wewa, Jr. and Winston Wewa both of Warm Springs; two nephews, David Wolf and Lonnie Wolf both of Pendleton, Oregon; two nieces, Marilyn Wolf of Wellpinit, Washington and Vivian Wolf of Pendleton and three grandchildren.

Dressing ceremonies were held May 3, 1988 at the Mission Longhouse on the Umatilla reservation at 3 p.m. Rosary services were held at 7 p.m. at the Longhouse with overnight Washut services following. Burial was May 4, 1988 at the Agency Cemetery on the Umatilla reservation.
